
During remote learning, did you feel that any questions you or your child had were answered by his/her teacher(s)?






How would you describe the process of finding and accessing your child's assignments?



During remote learning, to complete their assignments my child required:




Regarding communication from the District, is the amount of information...

Zoom meetings

I like the new process of sending out materials for the whole week before the week starts. It helps us working parents plan. I love hearing my 2nd graders teacher Ms. The recording herself teaching new topics. She is so clear and easy for the kids to understand all the terminology.

The assignments being posted ahead of time allows me to know the expectations for my child in an organized manner

- -Communication and feedback we're getting from the K team of teachers-the videos, individualized feedback, and encouragement provided is supportive and motivating
- -Watching the daily morning announcements from the school

There is much more flexibility now. When the quantity of assignments decreased, it allowed us to do a much better job incorporating family priorities (daily chores, actually reviewing our child's homework and seeing what needs improving, family walks). This is a calmer approach for everyone rather than the prior frenzy.

The communication formats have been wonderful. :)

Zoom meetings technically/functionally work (child says)

Having a suggested schedule is helpful to our family who is used to having a set routine. I also like the Zoom options because having any sort of live human interaction outside of our home is essential right now to maintaining a bit of normalcy in these crazy times.

I also love the division of the A and B schedules for the middle school students. It has helped my son a lot to divide time that way (it was a little overwhelming those first 5 days of e-learning). That being said, I feel like he went from way too much work to needing a little bit more.

My kid's ideal focus time for e-learning is between about 9-12. If Zoom calls could be after lunch or any time in the evening that would be better.

In some cases we also don't receive the link until moments before or once the zoom already starts. This requires to use of multiple devices and more fumbling around.

The weekly plans that are sent via email, the prior Friday before each week, are VERY helpful and display a clear understanding of the daily/weekly assignments.

I am happy to see that my daughter's home class has implemented Zoom calls each morning. This week they discuss the assignments or questions in the first two or three minutes and then move on to fun socializing. I realize that many parents are complaining about this socializing but I feel that the children are really enjoying being able to see their friends and teacher in a relaxed setting. I also know that many students are not signing on in time or at all and missing out on the question or day's topic explanation. My daughter's teacher is very caring and understanding towards the children and their social emotional health.

Please provide any additional feedback you feel may be helpful to our district administrators as we review our remote learning plans.

I'd like to start out by thanking you for all you're doing to continue educating our children during this challenging time. Our family appreciates your efforts. This isn't easy for anyone, especially the kids.

Our child is frustrated with the new format. He misses the face-to-face contact with his teachers, friends, and classmates, and the communal environment found at school. We can see that he is much less engaged in his classes now than he was while at school. The assignments don't feel real to him so he either fights doing them or speeds through them. We don't know how much he's actually absorbing.

His biggest frustrations are searching for the assignments and working with his chrome book and related programs like google classroom. I've watched him submit assignments that he's later told were not handed in.

The Zoom meetings have been a great tool for helping the kids and teachers connect. Hearing the teachers' voices and seeing their expressions really adds to the level of communication and engagement. The lessons and assignments become real. It's also a nice opportunity for the kids to see each other. Hopefully these continue and possibly become a larger part of the format.

I would love to see new topics taught by was a my 4th graders teacher remotely either by video/recording/zoom etc.

The teachers and district as whole have done an amazing job!!! We appreciate all they have done to ease the burden on the kids and parents!! Thank you!!

- -Reduce amount of remote learning days within the week and keep to a consistent schedule (i.e. same day(s) "off" each week) -For our 2nd grader in particular, more variety in assignments beyond responding to tasks in SeeSaw and streamlining if possible (cross-curricular assignments, project based learning), now that we're looking at continuing remote learning for the remainder of the school year
- -Any amount of personalized communication, explanation of concepts, supportive feedback, and motivation that can be provided would go a long way as this continues
- -The prerecorded video instructions for math (with examples) are helpful. Please keep it up.
- -I feel like parents are a much better judge of what level of PE is actually necessary for each kid. I know that running around and playing outside is far better and I am proceeding with that philosophy in mind.
- I don't love having zoom calls at 7 PM with kids/teachers at night. Day time is better. However, if this is to accommodate family schedules that do not allow daily calls, I understand. I know the kids really appreciate seeing their classmates faces. -please continue to send out surveys, It's good to know you want feedback!
- :) Having all the assignments links available and "ready to go" for the week on Monday, so families can complete the tasks when time is available. We have early risers in the household, but sometimes it's necessary to wait until the links "go live" or activities get uploaded to Seesaw. :)
- (2 grade) the teachers need to be more understanding with the homework they leave and more organized.

(mom says) At least one class is only giving their schedule to the child (Gifted ELA) so I don't know when Zoom calls are planned. Finally got the Early Bird schedule right on the announcements (they do not have orchestra every day). It would be great if Zoom calls could be later in the day--we are having sleep problems as a household and waking up for ONE 20 minute Zoom call at 9 a.m. is silly--she's then done with her work before Noon. It is not necessary to have more than one homebase zoom check-in a week that is mandatory at the middle school level.

1. My "not enough" communication comments from school/teachers is specifically for the Middle School level. I do feel communications from and their teachers have been just right (but I would welcome a little bit more if there was a reason for it.) At the Middle School level, I feel like the only tool I have as a parent is the schedule posted on the website. Outside of that, I have little to no insight or access to the work my son is doing - specific assignments or anything. I'm lucky he doesn't have any learning challenges and is able to navigate this on his own. But it would be nice to have more information as a parent to KNOW he's doing what he needs to be doing. Even knowing when Zoom meetings are scheduled would be helpful. Homebase is listed on the website schedule, but there are others I do not have insight into. With four of us now learning and working from home, we need to coordinate video meetings in our house to make sure we keep noise level down and separate ourselves when there are multiple meetings at a time. Also, I have seen zero communication (whether by email or social media posts) from the search of the leadership has been lacking this year compared to last year and now that we are in remote learning, it has been non-existent from I have seen which is sad. At the search of the post of individual teacher classrooms) to pull together as a community which is a shame and disappointing.
2. The work load has been very minimal. My elementary child is typically finished in a little over an hour. She gets up to star by 8 or 8:30am and is always done before 10am. Which leaves for a long day of having to occupy time. It is definitely more for my middle schooler, but I think there's still room for more. Suggestions on how to enhance the school work are nice, but unless its "assigned" my kids don't want to do it. But I get that every kid and every family is in a different place right now in what they can manage, so this plan needs to be adaptable to fit everyone. Its fine for now - but if we don't go back to in-person learning this school year - or god forbid next year is affected as well, I am concerned the workload is not robust enough in the long term.
3. Besides wishing for more work, I think is doing a great job. If I have any constructive criticism, it is that my child's teacher has some not optimal times to do homeroom zoom meetings. Its mostly been 8:30am or 5:30pm. We are home and can work around whatever but for the 8:30am, I feel like it would be more helpful to start at 9am to give my child a chance to wake up a little more, log in and get her brain on her "School Day" before she's jumping into a zoom meeting. And the 5:30pm time is just odd in general. One of the meetings included parents (which was great!) so I understood that time. But another one was held this week for the students and that it outside of normal school hours so not the most convenient. But again, we'll make whatever we need to work.
Finally, THANK YOU for all that you're doing. Outside of my comment on everything the district and teachers are doing during this time. It is not lost on me how challenging it has been to create a plan from scratch to shift to remote learning and I am so appreciative of all the efforts being made and how the district is handling this. THANK YOU!
1. ZOOM MEETINGS: Can the teachers set zoom meeting up SENDING a Link. For instance let say Mrs is going to have a Zoom meeting at 1pm for her Homebase group. MRS would then set up through Zoom app click on meeting and specifically set a time and date for the meeting. Then the Zoom system will allow her to send a link specially to those students in her Homebase classroom. All the would have to do is click on the link and enter the code.
What is happening is some of the Zoom meetings are not registering the class time. It tells us that the meeting hasn't started yet and to wait.
2. Teacher co teaching. Its been a little challenging with Mrs and Mrs and Mrs are swapping work back and fourth. I understand the process, howeverthe work load is a lot. It is just a little more work to go back and foirth with all the documents they have. If there is any way they can break down the work just a little more. The classes are Language arts and reading.

- 1) It would be very helpful if Kindergarten teachers could email remote learning plans for the upcoming week several days in advance. With the school website issues throughout this past weekend, parents were unable to view the AM Kindergarten remote learning plans for this week until Sunday evening.
- 2) Daily Zoom meetings with the classroom teacher scheduled at consistent times, preferably in the morning. It is difficult to juggle Zoom meetings with the classroom teacher and specials teachers for multiple kids; additionally, consistent meeting times would help students maintain a sense of routine each e-learning day.
- 3) Why isn't there any science in the second grade remote learning plans?
- 4) Please consider distributing the Kindergarten class set of iPads to the Kindergarten students for the remainder of the year. While we have extra devices in our home, it would be much preferred to have a dedicated school device preloaded with the classroom apps for remote learning.
- 5) My OKEEP student has loved having Zoom meetings with the Specials teachers! It would be fantastic to have this available to the other grades as well, even if it was every other week.

Thank you for all you do to keep our kids learning during this challenging time!

140 minutes per day is far too little time for our 7th grader. I don't know how she won't be far behind where her sister was at the end of her 7th grade year if this schedule continues. We have started to supplement her learning on our own in an effort to help keep her where she needs to be.

160 min. of Remote learning is not enough for 5th. grader.

2nd grade should be 90 minutes a day. The work given takes far longer to complete then 90 mins. Their ELA takes 45-55 mins alone! Then you still have science, math, SEL and your elective (art, gym, library, P.E.). Its usually 2 1/2 to 3 hrs Of work a day. Also, I'd like to point out some of the activities kids are being asked to complete at home are not always possible as we don't have the supplies. They shouldn't have games or activities apart of the requested work that requires supplies that families don't have or cannot obtain to complete the assignments.

3rd grade work seem to be a good amount. Kindergarten is hard since the entire scope of work needs to be one on one with the student. Everyone is doing the best they can. The teachers have been so great throughout!

4th grade at Lester still has a bit too much homework daily. R

5 days a week is too much! Motivation is really waning here for completing work. it's becoming more difficult to work from home and make sure my child is understanding and completely all the activities.

5 days meetings instead of 4. Today she didn't see her teacher and classmates. I would like for that to change.

5:00 pm zoom calls are late. Links often don't work or require multiple passwords. Kindergarten packets could be in the order of the daily grid. Anything sent should be tested on district devices and non district devices. It would be nice to have more teacher to student instruction on a given day. E-learning as it is requires a significant effort from parents which is difficult to balance when working and a consistent message is likely not being delivered to all students. I would like to see more leadership from teachers

5th grade e-learning has been amazing! Clear and consistent directions and expectations. 1st grade has been more challenging.

60 min for K and 60 mins for OKEEP doesn't sound like that much but it takes the parents AT LEAST 1 hour to find things, read everything, comprehend everything, etc before the Kindergartener even begins. Then we need to spend the entire 2 hours with our child since he needs full support (maybe if we had a highschooler this would be easy...but KG is rough). My spouse and I are working nearly 60 hour weeks right now each (no hyperbole). The burden to work an additional 3+ hours each day is simply unbearable. Something has to give.

Within normal life (pre-COVID 19) PE, Music, Library, Poetry, Art, etc ARE indeed essential. I am a firm believer in a well rounded education from craddle to the grave. BUT in these COVID 19 (C19) days where the burden is placed on the parents to teach, the most essential subjects are reading, writing, mathematics, and science (basically the AM portion of KG). Has any consideration been given to limit the amount of activities of the more "non-essential" subjects within the context of this C19 era?

At the very least, please staple together the myriad of pages to be completed each day so that the parent doesn't have to search for 15+ minutes and kindly label it by day/date.

Also, it would be preferable to receive emails from on ONE source - the main teacher (in our case) and perhaps one individual from the district when district messages need to be provided. This way we only have two main sources of information flowing in.

I know you guys are truly doing the best you can. Everyone has been super helpful and enjoyable to work with. But like I alluded to earlier, something has to give. I am close to just calling off all OKEEP activities as a solution. But I am not there yet...

PS. I haven't even talked about our pre-K child with sensory issues and he started at Grove within the last 2-3 months. That's a whole other issue. Thx folks.

6th grade teachers it would be helpful if they put assignments in one area. It is very hard to jump from Google classroom to schools website, to emails or have my child pull up their account.

6th graders need more work. Worried they are not going to be prepared for junior high

90 minutes is NOT ENOUGH. My daughter is bored and begging for more work. I work full time and can't homeschool my children. Am thinking of signing up for online learning program because she is learning NOTHING new and is given busy work that she can complete in 30 min. THIS IS A JOKE! She normally received 60 min of math instruction a day and now gets 90 of total instruction.

A caring and communicative teacher is the key

A continued message that teachers and schools and districts understand that not every Zoom can be joined and not every assignment can be completed due to working parents unable to assist or check everything the child is assigned or working on. Teachers are doing their best and parents are also trying their best to care for their child/children, maintain their job working at home and then facilitate the new world of e-learning, all at the same time.

A couple times now she's had Zoom meetings at the same time on the same day for two classes, she then had to pick and missed help in the other class. They should be staggered so students need to choose between attending classes zoom.

A few concerns. 1. Grading scale. How will students be graded if there are no tests, quizzes or class participation? 2. Feels like the amount and pace at which material is covered for all subjects is little and slow. Overall pace of learning is dragging, feels like In slow mode. (For second grader especially) so are kids learning or covering enough material for their grades? Concerned about falling behind. 3. Prefer a bit more homework especially in Math and reading. Overall teachers do a great job calling in and emailing and helping us parents keep organized:) Thank you everyone for adjusting so quickly to make this e-learning as easy as possible.

A few things, a 45 min zoom with kinder is nice but too long, secondly, assigning a benchmarks reading assessment sound absolutely pointless and will just add more work to an almost overloaded day for third grade, unless that teacher is going to take a half hour of work away... also zoom meeting should be counted in the minutes, they don't appear to be for any grade which can stretch those state level minutes behind what they should be, lastly, if you add what the specials teachers are asking students to do in tip if himerikm class work, then it become too much and too time consuming. As parents we still want to provide for our kids the best way, which is reading and playing games at home in primary and some days there is not time left because they are burned out from many things going Beyoncé the time limits due to added things like zoom and specials. Many parents are trying to help two kids and are teachers themselves.

A few times we haven't been able to access a link or video.

A huge THANK YOU to all of the teachers and administrators who have put in so much extra work to make this happen. I know it's been difficult and that it takes the teachers longer to prepare. But, having some structure to the days and school work to do is so good for their mental health. I am so glad we are doing remote learning.

A little more training for the teachers who are posting on YouTube. Some of the security settings don't seem to be compatible with the kid's iPads. I also think it would be nice if the kids could have the opportunity to TALK with their teachers via phone. Or, maybe have the teachers have a set time for virtual "office hours" through Zoom? They could utilize the waiting room feature in this case so that they can talk one on one for those kids that need a little extra help?

A teacher/student relationship is an enormous part of education. Children are missing that. If anything I would figure out how those kids could spend more time with their teacher online. A 15 minute zoom call here and there is not cutting it. If exercise teachers can teach an entire class online for 4 hours a day, why can't a school teacher?

Able to respond to the survey different by grade. I would say my 6th grader didn't have enough work but my 4th grader was overwhelmed likely because she required a significant amount of my time.

Access to online tools is much better for us than before, but we still have issues. We try to access YouTube videos that won't play or are restricted, and IXL is SO slow! Sometimes we can't even get the lesson to load--just keeps spinning. I know tons of kids across the country are accessing the same resources so maybe nothing can be done about this. The Google docs on schools websites are good.

Please do not add any more to the workload! My kids are spending at least 3 1/2 -5 hours a day on schoolwork, including specials and PE. One of my kids is a slower learner, but the other child is also spending more time on all activities, compared to what's listed on the remote learning plan. I don't necessarily have a problem with the time, since I'm glad they are learning, but it seems like a lot some days. The assignment sheet may show 30 minutes for ELA, but it's taking closer to 50-60 by the time they read instructions, go to the 2-3 different resources needed, and actually do the work. The remote learning plans are underestimating time for nearly all activities, especially one assignment calls for accessing multiple resources (a YouTube video, a Seesaw activity, finding a picture for a slide, etc). Trying to annotate text online seems more time consuming than using a highlighter with paper. Same goes for typing all their responses—it can take a long time for kids! Some lessons seem more an exercise in keyboarding skills or using a specific app than the actual subject.

accessing activities for two kids in 10 different places with links to other pages. A one-pager with an itinerary for the day (including links and directions) would be ideal.

Accessing the zoom information for o keep is confusing. The times/teachers are wrong and change, which causes confusion. The times of the meetings change day to day instead of having a consistent time each day. Meetings scheduled during meal times makes attendance challenging.

Accountability for the work being done. Will the students that are putting forth quite a bit of effort and quality work see a reflection of that? Specifically on end of year reporting.

Actual recorded lessons from teachers would be great, along with daily homework.

Add the pledge of allegiance to morning messages from the principal. (And keep the joke of the day!)

Adding responses to SeeSaw has been tricky. Sometimes we are able to respond directly within the assignment and other times we have had a to create a separate entry. Also, it would be nice if the SeeSaw assignments can be pushed out the night before instead of 8 am. It helps to plan my day and since my children are up so early, they can get a lot of work done before 8 am. They also have my full attention before I start my work day.

Adult support has been needed to get zoom calls working for my grade 2 and occasionally for my grade 6. I think it's tech difficulties for grade 6. Grade 2 is clueless.

After navigating a few of these zoom calls, I have a suggestion... Is there an easy way for the zoom links to be put into Seesaw class? They are currently in a google doc but I don't have any easy way to click and then open on the family ipad my son is using (he's in K.) I have both Seesaw Class and Zoom apps on the ipad so I think if they are sent in Seesaw, it should launch the Zoom app without having to enter in all the meeting IDs and passwords. Also, can teachers be consistent with sending meeting numbers, passwords and links? Thanks!

All daily assignments need some sort of check list for the kids to confirm that they did and submitted the work. Very hard and confusing to follow up and make sure it all got done.

All information for activities, plans, zoom meetings, should all be one place. We are checking the website for plans, Okeep info is in an email, some zoom meetings from core teachers are in different emails and on the website. Some zoom meetings from specials teachers are in a different spot. Some times have not been as listed. I feel like we're having to check 4-5 places every day to make sure we're getting everything done. It would be so much more helpful if everything was in one place. All lesson plans, links, and zoom meeting info should be listed in one place that is easy to access on the website.

All this tech time is tough on my daughter's brain. I think we should always offer paper copies of any books, to ease screen time.

All your hard work is much appreciated.

Also love the teachers lessons being recorded and posted on seesaw. Thank you!

Also:

- 1) It would be so helpful to get the weekly learning plan on the main school page every week with the same links (unless this is too much for the teachers to do). I do not search my child's iPads for their assignments, but would love to be more in the loop about what their expectations are.
- 2) Both my kiddos have IEP, so I would love to get the instructional support learning plan each week as well
- 3) I REALLY appreciate the recommended additional IXL practices outlined by the teachers each week. I have gone on Squirrel in the past & looked over the common core area. First of all, there are no dates listed—just "week 1, week 2, etc", so unless I go back to my kiddos' iPad & see what they are actually doing, or if I go to the school calendar & start to count the weeks, I am not sure which week/topic to look at. THEN, there are like 10 different choices for IXL, Kahn, maybe others... I don't know which one to chose, and my child will go nuts if I ask him/her to do all. I like that the teacher is specific about the several extra practice sites to use every week. It is clearer than trying to choose on Squirrel.

Although the zoom calls are a great way for students to see the teacher and classmates, they took up a lot of time. Would be good to either cut back on amount of days or amount of time for each call. Our calls lasted on average 45 min. In the plan it was supposed to take 15 min. I realize they are not required, but it's difficult to make my child hang up the call mid-way through.

Amazing job given the circumstances and so little time to prepare!

Are kids with IEPs getting their service minutes? I don't think they are getting the attention they normally would be.

Are the various teachers scheduling their zoom meetings with each other? Today there are two back to back.

Are there options available for parents to help their children to catch up based on where they were supposed to be per common core?

As 2 working from home parents with 3 children at different schools, I don't know how long we can maintain this pace of remote learning, definitely not 6-7 additional weeks. My child's engagement in class activities is waning and my job's workload has significantly increased. I have less and less time to keep him on task and completing quality work. The executive functioning skills he has always lacked as a student are significantly spotlighted in this format of learning. It's frustrating for him to try to organize all his digital work and he often gives up. This reliance on only electronics for finding assignments in multiple places, sending lessons via google classroom (or other) and completing/submitting work is a poor way to teach. I really do believe he's not vested in it or making progress with learning. The gap between him and his peers is only growing with this format. I realize the district has little options, but the continual barrage of assignments and expectations in these circumstances is overwhelming and deepening the spread between the haves and have nots. Slow it down for everyone! AND why is D99 having less remote learning days than 58?

As a family, we are learning to adjust to the new normal. Balancing our own jobs, as my husband and I now work from home, and supporting the kids with their elearning is a lot, but we are managing. I know we are not the only ones in this boat, and appreciate the flexibility to get the kids' work done throughout the day as we can.

as a parent I need to see what was assigned and if my kiddo has completed it - this info needs to be posted in a timely manner. I would also like to see recorded lesson options. Perhaps this is something of a team teaching thing - but this would be nice. Perhaps the zoom lessons, but also additional.

As a parent WFH, we are trying to do the best that we can. 90 minutes per day seems like nothing when they used to be in school for 7 hours. There should maybe be some 1:1 sessions (like 15 minutes of led teaching with the teacher and student). The work is minimal and I think the kids are likely falling behind in what they should be learning now.

As a school administrator I am so impressed and thankful for all that you are doing. THANK YOU! I personally know how difficult this all is for teachers and admin. You all are doing a great job. Thank you for supporting our students and being class acts. It is appreciated.

As an elementary teacher in a neighboring district, I understand that instruction/classwork must be provided digitally. However we are not on board with allowing the amount of screen time that it would take our daughter to complete all the assignments she's giving each day. We are finding that even with diligent work and five minute breaks sprinkled between each subject, that completing the amount of work assigned would take well over the ISBE suggested amount.

As I said in a previous survey, I preferred the curriculum for both morning Kindergarten and OKEEP from the first two weeks that the students were out of school. The transition from classroom to home was much smoother, and the two areas of study meshed better. It was easier to see the connections. I just found the teacher based/school based curriculum better. I am concerned about the amount of repeat activities that I have seen in this week's and last week's OKEEP Tic Tac Toe Board. I'm just not sure that at this time the e-learning for OKEEP is sufficient enough to justify the tuition cost. The first 2 weeks of OKEEP (March) the students had a reading/writing assignment, Sight Word work, a Math activity, and they still had to complete 3 Tic Tac Toe activities of varying involvement. I feel that should still be the expectation. I know that with the time constraints it is probably not feasible, but is there a way in the future to bring the district's vision more inline with the individual teacher's vision?

As long as the process stays consistent, we can get by. Having a 1st grader and Kindergartener, I am constantly going back and forth to help with explain and check assignments, so any changes to the "routine" throw off the flow and makes it difficult.

As much as my child needs to be in school its been kinda of difficult. Due my son being in special education

As noted in my previous response, my husband and I both work full-time and are also working remotely during this time. We both have empathetic employers who are also flexible with us. That being said, our preschooler who attends Grove is not getting the support he needs from us. We are connecting in other ways as a family and working on our social-emotional behavior all around during this time, but from the pre-school perspective, we are definitely much less engaged. There are only so many hours in the day, so whatever time my husband and I are able to dedicate to assisting with e-learning has been spent with our 1st and 4th graders. As for the workload in 1st and 4th grade - I am being very honest when I say there has been little to no time spent on the "specials" like art, gym, and music. I feel bad about this because I know the teachers have poured so much time and energy into developing e-learning opportunities and while I appreciate that, it is just not realistic that we are able to get to that work right now. We are still getting outside and playing = gym and listening to music and coloring and using our imagination, but we are not doing it within the framework provided by the specials teachers.

Also, this could very well be a user error, but having three children who all use Seesaw to access their learning has proved to be very difficult as a parent to follow along. It is hard to sort and separate each child's information, the teachers' responses, zoom call information. It is in one long feed and overwhelming to organize, follow, etc. I don't know what the answer is here, but really, there just aren't enough hours in the day to keep it all straight and do it all justice or do it all well.

Sincerely, thank you for everything you are all doing. This cannot be easy from your side of the fence either, and I appreciate your effort, your care and your support. We will get through this. Thank you!!!

As the weeks progress it is getting increasingly challenging to keep them on task. I feel like a drill sargeant in my own home. Since I know that the teachers consider this time of 'e-learning' to be a wash academically can you please, for the love of God, shorten this school year!!!!!!?????

As this is challenging on both ends, our family struggles with assignments in different areas, seesaw, other links, etc...

As time went on and we learned the platform of how each teacher is sending their work it has become easier. It would be nice if accessing assignments were done the same way for all teachers instead of as per designer by teacher. But we've made it work and think we have figured out how to accomplish "school" daily. I should include I have an 8th grader who is completely independent and has had no issue. My 7th grader has an IEP and requires assistance with accomplishing day to day elearning. He has caught on after these 2 weeks so it's gotten better.

Assigned work should be all in one place, there are too many places to look for work.

Assignments are hard to find because the pages were printed on front and back of each page which was not communicated to the teacher. The page numbers are also not copied to most of the pages which makes it difficult to find assignments.

Assignments for specials are not located in the same place as classroom work. This makes it easy for my child to "miss" the assignment. The most useful tool has been video instruction.

Assignments need to be loaded into the website before Sunday afternoon for the week (only had an issue with one teacher)

Assignments should be in ONE location or application clearly outlined. Assignments have not been clearly labeled and almost impossible to find.

Assumptions that all families have unlimited access and privilege to wealth & resources, including internet and technology. Not enough shared from the District and Principal leadership about the social, emotional, psychological well-being of the children and their families during a global pandemic. Where is the sharing of wellness and wellbeing, aside from directing families to CDC and IDPH? The children are grieving and the District is not addressing that.

Too much dependency, against American Academy of Pediatrics recommendations, for young children to be dependent on iPads/screen time. Systemic bias for upperclass, dual-income, White families. Where is evidence of gender and racial inclusion curriculum? All characters, images seem to be White males. Where are the girls and other cultures/races?

At least, it is clear that Mrs. least is carrying the load for the 5th grade. Our child did not realize that you could not use the word "gonna" in a paragraph. Mrs. the teacher assigned, never corrected the error. I believe our child will improve significantly under our supervision in both ela and math.

At the jr. high level, if a teacher does send an email, maybe have him/her identify which class they are from. Because we have multiple students in the schools, I sometimes see the teacher's name but don't know which class it is for.

At the Kindergarten level, there it is so parent led as far as pulling up the activities and guiding her through it all. The feedback on it as far as keeping up connection with the classroom community is great. But I feel it is lacking as far as constructive individualized feedback.

At the 3rd grade level, in these unique circumstances, having a short individualized/small group zoom meeting would feel more meaningful in providing instruction and feedback on assignments.

At the middle school when the teachers just put in check the website or check google classroom, it is NOT helpful to parents. At least posting the time of a zoom meeting and the assignment to be completed would be helpful. The student can then check those other places for specifics and directions.

At times it's hard to do activities as we do not own a computer.

Bad links that don't work, missing passwords and user names, lots of technoligical hiccups.

Because my student is an independent worker, I have very little first hand knowledge in what new standards my child is learning. My child is engaged in their work and I believe is being diligent with doing it. Every night, we create a "to do" list and print it out so we know what we have to work on the next day. I ask, because I don't know, but if a student is submitting things that are incorrect, do they receive notice that it is wrong and follow up? I'm not saying that isn't happening, I don't know. When a parent asks a kid how they are doing and how elearning is going, a kid typically answers "fine". Bare minimum answer with no deep content or context to answer the question. :) Thank you for all you are doing during this incredibly difficult time. I understand creating videos and alternative lesson plans has been difficult in the absence of face to face instruction. I understand the school is trying to support a wide range of learners, but in the areas of math and reading, perhaps teachers could provide links to supplemental resources in case parents want to do a little more than the critical learning standards that need to be covered before the end of the year. Again, my child's teachers have been fantastic and our family is pleased overall.

Before spring break, both of my boys were receiving ample school work. School work that they would have to do during school. It was fabulous. Since spring break, they are receiving homework which is able to be done in no time ESPECIALLY at the junior high level. I am extremely disappointed with the small amount of homework is giving out right now. If this continues, these kids will not academically be ready for next year.

Block schedule does not work. Need more work and scheduled classes every day

Calendar is confusing

Can the district come up with an easier way for them to fill out worksheets, like a pdf? They have to type, re-size, and drag to complete worksheets and it takes so much extra time.

Can use some of the school supplies that haven't been used come back home.

Can we have some science and social studies?

Can you figure out a better way to format some worksheets on SeeSaw? My child spends a lot of time zooming in & out of worksheets to answer questions about reading - especially for math homework. Showing her work is hard and frustrating on SeeSaw. Maybe have one whole page per math problem. And thank you for the feedback survey. It's great you are doing these surveys!

Can you please put the "WEEK OF date", for example "Week of 4/13" somewhere at the top of the weekly plan assignment sheet??

Child is jealous about the A/B schedule of the middle schooler. I should have kept that secret ;-)

Child seems hesitant to attend office hours. Maybe encourage those more vs making it appear it's for those who need help. children should be connecting via zoom daily as if they are sitting in a classroom and hearing and seeing the teacher teach. Just putting up assignments is doing no good.

Children whom were in high level groups for math and reading are being ignored whilst kids in RTI and support groups are receiving modified additional instruction and supports- even small group time. Why are excelling students being forgotten about?

Why aren't small group zoom times being utilized?

Also why is a student teacher being allowed to lead a class right now when our kids are in crisis and need a veteran teacher?? Choir for the state is preferred to be on google classroom, or at least a reminder, instead of Showbie. With the A B days it is easy to miss or realize later.

Communication around assignments could be more streamlined. Website, emails, printed charts, seesaw and the packets is a lot to juggle to determine the work each day and would be great if it was more consolidated/clear. This is new for everyone so thank you for all you have done so far!

Communication Methods – Kudos to the IT department for getting the DG58.org link set up. I know what it takes to pull this all together and as quickly as they did is fantastic! Now that we have a process established can we please make some improvements?

1. PLEASE PLEASE post the OKEEP link / instructions on the website? Why does it have to be a separate email? Why do I have to go to the website for part of Kindergarten and then to my email for the other part? Everyday, I have to log into my email on my child's IPAD, go find the email to the link and then follow the link. Then after my child has completed the activities (watching the video's, etc) I have to sign out of my email off their IPAD. Why can't you just make the link on DG58.org? Keep it all in one place? If it is a matter of the District not wanting non-OKEEP parents to get the activities then password protect the file with a consistent password. Don't make things more complicated for us.

Zoom meetings -

- 1. Is it possible to have a full calendar on the website of all the Zoom meetings? Including specials and OKEEP.
- 2. Zoom meetings should be used as an educational teaching opportunity.
- 3. In the event that the zoom meeting has to have a meeting ID and password please ask the teachers to assign a generic password that is always the same. Maybe it should be the same across the entire school. For example: for Kindergarten they always uses the color "blue". Maybe all the teacher's use Puffer or something.
- 4. For the teachers who do not assign a Meeting ID and password please know that causes issues for some families. For example: My child uses the school IPad. The IPAD battery died. I tried to let my child Zoom off my phone, but the teacher ONLY posts the Link to the Zoom meeting minutes before the actual Zoom meeting. Since I cannot sign onto my children's Seesaw account on my phone or home computer (don't have user name and password) I was not able to pull up the link to the meeting. It would have been fine if the teacher did it the same way as Kindergarten.

Communications sent need to be more concise and easier to follow.

Concerned my 4th grader who is doing 5th grade math is not getting enough assignments during the week. Not much math at all.

condensing the places to look for Kindergarten material would cut down on lost time spent looking/downloading/printing/syncing to gather homework materials.

Consistency across the classes isn't great - some have new lessons (which are recorded and the student can review as many times as needed) and some just say "read book". I appreciate the teachers who have put in an effort to continue lessons and move forward with providing content that helps students to grow.

Continue to provide teachers with planning days so that they can continue to develop quality instruction and meaningful lessons. We know how challenging eLearning is and the teachers have done an excellent job thus far and we want that to continue.

Continue whith the learning and some extra exercises that help the student.

Continue with posting the schedule a week at a time. Also love the daily Zoom calls to check in!

Continued updates as to whether the return to school date will remain May 1

Could additional and more challenging assignments be given to accelerated learners? My child was in a "challenge" math small group and he/she got more challenging assignments. The assignments he/she's given now are very easy for him/her.

CPS schools actually have teachers teaching the students through e-learning. Makes more sense to me.

Curious if our child was previously meeting with the counselor for small groups, will this be implemented during e-learning? Daily announcements to the parent's email is too much

Determine a platform for all to use where for each child a general schedule is aggregated for the day. For some grades, going to 3 or 4 different spots to find plans, zoom call schedules, videos, etc. can be maddening a difficult to navigate. Having specials teachers do everything through home room teachers would also be easier (ie, art, gym, music, library).

Difficult for the young students to modify. Would like easier print options.

Discontinue the approach of multiple Zoom meetings per day per classroom.

Do not limit one response per child as divorced families with 50/50 custody both need to provide input

Do not schedule Zoom homeroom meetings in the evening hours or only do it once a week.

Documents in seesaw are difficult to edit. Spend a lot of time trying to learn/understand seesaw. Cant we get copies of documents to complete with weekly plan

Doing work for PE seems to be an unnecessary part of this. I think that can be left up to parent to make sure their kids are up and moving. PE work just seems like a throw in that doesn't add anything to the elearning.

's engagement has been mixed with our 3rd grader. I'm not sure if the technology challenges are the root cause or if there are other issues at play. We have tried to approach the situation with compassion, understanding that this is hard on the teachers too. However, this has been really challenging for my son, and he is somewhat depressed as a result. That sense of community really isn't being supported by his teacher right now. Zoom meetings are infrequent. Assignments have been insufficient for the day and often hard to find if they are available at all. There is very little communication to the parents. It seems recently that other teachers have been helping out, which is wonderful. I feel that my son's growth is really hindered right now as a result.

Dump zoom. Took many security risks. Also teachers need robust collaboration tools like file sharing, white board, etc. Why this scenario wasnt planned out years ago is just dumb. Since we both can agree this isn't working to well, just cancel school like New York.

During today's SEL zoom meeting some students said the amount of work was too much so the teacher said she would reduce the assignment even though for my son it had been the right amount. I know it is very hard to gauge with everyone working separately but I want to ensure the kids are working to their capacities. I am so grateful for all the effort to make it work well for the different students. Your work is so hard and I am so glad we have such dedicated staff! Thank you for adjusting through these changes.

E-learning is going very well for my son. I don't have any complaints about it

E-Learning just does not seem sustainable. ESPECIALLY with three kids, with three different curriculum/activity schedules. The estimated amount of time per assignment is just NOT possible. 20 Minutes for my second grader to complete a simple "Compare and contrast" activity, is easily and HOUR, because I have 2 other kids that are interrupting that 20 minutes and extending it into an hour. I wish we would just call off the school year and call this "Summer." There would be way less stress. BUT, IF we have to continue trying e-learning, my #1 request is: PLEASE PLEASE PLEASE structure in more PAPER WORKSHEETS or benchmark booklets or worksheets!!!!!!!!!!!! Toggling between websites, setting up split screens for all of my kids all at the same time IS MADDENING. I LOVE AND RESPECT OUR TEACHERS and they are working SO HARD to keep things "normal" for us, while simultaneously managing E-learning for their children!! This is not their fault. Keeping my kids on task, focused, not fighting, out of the pantry, etc etc and managing all of the current stressors of life while setting up the iPads, websites, youtube videos, split screens etc of E-learning is all just not adding up. Sorry to report my frustration but, I'm just SAD and SO disappointed with 2020.

Each teacher communicates differently and I get that. but it's also confusing as a parent. (we have 3 kids - 3 very different ways that info is coming to us) Our kids are old enough to follow it independently so it's working out; but i could see younger family's struggling.

I'd like to see more advancement of learning vs just review of already learned material. Maybe a 'live' class via Zoom? Or teachers put out videos of them teaching a new concept that the kids can watch and send in questions if they have any.

Elearning is MUCH easier for those older kids but for younger kids it's a nightmare. They require constant supervision to get anything done while the parent is trying to work. It may say 90 minutes but in reality it can take hours.

Entire class zoom sessions are not productive and my children don't even want to check into them. My 6th grader has small group lessons and those have been beneficial.

Also due to time constraints and my work schedule, we are choosing not to complete the "specials"-art, gym, music lessons. They are very appropriate and the teacher did a good job making them but just a little too much.

It would also be helpful if the activities were posted in seesaw earlier (prior to 7:00). Even if the teachers are not available to help at that time.

Estimates of how long the task takes for 2nd graders is incorrect, takes much longer for some reading and writing assignments. Would love to have teacher led visual classes, that would help tremendously.

Everyone is doing a tremendous job so thank you for your tireless work in these uncharted waters!

Everyone is doing a wonderful job. Our school is handling this great.

Everyone is working so hard & we really appreciate it

Everything is going really well.

Extremely difficult to administer remote learning as a family with two working parents in essential jobs

Fabulous work! Thank you!

has done a superior job! Thank you for making this awful time less scary for our family.

Far too little learning; most other school districts in our area have zoom meeting where teachers teach--and not just read a story. If the kids were in school right now, they would have ~6 hours of learning every day, not 2 hours. Our school district is very behind as it is compared to Hinsdale, Naperville, etc and this will just put the kids further back. Parents will have to do a significant amount of supplementation to keep them on track. It would be nice to have more socialization planned with the kids actually communicating with each other, ie partner or group projects. That was they can also be interacting with other kids as well.

Find that teachers that post classroom assignments on Seesaw including parents made it easier for me to make sure my child completes and knows about activities.

Finding the assignments and the schedule for the Zoom calls is very confusing. I think this is especially true for Kindergarten and OKEEP. I have 3 children at PD so some days we have 7 Zoom calls. Another frustration is that sometimes the assignments are in seesaw,

then the assignments are also in the weekly remote learning plan, then you have to find the choice boards. I am constantly trying to find them on my computer, print them out, find the links, passwords for Zoom calls, etc. I am weekly checking with other Kinder moms to try and figure out what it going on. The packet in the mail is great, and I appreciate really having that. I know this is new for everyone, and I also realize the entire staff is working extremely hard. It's just hard to keep up as the location of assignments seems to keep changing week to week, and my children require assistance with all of their work. Overall, it seems like a lot to me. It is a lot to put on the parents. I work part time, and I can't imagine what people do if both parents work full time. I often do not get through all of the assignments. We RARELY get to any OKEEP work or any Specials.

First and foremost, thank you for all that you are doing. Teachers are really amazing at the state of the material is given, but students are expected to figure out. Online learning is more self motivated learning so the format is somewhat expected. Now maybe I am missing the bigger picture here so please do not take offense to my comment. Maybe my child is missing the directions at times? What are some tips for kids that don't advocate for themselves or kids who never ask any questions?

First grade points of contact at the far exceed what is necessary or helpful yet I feel I have to reach each. message. for fear I'll miss something that is new or wasn't already communicated several other times. There are original messages. Then subsequent daily reminders. Daily. Sometimes more than once. It's too much. Way too much. Weren't these teacher communications supposed to be reduced??

First off, thank you to all teachers for your hard work in creating these online lessons. My student is an independent worker and so as parents we have very little perspective on what learning standards my kid is working on. Every day, my student has ELA and Math assignments. However, there hasn't been any social studies OR science the last two weeks except for maybe one day each week alternating between science or social studies. (holocaust museum virtual tour one day) I understand that the district is trying to support all learners and every kid works at a different pace so those two hours of required work may be comprised of only a few subjects, but my student is not working 2 hours a day and wondering if perhaps having some social studies things to read or science video to watch may round out the instruction each day. Realizing we are only 7 days into the new elearning frontier, but certainly wanted to provide that feedback. Appreciate the zoom calls with homeroom to check in for SEL. They are nice. Understanding that there is a lot pushing and pulling on teachers and staff during this time, so thank you for your help, just hoping that as we all find our groove that perhaps those subjects could be added in to elearning.

First off, the district is putting forth a fantastic effort in these times and I am so grateful to have committed administrators and teachers. Thank you! The rest of my feedback is meant to be purely constructive/helpful. Regarding the feedback loops, they are great and make us parents feel valued and heard, so thank you for that. However, I think you should ask parents to take surveys for each child they have because the experiences between kids in different grades is drastically different. I think the 3rd grade workload is perfect and in line with what the district said it would be. It's also all done digitally which is helpful and keeps it easy to keep track of what's submitted and what's not (or needs revisions). This also allows teachers to give immediate feedback. The only thing I can suggest to enhance 3rd grade is teachers doing Zoom calls each day to teach the lessons (or some of the lessons). I think that would be engaging and appreciated by the kids/parents alike. The kindergarten workload seems to have exploded as of this week (week of April 13). The previous week was excellent and manageable though. The main difference is the worksheet packets sent home for regular kindergarten and OKEEP. They are cumbersome. and hard to follow/keep organized in addition to the digital/Seesaw work. Also, the packets feel like busy work: worksheets for the sake of worksheets. I don't want to simply complain without suggestion though...perhaps teachers could host Zoom calls each afternoon to teach the OKEEP topics in a more engaging way? If the entire class on a call is too big perhaps small groups of 45 minutes each? My daughter has been in tears over filling out worksheets lately and I don't believe she is truly learning anything, just wants to get it over with. I think the specials teachers's Zoom calls for Kindergarten have been wonderful and elicit her total engagement/attention. Perhaps this can be duplicated for OKEEP engagement instead of a stack of worksheets each afternoon?

First we are all in this together and I understand it is unchartered territory. I love seeing the messages from teachers....brings tears to my eyes. I would like to see a catch up day during the 2nd half of April if possible. This extremely hard for working parents, trying to meet their 9-5 deadlines and submit school work by end of the day. Zoom meetings are great for kids to see everyone. With large class sizes though, they do lose interest with everyone talking at once. I would LOVE to see a teacher have smaller zoom calls so the kids can interact more (and maybe do some instruction.) The smaller calls don't even have to be every day. Once or twice a week maybe. I'm suggesting this because I believe the kids are at a point where they are sick of mom and dad and REALLY miss their teachers (I've been told I'm not the teacher and she wants them back to learn.) A 20 min zoom lesson could do wonders for the attitudes/motivation.

First, these questions are not the right questions. They do not access the goal and do not give any feedback worth acting on.

Example: The volume of communication is a non valuable question. Who cares about the volume? Is the communication easy to understand and complete. No. It is not. That is just one example.

There is one goal. Is the child learning and is the child improving. The answer to that is no. The learning experience has been awful. It is providing more frustration then education.

I highly recommend a pause, reset and think of the goal. Plan on how to move each student forward and organize much better. Basing it on time doing learning is a non starter. Base it on outcome.

The teachers are not being properly supported and the technology use is well below acceptable.

First, this survey is so narrowly defined that it demands a response that's hardly accurate to our experience and forces a narrative that does not reflect reality. For example, the question asking feedback based on "targets" is misleading ... because I think, too, the "targets" are unacceptable. Just because the State mandates a bare minimum does not necessarily mean our District must also cater to lowest common denominator. My daughter is bored and unchallenged. She feels her teachers are resigned already ... in part, because they are literally working toward retirement and she feels unseen. She's done with her work sometimes before my second cup of coffee, around 10:30 a.m. She feels her teachers are giving up because they can. She is a student who loves learning and it's depressing to see her yearn for more from those who might see and otherwise encourage her. My 10-year old son, on the other hand, is video conferencing with teachers from 8:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. Yes, he attends a private school. And yes, he is gifted. But my daughter is also bright and she's rather articulate about the District failing her expectations because it's allowed. The disparity in learning in our home is great.

We own a business — it is shuttered. Like many families, we are stressed and working out new normals too. Still, that is not an excuse for our District to cater to parent expectations (if overwhelmed for whatever reason) at the expense of those who matter most: our students. The District is responsible for teaching and giving its best. Taxpayers expect it. We expect it. Our community stakes its reputation on it. And students, like my daughter, feel we're all failing ...

Fix this. Parents work, what am I paying for

Flexibility, if a child struggles with a concept and knowing both parents may also be working full time. Please provide some clarification if the content, particularly for older grades, will be covered once school starts up again. Also, will there be an early start to catch kids up? For instance, August 1st start to recap content from the last trimester of this school year. Thank you.

Focus learning to basic materials necessary for the future (skip things like "if you were a super hero, what would your super power be? with a one word answer needed) AND provide access to be able to print resources off iPad to home printers.

For 3rd graders there needs to be more actual instruction. A 30min zoom meeting to touch base is not working. There should be a 15-20min instruction per subject to get them started. CPS is actually instructing on zoom calls throughout the day. Assignments go back and forth because they are having a hard time following directions and then they get frustrated. I know we are all frustrated but at this young age you cant expect them to be able to do everything online without actual instruction. An audio of what to do isnt working.

For 6th graders, I feel like the amount of workload could be increased. My child would benefit from more engagement so she is ready for middle school.

For elementary school math it seems no new lessons are being taught.

For junior high some days there is much less than other days. More consistency would be an improvement.

For math, more specific learning objectives, timelines, etc. In the younger grades, it doesn't seem as though there is a plan to learn anything new.

For my 2nd grader, what is still challenging and frustrating: the teachers must be timing the estimated minutes to complete tasks based on their own reading level. There is not a chance the estimated minutes the teachers are estimating for each assignment is what is actually happening. I was initially encouraged by the guidance for a 2nd grader to spend ~90 minutes on e learning. While the daily work now is taking slightly less time than pre-spring break remote work, is still WELL OVER 90 minutes of learning time. Easily more than double that. Also. Now that the lessons are published for the week, teachers cannot be making changes to the schedule or lessons or directions on the google doc and expect parents to find the changes on their own. This week, the 2nd grade lesson included a fun math game for Friday. Which was puzzling anyway because I read in the April 6th communication that 4/17 was a teacher prep day. Somehow the teachers were unclear on that which is beyond me. Anyway, my son was excited for the math game and so we went to log in this morning and it had been changed on the google doc and instead took place yesterday, with no communication on the change to parents. The amount of parent intervention to manage through everything for this grade level is still very high. Navigating login issues, incorrect pins being provided, etc is so frustrating. It feels like the teachers are not in touch with how this is actually coming to life in the home of a 2nd grader and their parents. I am not having issues with my 4th grader's e-learning but those 2 extra years of maturity and responsibility between 2nd & 4th grade make a HUGE difference.

For my independent workers, I'm hoping that the teachers will reach out with feedback if the work that is handed in is unsatisfactory/could be done with more effort.

For new content, such as math, continue videos from teacher explaining problems.

for parents still going into work or work from home 5 day a week of E learning is intense. Some difficulty using seesaw app, getting worksheets emailed from the teacher worked nicely.

For kindergarten, I wish there was one spot to access everything: zoom codes, all links, and OKEEP together. I also wish that in addition to zoom calls, there were some pre-recorded teaching segments the kids could watch at any point during the day with a directed activity to work on. Thank you!

For Pre-K I think Grove is doing well

Communicating and not overloading. There are a lot of email notifications coming though from seesaw but that may something each parent chooses to modify.

For the 1st grade packets that were mailed home, I was saddened to see the district spend \$8.25 each to mail them. These are neighborhood schools, and everyone has more time these days. Have a no contact pick up table sitting outside the school and a drive up, 1 family at a time out-of-the-car rule. That was a cost that could have been avoided or lessened by only mailing those who didn't pick up. Quick math on that district wide is an alarming total, especially if done for kindergarten too.

For Teacher zoom meetings, I think it's great that the teachers are using this platform, and we understand everyone is working at home with their families now. We all have to have flexibility. However, I think it's important that the teachers try to set aside time from their own families to give their class dedicated time. And-another idea discussed amongst parents has been to divide the class in 2. Would make zoom meetings less chaotic, than when you're trying to have 26 kids participate at once. A great opportunity to cut our already large class and have 2 shorter, more interactive, zoom meetings.

Overall thank you ALL for what you're doing to support our kids and families. It's been a great experience and we appreciate it very much.

For the younger students it would be helpful if all the items they need to access were linked in one place that they can easily access themselves on their ipad. Needing to login to the website to click links through the google doc is difficult for working parents. Please keep the google doc with all assignments though. It is helpful to print and let them check off as they go.

From what I have heard, Math is tough for my child when not in class learning. I cannot guarantee that my child is asking teacher to help further or relying on friends to work it out. I appreciate the efforts made by all teachers and staff to be available for the students. I am not getting too involved because I feel an 8th grader who is a solid student should be able to handle this independently like he has been doing with school for years now. I hope that if he is not doing his work that a teacher would contact us about it. Actually, he just mentioned that he missed something and his teacher emailed him. As much as we appreciate a routine, sleep schedules are not normal for so many reasons. It would be great to have the entire day to complete work.

Getting access to books or other free reading resources without free trial gimmicks would be nice.

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Given a lot of the learning is becoming more independent and self guided, tasks and activities take longer than they would typically in a classroom setting. This can be frustrating for my student, as additional efforts are required and it makes him feel like he is not able to perform.

Given the technology available, there should be more actual teaching occurring. It seems the Zoom meetings are more about socializing (which is important) versus providing a lesson. There could also be more instruction--I'm not sure why there is so little. I would expect the school days to be similar to "normal" schools days, just taught remotely versus on-site.

Going from a google doc, then to seesaw, then to a clever app, then to an internal thing on the clever app, then to benchmarks, then back again has been super frustrating. Prior to Spring Break everything our child needed to accomplish was listed on Seesaw. Then after Spring break, we had to relearn an entirely different system, and had apps that didn't work, passwords that couldn't be found, and frustration from both of my children on what and how they were supposed to access information. When their learning requirements were all listed on Seesaw it made for ONE location to find everything they need. Now we are going back and forth between at least 4-8 different learning platforms throughout the day. The 90 minutes of learning is taken up mostly by finding the app, figuring out how to log in going back to a google doc, then going onto Seesaw, then.... you get the picture. Please consider putting all assignments back onto seesaw into ONE unified space. This google doc thing is super annoying both for the students as well as the parents who are also tryng to work during this pandemic. Thank you!

Hard to tell if just refreshing what already learned or advancing to new topics. Could definitely use another hour or two of work to keep occupied throughout the day, at least as optional (as I realize not all kids/families can handle)

Have the teachers open a zoom meeting and keep it open throughout the day... or from 8-2 as if they were in class. This way, when kids have issues, they can reach out to their teachers rather than parents, who are trying to work from home. The teachers can also provide live instructions for their assignments to their classes rather than sending instructional videos. This way, if kids have questions they can ask their teachers.

Having a checklist from the teacher is very helpful for the parents.

Having a child with special needs, all his teachers and therapists have been wonderful with checking-in and making sure we are doing well.

Having a Zoom meeting every day keeps my child engaged and connected.

Having all information (including zoom meetings and OKEEP) available in the weekly agenda would be helpful. I don't have the bandwidth to chase things down. One file, all the plans for the week.

Having all links in one place, some links are in Google Doc weekly plan and some are in Seesaw, which makes it difficult for students to find independently.

Having links available on seesaw is helpful. Not all the teachers are making them avail e on seesaw.

Spelling tests for 1st grade should be implemented. My 4th grader used to have math worksheets come home and I feel this would be beneficial to continue/ improve aptitude. Reading logs should be required and sent from the teachers and be turned in via Seesaw weekly.

Overall, the amount of work & assignments is a little light for 4th grade. There is no science work assigned for 4th grade, which is a huge miss. Science needs to be taught, not just reading, writing and math... First grade work quantity is good. I would like to see the quantity of art & music assignments increase to 2x week. Thank you for implementing the survey.

How can I assess whether my child is hitting the target? I cannot always watch what she is doing; therefore, I don't know what she is actually learning.

How do we encourage more time learning virtually?

How is the full day kindergarten time expectations (120 min) the same as 3-6 graders and less than 1-2 graders? It's too much and the amount of work given takes far longer than that even.

I am a bit surprised there isn't more teaching through zoom. This might be because of access I don't know I was just surprised that they didn't do more of a classroom setting.

I am a little worried that there is too much pressure on the teachers to provide the same level of rigor and instruction they do in the classroom. These are unique unprecedented times as a parent I do not expect my child to engage in the same amount of rich learning experiences he does when he is in school. I am okay, and would prefer, adjusting the standards and expectations during remote learning. I think it would be great if a few things were prioritized each day rather than trying to get all of the learning in that happens during normal school. It is not possible and not realistic. Please adjust the level of expectations for teachers and in turn for students.

I am a teacher, and my district give my students a reading/enrichment day every Monday. This is a day when the students can get caught up on any missing assignments, and if they are already caught up, the teachers post "optional" assignments they could complete to continue working on their skills. In addition, it gives the teachers a day to work on their planning for elearning and to get caught up on grading. I think it would be a really good idea for District 58 to have enrichment days every Friday. This could be a day when the kids could wrap up any assignments and complete their work for their specials. We are struggling to fit in the the gym, music, art and library assignments, so to have a day designated to completing them, would be great. That way, the classroom teachers wouldn't necessarily need to post "optional" work for the kids, but it would be understood that Fridays are the days for kids to complete their specials assignments. Plus, it would give the kids a slightly more "fun" Friday.

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I am beyond impressed! Keep up the great work!

I am concerned that there is NO teaching taking place. All we receive are assignments. I know other districts have the teachers teaching new concepts two to three times a week. I think some children get Math instruction from the teacher, but my child does not have math with the classroom teacher and so my child has had NO math instruction. The Zoom times I've listened in on are really just small talk about what everyone is doing at home - they are a waste of time.

I am DREADING 5 days of remote learning next week. This is too much! I really feel it should be 3 days a week or every other day. My children are starting to get annoyed with their parents telling them what to do every waking hour. I fully expect some full on break downs next week because of the 5 days of remote learning.

While most of the information was easy to access through the schools website site, all of it wasn't. My son is in the OKEEP program and was late to his first music Zoom meeting (and I believe half of the kids missed the meeting) because the information for this meeting was hard to find. It was in an email from Mr Sisul (that only my wife recieved), you then had to then click on a link there and then one more link to find the meeting number. I feel the hosts of the meeting should have sent another message with that information. It was buried in the information.

I am happy with the lessons for my fourth grader Especially now that they incorporated lessons into videosbut the lessons for my second grader require too much parental assistance which is difficult with working parents there needs to be activity so they can do on their own without adult support

I am impressed with the remote learning plans and think the teachers have done a great job! Thank you for all of your hard work!!

I am incredibly frustrated with lack of work my 8th grader has. He is typically finished with his work within 60-90 minutes. This does not mirror the expectation that has been set forth by the district. I have great concerns about readiness for high school if he is only going to have 60-90 minutes of academic engagement per day.

I am not sure if the amount of learning they are getting at the present time will keep them up to date with educational standards.

I am really not sure my child is learning anything. As a working parent, it's really challenging to have to spend a couple of hours every day just making sure she knows what's going on and reviewing all of the material.

I am still very confused about specials, as was my child's teacher when asked for clarification. Teachers are doing a wonderful job though! Impressed with your planning and the teacher implementation. Thanks for your hard work.

I am very disappointed by the number of hoops we needed to jump through to receive a school issued iPad. We are on our 4th week of remote learning and we just received the proper device. I understand there is an increase in need for the devices right now but we are also required to fulfill assignments and if we're spending the time to complete assignments we want it to be meaningful and should be set up with the proper tools to do so. When a child receives math and reading intervention and all of those assignments are sent via seesaw why are they expected to use a home device? We do not have an ipad (which I indicated in the survey). We have fire tablets and laptops. These assignments could not be completed on those devices (especially when parents are also working and using home devices). So we had to complete assignments on an iphone and most of the assignments were illegible bc the screen is so tiny. It is very clear that a lot of time is spent on the making of copies, setting up zooms etc. but it feels like a hit and a miss when the devices were not distributed.

I understand that OKeep has been budgeted for but the children are no longer receiving the OKeep benefits so I am unsure as to why we are being required and emailed repeatedly to pay for it. They have PE and Music for 15 min once a week on zoom. The okeep choice boards can be found after a quick search on pinterest. This is a very challenging time for everyone and but I am not understanding the justification of having to continue to pay OKeep. The OKeep work is actually more challenging for families because it comes from a separate person and not through the teacher or worksheets. The choice boards can not be opened on a tablet or phone so we need to download the software to open the document and keep it handy to click on all of the links. A huge packet of OKeep choice boards arrived in the mail with no instruction and they are out of order. Why were they sent? Additionally there are links so I don't know why it was all mailed. There seems to be no rhyme or reason behind OKeep. .

I am very happy with the overall effort from all- the district, the principal, & the teachers, during this crazy time! Please send extra thanks to the teachers who have had to manipulate their teaching structure to take care of the kids! We will get through this! :)

I am watching my daughter become extremely frustrated with the length of time that each day's assignments are taking her. My daughter has been in tears multiple times each day. My daughter is spending 8-10 hours a day on her work! Yes, I am in firm belief that there is a learning curve to understanding where to find material, how to set it up on the teacher's part, and the length of time that it takes for one child to complete and assignment vs. another student's completion of the same material. I am not new to this. I am a professor of education specializing in reading. I teach teachers. I am also well aware of material that is given and the grade level that it truly belongs with. My daughter is not a low achieving student. My daughter is an A-B student. This work that I am frustrated about is piling up. I hope that as time moves on and the planning gets more in a groove for the teachers that the workload moves closer to the target timing. I hope that work is meaningful and purposeful with complete lessons to present the material.

I am more than willing to explain my thoughts and feelings if you feel the need to contact me, Dr. Russel or Mrs. Thank you asking parents to share our thoughts with you. I know that together we can all make this work to benefit everyone.

I am working full time and am not sitting next to my children while they are completing their work. I'm also not checking their progress or assignments constantly. I like they have activities to do, but I hope they won't be graded on this trimester.

I am worried that the HS teacher's will except 8th grade students to be at the point prior year incoming freshman students have been, and I believe the gap will be much wider than usual. How can we address this? Summer learning packets for students? Tutoring options available provided from the school?

I appreciate all the hard work going into these plans and videos by the teachers but it is a very challenging process for my son to learn from them. He has grown up watching more than one screen at a time and his focus wanders. He is not used to having to learn without the classroom interactions and that is stressful. It is a challenge to manage his time and keep focused to complete a task. He's trying to understand the material but there's little conversation and interaction to help it sink in. I also feel that although the schedule is better, it is still too much. It would be beneficial to have a catchup day each week. I feel like tomorrow is one for this week but there isn't one next week and that alone increases the stress level. We need to keep thinking about the fact that these kids are dealing with a trauma while trying to learn and that's in a household with 2 parents working from home and no illness let alone families who are dealing with separation and health issues. What is more important here? What message are we sending to these kids?

I appreciate how organized district 58 is! I feel we get the information in a timely manner and that it has been thought through carefully before being shared with families.

I appreciate that the district is still trying to provide for the kids' SE development. My son even told me last night he feels stressed as he's struggling with a lack of structure and schedule. He told me he feels bad if he's not doing something or doing too little of other things. I think this is actually anxiety over the uncertainty of the current situation and the novelty has worn off. I think the more consistent remote school days is helping, but I know he also just generally feels out of sorts (as many of us do). I simply wanted to share for another perspective.

I appreciate that the schools/district want the plans posted by Friday afternoon for the whole week but it actually makes it harder to plan because I print out the plans for the week and then things change throughout the week. I would appreciate it if there was a time (say 8pm the night before) where things could no longer be changed for the next day so then I could prep the night before. My husband and I are both essential workers and our high school babysitter can't provide as much guidance as is needed in terms of ensuring the kids are organized and ready to go. I check their work when I get home but they have now each missed a zoom call because of last minute changes. I understand that the calls aren't required but my kids look forward to them and I felt terrible when they missed them.

I appreciate the advance release of the e-learning schedule on Fridays. It allows me to plan my work schedule, and set expectations for my student. I like the format by subject by day with tasks and assignments clearly identified. It provides me a checklist at the end of every day to ensure my student has completed their work. I also feel the amount of work in each subject is a good level.

You've done a great job!

I appreciate the new weekly format of assignments and deliverables, and having everything in one place! I print off each of my children's schedule for them, and they love referring to it and crossing off what they have completed. It is a great tool for them to manage their time and understand their expectations and commitment.

I appreciate the teachers only send an e-mail to the parent if there is something urgent. Like my child didn't complete an assignment. At the beginning, I was overwhelmed with e-mails from the teachers. I appreciate all assignments are available for the students and parents to look up online.

I beg you to have the teachers do daily Zoom lessons. Not only does it allow my kindergartener to feel the social and emotional connection he so very NEEDS during this frightening time, but it also engages him in his learning and motivates him to do the work that is assigned daily. Two Zoom classes a week is not adequate. Teachers should be leading the students with daily Zoom lessons each morning to start their day and really could even do check out Zoom lessons to have students share their work and be proud of all they accomplished.

I can't keep track of where all of the various assignments are - 2 websites, seesaw, packets, email...it's all too much. I have spent way too much time trying to just figure out what we're doing each day, I wish there was some way the teachers could streamline this for us. It is also very difficult to have to oversee every second of schooling, I wish there was more autonomous work led by the teachers so the working parents could have some reprieve when the kids are supposed to be doing school work.

I can't handle all the different links. I don't want my child to suffer bc of me

I can't think of anything more than to express my appreciation to everyone who has stepped up and worked with tools in a way they never could have anticipated.

I cannot begin to thank the teachers enough for all they are doing. This is not easy. I know how hard they are working and we love them for it!!

I complete a survey earlier today but I wanted to add additional feedback. The 120 minutes for 3rd grade is not reflective of the time it takes to complete all the various videos and subsequent work assigned. The daily workload is fine, but 3.5-4.5 is more realistic than 2 hrs. In addition, I have a comment on the Music curriculum. The videos for Music instruction for my son who is in 3rd grade are ridiculously juvenile and are better suited for a preschool level. There has to be a better program for Mrs.

to share with the students. This may be a curriculum issue, but in general, the song selection throughout the year does not seem to match up to the grade level. My son is singing songs he sang in preschool. The e-learning curriculum could be looked at and enhanced for the remainder of the year. Thank you!

I continue to be very impressed with the plans the teachers have put forth for their students.

I did this form one but forgot to mention that I honk it would be a great idea to have the kids group together and complete projects. They love zoom and I think it Would be cool if they could do a simple research project and present it to the class. It would give them something to do in their free time and allow them to chat with their friends while learning.

I do not know how to determine Progress. Is he completing everything? Some sort of progress check would be helpful.

I do not like the the workload for a K in OKEEP is more then a 1st and 2nd grader and the same as a 3rd grader....it is difficult to support our daughter with this amount of work everyday...some days we can other days are more difficult. I would think that about 15 - 20 extra minutes would be added for an OKEEP student so the workload would be around 75-80 minutes.

I do not think my child is getting enough learning in all subject matters and have seen little to no feedback on assignments

I do not think that Zoom office hours and Zoom homebases are necessary for middle school students. They are not really into "seeing" their students like younger elementary students are. My kids feel much more comfortable sending emails to teachers. Zoom for middle schoolers is awkward for the teachers and the students. It feels so forced. I also feel like it takes away from the students' day. Remote learning should be flexible. Now students are tied to joining a Zoom homebase that is not "required" but they feel bad if they don't go. And when they do go to the Zoom homebase, there are only 3-4 kids not even talking. It's just not worth it. Let the middle schoolers stay engaged with their assignments, and don't force them to "talk" to their teachers via Zoom. Thank you for listening!

I do think this is a good opportunity for the students to have a variety of ways of doing their assignments. Such as pictures making a video, opportunities to be far more creative than what the school room May provide. Having fun proves better focus and learning opportunities

I do truly feel like the teachers and district are doing the best they can, and overall e-learning for us has gone "ok". That being said we are not doing any of the OKeep activities at this point....I understand, especially since fees are not being returned, that content needs to be available, but the recommendation is 1 hr, which if you have a K student doing both their work and OKeep then they would have 2 hours of learning time, which is MORE than the recommended for the 2nd grade, for example. We are not doing anything with OKeep at this point; it's already too much of a fight to get my Kindergartner to do the required work, I can't make her do an additional hour and not have her hate school. I'm also not doing many specials, again, we can only do so much, and because we're home more we automatically doing more PE, art, music, etc. type activities. Again, I appreciate everyones effort; we just can only make our kids do so much.

I don't feel there enough support from the teacher. The needs of my child to review material can barely be met by this format and it is impossible to think she can learn something new. When I requested one-on-one from the teacher for support, she stated that she would address it in the next group zoom. I do not think this is satisfactory or acceptable.

I don't think the principals need to be sending out an email every day with morning announcements. Although they are cute, having that daily email is unnecessary.

I don't understand why the middle school is using an A/B schedule. If the kids were in school they'd have each class everyday. For example, having math 2-3 days/week doesn't seem right. The instructional time for the middle school could be increased. Otherwise the kids have little to do and they're just sitting on their phones all day.

I don't believe that 90 mins of e-learning is nearly enough to replicate a school day. While these are not normal circumstances, i believe that additional learning minutes and assignments would help kids stay motivated and on track to "keep going". The zoom meeting should also be trimmed down to perhaps 2 sessions of 20 mins each vs. 1 big meeting for 1 hour. I have noticed kids zone out of these as and when they are done talking. This would also give kids something to look forward to during the day.

Overall I believe a more structured day would help both the teacher and kids get more out of e-learning.

I don't know how this could be possible but more contact or feedback from teachers other than a like of students assignment posts would be helpful to my kids learning and connection to teacher. Also it appears most content is still review for at least math. Is this accurate? If so or either way more detailed info on how we will move thru rest of years new curriculum would be helpful. Thanks for all everyone is doing!!

I dont think of anything now.

I feel as though the assignments are very easy for my child. I would like to see more challenging assignments.

I feel I do t know what he's supposed to do, I have to rely on him showing me where stuff is located in the google classroom. The only way I know for sure their is a problem is when the teacher emails me saying work was not completed

I feel like 2 hours is not enough work. I know each family's situation is unique, and each child has their own pace and we of course have to think of the mental well being of everyone, but my daughter is done with the assigned work usually within 1 to 1 1/2 hour tops, then we are left bored trying to fill the rest of the day. I've even added on my own daily assignments to prolong it. Maybe teachers could add more "optional" work?

I feel like 2 hours is short of what she should be doing so I add on more time for reading and Kahn Academy. I'm worried test scores will fall short of the trajectory she was on. She generally finishes within 90 minutes.

I feel like it is very difficult to complete all of this work, work full time, be a parent, and manage a household all at the same time.

While my daughter seems to be flourishing with the 1:1 work, it is very challenging for my son to sit and complete the activities when he is experiencing a high level of anxiety with everything that is going on. It has caused fighting, tears, and frustration daily that makes it hard to function and difficult for him to learn.

There is a significant amount of adult assistance that both of the children require to Complete most of the activities. I think the teachers are doing a fantastic job working with what they can, The pages in the packet were sent double sided so it makes it much more confusing for us to use as we have to keep the back side of the other sheets for later. This needs to be more organized as it is way too much for 1st graders to do on their own.

I feel like it's going as well as it can in this situation. My kids are older though and the work and structure helps them from thinking about the scariness of all this. Please hold off announcing the cancel of school. Even if it's a thought.. Small bites helps more than the big one for depression and overwhelmingness.

I feel like the learning has not been nearly enough. I found it frustrating that before spring break teachers and students had the Thursday and Friday off. Then a full week off and then Kids has Monday off for planning. I don't understand why teachers weren't planning Thursday and Friday before spring break. I don't understand why teachers were given these days off and then needed time to plan. I don't mind they take a day to plan but I don't like the two days off before spring break is just extra vacation days — I don't feel like my tax dollars are at work. Just too much time with no schedule. Other districts are going to school Monday through Friday and our kids are going to to three days a week. Again I understand the need for planning but not just the extra days off.

I feel like there is a big discrepancy between teachers and elementary schools. I'm talking with other parents and the content of the calls is very different. There should be a set expectation as to what the zoom calls are to be used for. It's important that they have time to socialize with their class but it would also be nice to see some learning take place during the calls. An easy to print assignment/agenda would beneficial for the kids to have a check list. The one on the school website is hard to format for printing.

I feel more school learning should be done on zoom with there teacher.

I feel some actual zoom/face time between teachers and students would help a lot. My son could use some feedback from his teachers about if he's doing what's expected of him and how he can improve. Right now he's just "winging it" and waiting for grades to be posted.

I feel that in some situations, the instructions to complete assignments have been difficult for my students to understand. The intervention I have had mostly surrounds following assignment directions and teaching new concepts. Many videos linked that are intended to "teach" lessons have not worked.

I feel that the "extras" such as music, art, gym, library, could be eliminated during E-learning. My kids are already feeling overwhelmed with just trying to get their regular school work completed. It would be nice if these other nonessential subjects were left out for now.

I feel the amount of work is way too little. As parents we are trying to come up with additional tasks for our kids in the areas of reading, writing and math on a daily basis. Our children are spending less than 2 hours a day on school now. Previous to the virus they would be in school all day and then have an hour or two of homework. Please provide optional learning or guidance for parents that want to continue to see their kids stay on track. It would be particularly helpful for math if guidance were to be given as to what would be beneficial for kids to study on a weekly basis along with resources for teaching it and testing it at home. We've resorted to buying textbooks and workbooks off of Amazon and trying to pick and chose what is best for them to learn based on Common Core guidelines. Thank you.

I feel the current change this week was a HUGE improvement to what was done/expected the first 2 weeks- that was entirely too much. This is very manageable and the school is doing a terrific job! We also really appreciate the paper packets that were sent- writing on paper and using markers and crayons and pencils are so important! It also saves us from printing everything ourselves. Thank you all!!!!

I feel there is not enough e-learning. She is done by noon, and she is not learning anything. It seems to be just projects to keep her busy. I wish there were more Zoom classroom learning and not show your favorite thing. We could use new learning, as well as some quizzes. They don't even have text books.

I feel this is just giving them work to pass time.

I feel this is just handing out work to pass time.

I get that this is even harder for pre-k and the most teachers can do is guide the parents and give ideas.

I give thanks for your worries.

I had to put all the lessons into a spreadsheet and zoom meetings on my calendar. Have an option so that family lessons can be combined in an excel format or a checklist that students and teachers and parents can use to keep track of what is done. If like an option for zoom meetings to be able to be added to my calendar similar with other dg58 events.

I have 4 kids and all are IEPs. They all require significant supports while in school. My husband and I do not have the skills to begin to understand how to support them academically and e-learning is beyond a challenge. Their resource teachers are supportive its just not translating well when we as parents try to support the kids. We are also working all day so trying to get all 4 kids e-learning done at dinner time/before bed is not working. This is NOT a reflection on the work put in by the school or the eagerness to support them, its just a challenge we face as working parents with kids on IEPs that need significant interventions.

I have 4 kids grades 4-10, for 2 they have adapted and are doing well and for 2 this is a struggle and they need the in person instruction to thrive. I have no suggestions, just sharing my reality.

I have been disappointed in the relative lack of substantive instruction, the late and inadequate use of videoconferencing tools (even if only for social connection with the teachers), and the relatively primitive approach that our district/school has taken in comparison to other schools/districts. I think the expectations have been set entirely too low. I also do not see our teachers giving the 40 hours a week of effort that we should expect (and that they are being paid for). There have been far too many "days off" given that the "working days" are themselves so short and I do not think that the total prep for the e-learning that has occurred would take very long at all.

I have been extremely happy with our teacher () and how organized she has been. As well as how promptly she has returned emails and commented on my son's seesaw activities, including answering questions he has posted. We are also loving the morning announcements that the lowest is doing daily and the challenge/activity she mentions on the morning call. The class zoom calls have also been a HUGE hit with the kids and really connects them back to school. One issue we have been having is the specials. Those teachers don't seem to be online as much and have made projects a lot more complicated to find and do.

I have been incredibly impressed with district 58! Thank you so much for your organization and commitment to students.

I have concerns with Zoom safety as I've seen other schools have banned it.

I have concerns with zooms safety.

I have less frustration related to my 4th grader's e learning experience. The communications from his teacher and the 4th grade teacher team has been smooth and consistent from the get-go. I appreciate that some tasks feel like they've been "revised" to feel more authentic to the current situation. i.e. Writing assignment is focused on creating a daily journal about this time of history in the making. We approach all the "specials' (music, art, gym) as VERY OPTIONAL. If the topic or assignment interests him, he does it. If it doesn't I don't force it. Those areas are just not a priority for me right now and it's just not worth the battle in this environment. The kids have kept very active outside and with indoor activities my husband challenges them with so I'm not concerned with keeping up with gym class assignments.

I have read and seen that zoom isn't a secure application and that it has a lot of security vulnerabilities. Would want to know how the district makes sure that it is safe to use.

I have real concerns about the actual learning and advancement of the children's lessons. The assignments are too basic and take less time than expected. We are doing the supplemental work but it's not challenging just busy work.

Also work should take 2-3 hours a day, rather than 60-90 minutes. It can't possibly be enough to keep the kids moving forward in their education. It feels like the bare minimum to keep them status quo. It would be better to have longer more involved lessons with multiple steps that take longer to complete.

I expect more for our children and have been disappointed so far.

I have really appreciated the addition of the worksheets sent home. The ipad is all consuming at times so it is great to write in a real piece of paper!

I have seen very little communications from teachers on work that has been "turned in". How are teachers providing feedback on assignments? How do students know if their submitted work is acceptable or might need corrections? It is my understanding that work cannot be graded, but shouldn't there be some sort of acknowledgement that the work was submitted and reviewed? And whether or not it met expectations? Kids are submitting work through multiple platforms - seesaw, google classroom, flip grid, etc. How can we be sure the assignments have actually been submitted? And that the teacher has actually looked at it, reviewed it and accepted it? Are they only checking to see if it was submitted? Then only following up with students who DON'T submit? There should be an acknowledgment of work submitted and the quality of that work. In other words, meaningful feedback.

I know not each parent would want this but I think some feed back on what our children are turning in. Sometimes my kid turns things in before I can lay eyes on it and I worry it's not her best work.

I know some of the classes are large, but attaching a template or doc for assignments would help. This may be too much for the teachers, but it would alleviate a step for the kids

I know that grades don't count but this is definitely not the way my child learns best and I am concerned about how this will effect her in the future. I commend the district for their efforts.

I know the amount of work is within state guidelines, but I feel like there is so much being lost here. I wish there was more direct instruction time. Independent study is not really very effective.

I know the teachers are working hard, however my child prefers to print out the assignments and complete them. I think the SeeSaw app is nice, but it is hard to print out assignments or just navigate. There is the Student view, Teacher view and the Parent view. I know they set up a Google classroom, can the original assignment be uploaded there for easier access? The hardest part is just getting access to the assignment, so that my child can complete it.

I know this is hard to plan but it seems Unorganized. Since I need to help my child I have to look at the emails I get then look at their seesaw for additional information. It should be easier to access or it should be in one spot. Our teacher Mrs. has been helpful with answering any question and has been great during this time.

I like having the remote learning plans posted on the school's website, I just wish there was a way to access last week's as well.

I like seeing that the teachers always respond to my sons work. Keeps them accountable.

I like Seesaw, but I wonder if using Google classroom might be an easier platform for assignments. My older kids use it in middle school and high school.

I like that the kids are having Zoom calls to be able to see their teachers and their friends

I like that the specials are providing one lesson each week. The lessons from the teachers are more manageable than in March. Announcements from the principal has been nice.

I like the A/B schedule. It is manageable and predictable

I like the fact the 5th grade math teacher prepares a video lesson for math. I wish the teachers did more video lessons for the children instead of all the learning being done on apps.

I like the length of each assignment. My son is in pre-k and has a learning disability so he is a bit more challenging to consistently do activities and assignments while also helping my daughter (2nd) get through her assignments. But we manage somehow.

I like the mailed packets we do 3 sheets of writing and cutting a day. The yoga was fun. It's easier then learning suggestions on the calendar. It gives us focus we do the sheets, watch the seesaw videos and play a learning game. Great job! I'm seeing how ready for kindergarten my girls already are!

I like the summary of the work for the week, but would like to know exactly what time the zoom meetings are without having to go into separate links or into Google Classroom to find the times.

I would also like feedback on if the student has turned in their assignments or missed meetings.

I like to print the schedule at the beginning of the week for each child & check off as we go. Can everything just be included on district website by the start of the week so we don't have to keep checking district website daily? It's annoying yo have to keep checking it for multiple children in multiple grades.

I liked getting the plans and assignments from the teacher on her seesaw account. I also liked her format better- like sub plans. I liked it better when we checked the kids in in the morning.

I liked the kdg choice board we did for a week. It helped my son to know he had 3 activities to pick each day. I like the activities he's doing now because they're the same as what he'd be doing in the classroom but I did like the format of the choice board.

I love having the week's lesson plan on the school website, but if even more of the links could be placed on that document, it would be helpful. We specifically have had issues with accessing links to Google Slideshows with videos through Seesaw. Anything you can do to keep all assignments in one place would be appreciated. Great job to everyone, though, for pulling this off in such short time! My kids are lucky to have the support of such great teachers and staff!

I mentioned this to the teacher...it would be truly great if there could be a morning and an afternoon zoom call with the teacher. For my child at least, her attention is better when her teacher is talking. I don't know what that would look like. Maybe it could be 15 minute small group meetings throughout the week. 5-6 per group. It's all overwhelming and weird - this remote learning stuff. I know you all are doing your best and I appreciate that. And the fact that you are open to feedback is great. Keep your heads up and know I appreciate the hard work you all are putting in to make remote learning possible.

I preferred having the teacher email the lesson plan each week. The school website requires too many steps to get to the actual site and is often confusing to browse.

I preferred having the teacher email the lesson plan each week. The school website requires too many steps to get to the actual site and is often confusing to browse.

I preferred the curriculum model from the first (2) weeks that the students were out of school. I liked that the curriculum was teacher based/school based. I just think that it makes for a smoother transition from the classroom to home. Who has a better pulse on the classroom, the teacher or the district? I am also concerned that there is not yet a process in place to measure a student's learning once they have returned to school. As a parent that has managed to work with my child daily; including optional work and supplemental I don't necessarily want them sitting through weeks of material that has already been covered. I just want to make sure that the hard work the teachers, students, and parents are putting in is worth everyone's time. Finally, I understand the thought behind the SEL activities, but they should not take focus away from a child's academic progress.

I put just right for the amount of work because I'm sure the activities should take that amount of time, but we are just getting burnt out at home. Everything is dragged out with both parents working and helping and taking care of kids. As this quarantine gets longer and longer it is getting more difficult to continue this type of learning, but I'm not really sure what other options we have.

I realize it's state guidelines, but 6th grade students need (and can handle) more than 2 hours/day. They should've been included in the 7-8 grade guidelines. My 6th grader has been incredibly independent with his assignments, which I feel is a direct result of clear communications and expectations from the 6th grade teachers. My 6th grader was totally prepared to transition to remote learning (including being familiar with apps and how to use them) and I thank the teachers for that.

I realize the state mandate on daily hours of e learning is set, however I think our district has always set their bar above the state. If we could continue to receive supplemental(optional) assignments from our teachers, that would be great. Otherwise, I think it's been working out really well.

I really like the teachers even notifying parents of items that are due or past due.

I really want to know what each high school class would like them to know before they begin the respective class. For example, in his advanced math class at they are doing review. Will it be enough to get him ready for advanced math in high school?

I still don't understand why teachers cannot be on Zoom and actually teach lessons. It would help significantly if they were teaching to the kids versus sending a list of things to read and assignments to do. I know other schools that do this. We are in Zoom. Why can't they teach?

I still work full time, as well as my son goes to day care full time now, trying to get all his work done is a huge challenge now. I still work full-time outside of the home. I would like more communication from teachers if assignments aren't turned in on time.

I think 1 individual zoom w each student, even if for only 5-10min on one occasion, would be beneficial to the kids. I think 5 days a week is too much. 3 to 4 days would be better.

I think all of my son's teachers have done a fantastic job scrambling to create eLearning plans and daily lessons. I do, however, strongly feel not enough work is being assigned. To that end, I'm afraid there will be sections of the teacher's original syllabus that won't be completed. For classes like Math this is especially bad because obviously there's certain things you need to add to your base knowledge before you can progress to the next higher level of math. Reiterating my note above, go ahead and continue to assign the daily max minutes worth of eLearning, but then please assign "extra credit" work kids can do to help them finish everything on the original syllabus. I'm guessing at this point there's 0% the kids are going back to school this year. If I'm right, I'll propose a few ideas for you to consider:

- if a teacher wasn't able to finish their entire syllabus, ask that teach to provide a secondary one listing all the items that still need to be completed and provide that to each child.
- to help finish these items, let the kids keep their Chrome books over the summer.
- think about starting school several weeks early in August and call it a "jump start" to the upcoming school year.

Bottom line, we don't want these kids to fall behind otherwise they'll potentially be in a couple year period continually playing catchup. I'd rather press them now, and over the summer, to (God willing) enter school next Fall fully caught up. I support any amount of extra workload now, or over the summer, to keep them caught up.

Thank you for your consideration and thank you to all the teachers for doing a great job!

I think all of the teachers are doing an excellent job during this time. If teachers have extra/optional materials it would be helpful if they could email parents directly those activities. Trust me a sixth grader isn't gonna offer up the "extra" work to the parents! If parents have it available then they can give to their student.

I think communication can be improved in 2 way:

- 1.My son gets his daily assignments posted to Seesaw each day at 8am. I like to preview his assignments and make a plan for the day that gives him the best chance of success. This gives me no time to do that, and I always feel like I'm one step behind. If the assignments wewere posted the night before, or even by 6am the day of, that would give me the time I need to make a lesson plan.
- 2. There needs to be a unification of communication between the classroom teachers and the elective teachers. My preference would be to keep it all on Seesaw. Right now, certain elective assignments are only found in google docs and forms that are linked in one of Mr. Sisul's emails. Each time we need to do one of those assignments, I need to Login to my email on my son's computer and try to find that link. If everything were on Seesaw, it would flow much better.

I think D58 and school is doing an amazing job! Remote Learning (in my opinion) is one of the greatest challenges teachers have ever faced. Teachers had limited time to get the ball rolling and become familiar with all of technological resources and challenges. All while they were caring for their own family and putting on a stress-free and happy face for students. Well Done Teachers!!!!! Keep up the excellent work, but take time to breathe and find peace in these unsettling circumstances.

I think feedback from teachers to the students about the work completed may be somewhat difficult to access, especially for younger kids or for kids whose parents might not have the time/desire to be checking their kids work themselves. I think the there is a difference between younger teachers who are knowledgeable with the technology and those that struggle. I feel like there should be resources to help some of these teachers with loading information onto seesaw or helping them make the weekly or daily lessons.

I think the younger kids need so much more parental assistance and help to navigate seesaw, brain pop, YouTube that it can be challenging when parents have multiple children and trying to work from home. I don't know how else to make it easier/different as I know the children need to learn and watch the videos, but only posting so you might have a better understanding if some parents seem frustrated. The more the kids do it, the easier it is becoming as they are also learning the system. Please thank everyone from us!

I think there is a significant lack of guidance to parents as to what it is we are "teaching". The activities often seem like time fillers when we have no idea what it is they're hoping to achieve, on both a big picture and specific skill level. For example, what math curriculum is left this year? When we do a subtraction worksheet, should we be aiming to teach our children that subtraction is the opposite of addition? That they need to have basic facts memorized? Is using their fingers as aids appropriate? What comes next when they've mastered basic subtraction from the worksheets. With counting, do we teach ones and tens digits? I have questions like this for every subject and every activity, and it boils down to a lack of communication of what the standards are and the overarching plan for the remainder of the time at home. It's very difficult to feel like an effective teacher without knowing what we aim to be teaching and grade level expectations. My last recommendation would be to include on each activity how a family could take it further. Students were in school for six hours, kinder work is now 2. There has been communication on one end not to worry if it doesn't get done, but how about the other end; age appropriate recommendations on what to do if it gets done and they want more? For example with the weather unit, an idea to take it further in our house was to study examples of extreme weather. Our child was fascinated. We made a tornado in a jar experiment. I have no idea if it was grade level appropriate, but it was something on topic that we could do at home. Because this is a unique opportunity; families can often do things in their home setting that just aren't feasible in a school setting. I'd love to see the district explore that and keep in mind that this isn't just a handicap to the education experience, but has special benefits too! Encourage and guide us on how to take advantage of this time!

I think things need to be consolidated. Daily tasks should be limited to one page and just a few subjects. Trying to do everything and then get to specials as well is too much. We are doing our best but e-learning has become a strain on our family.

I truly think you are all doing a fantastic job pulling this together. Thank you for all of your hard work and passion to make this happen for the kids!!! We miss seeing you all and truly appreciate your efforts for us. Thank you.

I understand that this is a challenging time for everyone, but things would be much easier if the instructions and guidance both in terms of expectations and accessing and completing assignments were better organized. As it stands, there are multiple platforms (seesaw, zoom, paper) with multiple instructors with little to no coordination. The learning plan is Balkanized and siloed. Parents are left to try to figure out what their child should be doing and how to do it. This is challenging enough for parents and not possible for younger students. I understand everyone is trying their best, but this entire process has been a confusing mess.

I understand that this is all new for the teachers but I do not feel the amount of schoolwork is enough or challenging enough for my child. I understand every child is different and some children/parents would not be able to handle more work, but I would appreciate more creative and challenging assignments that require my child to utilize what she has at home for more projects and assignments that stimulate her in this new, unique environment. I realize this may never happen because I suspect more parents would complain and be very upset about adding more work. But it's too bad we can't take advantage of this unforeseen opportunity to really facilitate the kids to learn more independently in a creative, fun way at home. The work is WAY to simple and not engaging enough. Again, I know we are just getting our feet wet and teachers are evolving their elearning along the way but there needs to be higher expectations for these students and parents. I know teachers don't want to "overwhelm" families but these kids are bored. They need more.

I understand that this is difficult and new for everyone but for a kindergartner having multiple things to do like online and worksheets every day from multiple types of teachers ex gym music art library. plus multiple zoom calls daily on top of her siblings multiple zoom calls and e learning is a bit overwhelming for everyone. Things overlap and one child misses part of a zoom bc the other needs to get on or do their seesaw work. Yes they need to have structure and continue to learn but it is just a lot thrown at them and us as parents that some still need to work their own jobs are not educators. Appreciate everything the teachers are doing and am grateful for their hard work!

I understand the need to continue to educate the kids so they don't lose what they have learned and to teach new concepts but the volume of work is far beyond the 90 minutes. For example a 15 minute language arts assignment took 50 minutes. After working all day from home, having to sit and do 3 hours of school work with my child is stressful. There is no time to spend doing anything enjoyable with my child. Eight hours of work, then 3 hours of school work and then the day is done. Having one day in the middle of the week to catch up would be nice. Trying to coordinate conference calls in between my child's Zoom calls is a bit much.

I understand this must be really hard on the teachers, but if there is anything additional that the kids can do from an educational standpoint, that would be awesome. We're trying to keep them busy and finding creative things at home while we work. They seem to think our creative things are "extra" and prefer to only do the school work. If you have more, we'll take it. When it's optional though, they tend to ignore it. If it was mandatory, they would do it! Than you again!

I want my kids back in school. All are depressed and missing the interaction and physical activity. I know the school district is under governor's order but I just wanted to express my sentiment.

I was hopeful that the teachers would actually be zoom teaching each day for like an hour. But that's not really happening. The calls are just for questions. I'm a single mom of 2 kids working full time from home and it's taking 4.5 hours if my workday to help them.

I will like to know from teachers if my son misses any assignment or if he needs improvement

I wish for more eLearning time

I wish all of the assignments were on one document at the beginning of the week. I understand that some assignments need to be completed in Seasaw but I also find myself searching for assignments and wondering if i missed any. it might also help if any assignments before April 1st are cleared out on seasaw. One location for all assignments would be ideal but not sure if that is feasible. Thanks for your help.

I wish daily plans were available on seesaw so the kids can see what they need to do for the day rather than go on the school website.

I wish I had more feedback from the teachers regarding whether my child is participating as expected - he works independently and I have no idea if he is putting much effort into his classes. He is always done very quickly.

I wish my child could be mailed work to do instead of on iPad

I wish okeep zoom meetings/zoom meetings for specials were posted in seesaw. We've found it most challenging to "find" those items looking through emails from days before, etc. The amount of zoom meetings for more than one child have been tricky to manage since specials are included.

I wish that there were more interactive zoom sessions. My son (6th grade) has 2 zoom sessions per day which is perfect - it helps him stay connected to his class. Additionally, especially at this age, it allows the teacher to give verbal reminders of assignments and due dates. It also provides for social interactions outside of the ones he is pursuing on his own. Recently, a student in my son's class needed assistance with an assignment. His teacher asked that my son stay on the call after it ended to walk the other student through how to get into the reading. The other student was not one of my son's friends that connects with regularly. It was great that he was provided an opportunity to connect with this student and assist her remotely.

My daughter (7th grade) has very infrequent zoom sessions. Most of her work is sent to her via email. It doesn't feel very engaging and it feels very disconnected from the school and her classes. It would be great if each of her classes could do at 1 zoom session per week, even if it's just a check in with the teacher. I think this would help her to stay more connected to her teachers and her classes. This is a new environment for all of us, but especially for the kids. Providing the students with ability to actually see their teacher each week, like they do in school, could go a long way to help them maintain a feeling of connection with the teacher and the class. I think it also helps to maintain a social balance in their schooling. My kids are definitely staying connected with their close friends, but you don't always have your close friends in your class. Being able to stay connected and see your acquaintances, and not so close friends, can do a lot to make this staying at home time a little more tolerable. I know personally just being able to do video meetings with coworkers as well as social zoom calls helps me to feel less isolated.

Overall, I really want to applaud District 58 on how quickly we have adapted to elearning. I work in higher education and I know how difficult it has been on us to adapt to a virtual environment. The communication that has come out from the district, the schools and the teachers has been great. The roll out felt thought out and organized. Given the very short time that you were provided in making this happen, this has been truly amazing.

The likelihood is that we will continue in this elearning for awhile, most likely through the end of the year. While I think that it has been great to this point, I also think that it was set up for a short term solution. As we move into this being our long term solution, I hope that there will be some changes in the way that this is structured. In addition to the suggestion about zoom meetings above, I do feel as if this has not been very challenging for my kids. Their teachers have indicated that they are doing well in their required assignments, but I do not feel as if they are spending a significant time on their education. In general, my kids start doing school work around 9:00 AM and are usually done with what they need to do for the day by noon/1:00. That is not a lot of time per day spent on school. Add to that the fact that most weeks did not have 5 days of instruction, I feel like the education my kids are receiving now is not on par with what it would have been if they were attending in person. I know that is a difficult task to achieve but I feel that we owe it to our kids to provide them an equal amount of educational opportunities. The only difference should be the format in which it is delivered.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide this feedback. Truly, the district is doing an amazing job! I look forward to seeing how this will change and grow in the coming weeks.

I wish the District would've asked parents about after-hours Zooms that were recommended to teachers. These meetings, outside of what would normally be school hours, are creating conflicts with remote private music/instrumental lessons, remote meetings of other groups & clubs, etc. not to mention dinner time! I also think that the kids - especially in grades 4+ - would benefit from a DAILY Zoom where teachers could do the same lecture they would have done in person. Do remote learning more similar to what in person would be. It also seems that 2 hours is just not enough for 6th graders+. I'd actually encourage some more lectures, assignments & homework for upper elementary. I'm very worried my 6th grader is not going to be ready for Middle School next year.

I wish the math materials for 3rd grade were better. I don't like the weekly worksheet. It's been hard to read as it's a photo and some problems have not been discussed, for example pole line. I googled it and we found the answer but I wish it would have been discussed and the answers included to review. I think there could be better tools. I'm finding better worksheets and videos on Education.com. This could be a curriculum issue, versus remote learning issue. I also don't understand all the shortened weeks. I'm not sure how these students will be prepared for the next grade at this rate. Otherwise, I think the district and our son's teachers are doing a commendable job and we thank you.

I would like if the choice boards had more quick and easy activities and activities at my child's level (3 years old). It's nice to feel successful and when I don't always have 15 minutes to sit and play or when the weather is not nice enough to go for a walk, it would be nice to have quick little 3 minute activities with little to no prep that were appropriate for their age. And more concrete activities. Some of the abstract activities are too high for my kid so some (more) quick concrete activities we can do would be great. Also I would appreciate if the choice boards were linked to the document that is posted on the weekly schedule that would be great, since I am often up early and then am able to access it when it's a quiet time for me. Also if there are activities that are mentioned in the "meeting time" it would be great if those could be on the weekly plan ahead of time too. We like to start school around 8 and sometimes things aren't posted until late in the day. By that time we are already doing lunch or nap time and are done with school for the day. So more lower level and no prep activities and the plan and links available ahead of time.

I would like more "off iPad work". The kids seem to do better when I can make some of their work on paper.

I would like more feedback or guidance from the teachers on how to do the assignments so us parents can communicate the assignment effectively to our child.

I would like more worksheets that my child can do independently. At the first two weeks of e- learning were great because it had all the work that my daughter was already used to doing. She was confident and could do it independently. The cutting, sorting, math worksheets were great. I know scholastic has a website but can we get the hard copies of those? Or a can we print it out? I didn't see that option online. Having a hard copy seems to work better than a lot of work being online. I would like more worksheets even if they are optional or as PDF's that I can print out. I would also like OKEEP to be the same format of the regular k work and not a choice board. If they could just put it in a schedule like the e- learning format that would be great.

I would like my student to have a little more face time with their peers and teachers.

I would like to have more things marked as optional. There are clearly some core pieces and then other things that are just being sent for practice. I would like a few marked as important each day.

I would like to have the teachers use zoom to teach concepts. Having that interaction where kids can ask questions on the spot would be more beneficial.

I would like to know how much of the e learning is she being assessed on, how is her progress being monitored.

I would like to see 1:1 or even 3:1/4:1 zoom learning meetings with teacher once a week in addition to the daily class zooms that is focused on continuous learning relative to their learning level to keep them challenged.

Also, my student is getting through things quickly and our teacher send over some additional work per my request that is option but keeps my son's mind activated and challenged.

I would like to see a gym/yoga class where they participate live? It seems my kid in particular is less active.

I would like to see additional video instruction. My daughter enjoys her zoom time with her class and I would like to see this time expanded from 15 minutes to possible 1 hour. Maybe 2 session once to start the day at 8:30 and one around noon

I would like to see either the school or each teacher build out their own google calendar that parents can subscribe to (similar to the district & school calendars). This way we are assured to not miss calls and assignments. It is very difficult to jump from one resource to another to figure out kids' zoom meeting times. These need to be updated in advance (ideally prior to the upcoming week) so that parents can plan their own calendars around school requirements.

More Zoom time for K kids w/ the teacher. This week was better...but need more help here keeping them focused and enjoying learning. (vs parents pushing and pushing). Not just SEL, please.

Please have teachers (classroom + specials) create their own unique Zoom password so that students can log in on their own. The numbers are too tricky...class pet, teacher's favorite color...can be safe, just easier.

Allotted time is not accurate for each assignment. I've asked a few other parents if 15-20 minutes allotted feels accurate (in the event I'm an isolated case). We are spending 2-4x expected time (of course, that factors in whining, begging, sibling distractions, (mom) walking away, more whining (mom + child...). Impossible to get to the OKEEP stuff.

I would like to see either the school or each teacher build out their own google calendar that parents can subscribe to (similar to the district & school calendars). This way we are assured to not miss calls and assignments. It is very difficult to jump from one resource to another to figure out kids' zoom meeting times. I would like to see just a bit more of daily assignments

I would like to see more facetime with the teacher and have the teachers TEACH an actual lesson via ZOOM so that the children aren't teaching themselves or having the parent teach them. Remote learning needs to involve the teacher more and not just a "check-in" on Zoom. This is REMOTE HOMEWORK not REMOTE LEARNING.

I would like to see more instruction videos on concepts for the kids. I've been having to find my own supplemental information to explain her homework to her. --Thank you for what you are doing... I know how much work it must be!

I would like to see more Live Learning/ZOOM sessions for the classes especially for turned in assignments for the classes especially for turned in assignments for the classes especially for turned in assignments for the classes especially especially

I would like to see more videos of the teachers reading/teaching the kids. Especially if it's a new concept, like Math. It's pretty difficult to complete homework when they don't even understand it. I can definitely get the right answer, but have no idea how they're teaching the concept. Yes, there's a short Brain pop video that was provided, but it would be great if the teacher taught the lesson for a couple minutes as well. Maybe go over a couple of the questions and show how to solve it, and then tell the kids to complete the rest on their own. This is happening in one of my kid's classes, but not the other.

I love the teacher videos, because then I know what's going on and can help when they need it. I know the teachers are already busting their butts and going beyond, but the videos are super helpful! I appreciate all of the hard work the teachers are doing already, this is hard for everyone.

I would like to see my 7th grader receive more work. He consistently finishes within 30-60 min. every day. He is a fast worker, but my 3rd and 4th grader work for 2 hours.

I would like to see Required silent reading and write a summary. I feel 6th grade could have more assignments/projects. I would like to see Required silent reading and write a summary. I feel 6th grade could have more assignments/projects. I would like to see some lessons being taught on zoom vs just watching videos or reading

I would like to see the amount of zoom meetings increase, or at least be consistent with every teacher. What the kids miss is interacting with their teachers and classmates. The kids live for these zoom meetings. It's especially tricky when multiple students are at home and don't receive an equal amount of communication from their classrooms, via zoom.

I love the screencasts. The kids need to see a lesson and hear the teacher's voice. Mrs. does this wonderfully- a screencast to present the lesson, then a daily meeting in the afternoon to follow up with that specific lesson. I wish this could be done consistently throughout the classrooms, and with content other than math. The follow up is key.

I love that the younger kids are hearing their teachers' voices. Mrs. is reading the material. Mr. is talking through the math. I'm mostly concerned right now that my kids are soaking up information and content, and having material read to them is making that happen.

Some of the silent reading— it's tricky for me to consistently check for comprehension. If the child reads a science article and gets half the follow- up questions incorrect, it's frustrating to me and requires parent's time to make them go back and reread. I' d love more material read to them (maybe even for some of the older kids, 3rd grade) and questions gone over within the teacher's reading of the article. I think time is more productive if they're listening to a teacher and his/her discussion of the material, rather than crossing fingers to hope a child stays engaged throughout a silent read and follow up questions.

Is it possible to keep the previous weeks' lessons posted on the website? We wanted to go back to find some things and could only find the current week.

A provided list by the teacher of the week's zoom meetings could also be very helpful. Picking through the website to identify the times and codes for those can take a long time. It would be a huge time- saver if I could print a list of each child's home room meetings every Sunday night and just fill in with the extras (math, band, etc)

Overall the teachers, admin and district have been absolutely wonderful in their efforts. It's most important to me that my kids stay positive and happy and a good routine from their school is a key component to that. It's very evident how hard the district and staff are working to make the best of this unprecedented time. Thank you for everything.

I would like to see the teachers spend more time with the kids teaching. Having some additional zoom meetings where the teachers can go over the information live and answer any questions. I would also like the teachers to have one-on-one meetings with the kids each week to touch base and provide any feedback on their work.

I would like to start by saying that I am so impressed with how well the district is handling all of this. We love so much and the staff is doing an amazing job. It is evident that this is getting easier as the days go on. I love to see how the grade level teachers are collaborating with each other. The only thing I would like to see is a little individual feedback from the teachers. Just a 10 minute zoom call with each child would go a long way to boost spirits with both students and parents. I know that is a huge undertaking but if they did a couple a day, they would be able to get through each student.

I would love if teachers would take this opportunity to give students opportunities for deeper learning work, and not just surface level stuff like worksheets and IXL

I would love to say that EVERYONE in District 58 has been great. Especially at state ! Everyone has gone above and beyond to stay connected and make the kids feel like they're at school as much as they can!

I would love to see more live lesson teaching, especially in Math. Make it more interactive,

I would love to see some one on one sessions setup from the teachers to the kids that have a formal structure for as little as 15 minutes - something similar to any formal one on one evaluations they would have had in school.

I also feel like some subjects are just being dropped - cursive, spelling, LTR that I would like to continue to see progress for the rest of the school year. At a minimum, communication of what subjects are not going to move forward, why they are not being done anymore, and ideas for things to work on at home in place of them would be appreciated.

I would prefer getting some of the assignments earlier in the day so we can start earlier, when possible.

I would prefer more seesaw activities than workbook activities. My child requires a lot less guidance when there are multiple seesaw activities, especially when she can press the button and hear the directions.

I would prefer that all assignments and notices were coming through SeeSaw. This way we would be able to have everything in one spot. The Zoom meeting info often comes in an email which we need to forward to the child's email account to have the link available on the iPad. I'm not sure if the district monitors the emails prior to release, but my forwards are not going through on her school email. This means that she is not able to have the link available on that device.

I would prefer the links on seesaw for the elementary school rather than on the school home page, those can be difficult at times to access and the links don't always work. Also, we struggled with some assignments needing to be printed out to be completed in the middle school level. We don't have a printer so that made it more difficult. I'd prefer to have things either sent to me or have an option to pick up materials if they have to be hard copy.

We haven't received any direction on what to do with worksheets for kinder that need to be completed but not submitted. Do we keep them? turn them in later?

I would recommend having smaller groups every day for the students to interact with their teacher and classmates to continue the learning process. The large class meetings are fun, but sometimes overwhelming for the kids. Additionally, if students are in small groups in the classroom for reading or math, they should continue those small groups virtually.

I would suggest to change the topic of the zoom meetings from checking in how the students are doing for virtual classes of specific subjects. It is good that the teachers are worried about the students are feeling, but teaching an specific topic would be more effective.

I'd encourage teachers to assign a once a week non-school related item (e.g. virtual tour of a museum or other cultural location).

I'd like to see more zoom meetings. I like the link on the school homepage with a summary of the work for each day, but I would like to see all teachers (Music, Art, Library, etc.) use it and include any links to their work. If I can't see the full list of what needs to be completed, it is often overlooked for the week as it is only sent to my child in seesaw. I can't rely on a 3rd grader to complete everything on his own.

I'd like to see some actual class time via zoom or some other means for some classes, the only class time they have is with home base. Also my 8th grader barely has an hour of work to do each day, this is not nearly enough, my 7th grader has more but still falls way short of the 140 min goal. I'm really disappointed with the level of engagement with some of the teachers. There are a few that go out of their way and are really making this work, but many have just failed during this remote learning time. I don't know why they aren't having actual class time at least 20-30 min per class & then given homework, especially since the kids are only doing half days.

I'm assuming teachers will proactively reach-out if expectations from child are not being met right now. It also seems like most work is review. Is that true? Will new topics also be introduced during remote learning the rest of this school year?

I'm impressed with how quickly this plan was able to be put into place. It is not an ideal way to learn and I worry about losing valuable learning time, but given the circumstance, it's not a complete loss. Thanks to everyone involved!

I'm not sure how we feel about teachers using the Zoom app when teaching their classes. It may violate privacy, and it seems very hectic - not sure how much the students are getting out of it. We have found the pre-recorded video lessons, given and sent by the teacher, are the most helpful.

I'm not sure what the district can do about this, but younger kids (i.e. my 1st grader) require a fair amount of supervision during e-learning--which is age appropriate but difficult for working parents. My oldest child does 6th grade math w/ Ms. and she has been really scattered about setting up zoom appointments, i.e. makes appts. last minute, changes timing of meetings last minute. I think it's really confusing for the kids. Would also love advice on how to manage siblings in the same "classroom" who love to bicker w/ each other-not that it ever happens in our home:) -a new dynamic they don't have at school

I'm worried about students in advanced math not being ready for Algebra next year. It would be great if the district please provide some step up resources for students who will be moving on to rigorous math courses to work on over the summer.

I'd like to see more teaching via zoom. I'm happy to have the short zooms, but so far, my son isn't actually learning anything from his teacher, it's just asking a question to each student and maybe a sight word. A slightly longer zoom with more academic focus would be great. It is also difficult to find all assignments. There are in the packet, on seesaw, on the school's website and a separate email from Okeep. If it could somehow be more streamlined. For older students it might be easier, but having a kindergarten child I have to assist him with 100% off the assignments be he couldn't possibly understand/find directions.

I'd love to have more optional enrichment activities to choose from. My 2nd grader has had some additional math sheets, which have been nice, but I'd like to see more things to supplement their learning.

I'm extremely happy and impressed with how our remote learning is working. I'm in awe of the teachers and staff pulling this off in such a short timeframe. We moved here for the schools and continues to make me feel like it was the best decision I made.

I'm grateful for the teachers and I know it's strange for everyone. However, I think the workload is too little and am concerned about language classes and not being prepared for HS. It's difficult to learn a language without hearing and seeing the teacher daily. I'd like to see more Zoom classes from teachers and small group interactions.

I'm ok with the about given but the estimates are off. Reading estimated to take 30 mins takes at least an hour if not more.

The specials assignments are confusing to understand.

The zoom meetings - there should be a flexible schedule.

I've implemented a 1/2 hour reading time during the day, but I'd love to have the teachers assign it. Is 1/2 hour enough? I'll reach out to their teachers.

Secondly, THANK YOU! We are so grateful for our teachers and administration for all their hard work to make this remote learning work!!!

I've noticed that the weekly plan is updated throughout the week. The document I printed out on Monday morning was incomplete. If the teacher is going to add/change the document during the week, it would be helpful to be notified of the update. I would also prefer more feedback than just a "like" on assignments that have been turned in. Sometimes there is more than a "like" but not all the time. When there has been feedback from the teacher, my child felt proud and more connected to school. I haven't seen any feedback on math assignments. I think the daily zoom class meetings have been really effective! My child likes to see his classmates and teacher and hear what they've been up to.

I've noticed that there haven't been any handwritten assignments this week - only iPad typed responses. Watching my daughter clumsily and very slowly single-finger type assignments on Seesaw might just send me to my grave. It takes so much longer than handwritten responses and often leads to frustration.

Separately, we struggle fitting in art, music and gym Seesaw activities after experiencing burnout from core class work. We're not sure what the expectations are for those classes.

It would be great to get some resources or articles for the parents to learn how to best navigate home schooling/e-learning and tips for communicating with our children in these new roles. Also, we'd love some resources for the kids to help them acknowledge and navigate these complex feelings as a result of these massive changes to their routine. My daughter often talks about stress now.

Ideally, ALL assignments are delivered through the same platform (seesaw), and organized in such a way that requires little hunting and searching from parents. Right now, I seem to be spending a larger amount of time navigating and checking various sources and lists. I would prefer to see a simple daily list that encompasses all the assignments which can be checked off as the child completes them.

If changes are made to the assignments please have the teachers notify students/parents. We had downloaded the weekely overview not knowing that it was updated so we did not have all the information.

If I tell my son to read for 30 min and do 15 min. on IXL it is not taken as seriously as his teacher adding it to the to-do list. But I understand that adding those things (plus handwriting practice) might push your total time expected to be spent well over 90 min.

If possible, I would love to see more feedback from teachers to parents - I realize this is a big ask, since they are already doing so much, but I don't feel I have a good handle on my daughter's progress. I suspect she is doing fine, but it would be good to hear from each of them.

If possible, provide added challenges

If remote learning can have more submission base assignments than students will be more focused driven and disciplined.

If seesaw could make printing a possibility and one of worth that would be great! Or provide items on screen in larger format so kids can write in answers a bit more legibly.

If we could print out some of the work for my child I know it would help. He is good with the iPad but occasionally overwhelmed. He misses writing. Having it all right there. I realize this is not for all. But when he has needed help it is multi direction assignments that he needs to find text when he is used to a sheet of paper with a lot. Teachers and principal so engaged and helpful! Nothing will replace being in the building together but I am impressed with how all are handling things! Implement more virtual FaceTime classes. So that the students feel close to being in school with their teachers and friends.

In light of the new order from Governor Pritzker, please consider Zoom instruction rather than Zoom SEL "check ins". I think the kids would benefit more from longer structured times with their teacher!

In our house hold we have one parent homeschooling and working with a 3 year old. I believe the teacher should share all important information. Our house does not complete gym, LRC, and extras. We go outside when it is nice and do our own art projects for fun. It makes it difficult when teachers want to do a project but then say we will get the questions during LCR. I am LCR and just need the questions. It is a bit of a challenge to have different teachers giving work at different times of the week when there is a weekly plan. I am thankful for all they are doing and do understand they are doing their best. thanks! In regards to ELA the work typically takes longer than what is allotted, especially to do the assignments well.

In the by surveys break down grade levels regarding parent involvement.

I have 4 kids in the district. Each one requires different parental involvement. I would think that would make a difference in your data information. So heres the more detailed breakdown according to grade levels regarding parent involvement. 7th grader-very minimal. Remind about P.E./ powerschool helps me keep abreast of his academic situation. But basically, he's independent. 5th grader- independent but i check his work and needs more parental involvement with reading groups and specials like PE, music and art.

4th grader- independent. More intrinsically motivated kid- so handles everything well including specials. 2nd grader- needs the most parental involvement and checking of work. It is set up beautiful by the teachers and i try and let her work as independently as possible but i have to check her work more often before she submits it or she will be turning in inaccurate/ wrong work and she needs more parental involvement with specials, especially reading groups also. But i feel she's progressing and learning and i don't mind the extra time it takes to keep her on track.

Increase level of work for higher elementary school grades

Inform parents in advance if there will be Q3 final tests through e-learning and when.

Information from teachers can be disorganized in how it's provided. Too many SeeSaw emails. Specials assignments are not integrated. Referrals to websites not always working on district-issued iPads.

Information is in too many different resources. You have to go to the dg58 website to retrieve the learning materials for the day then from there you have multiple different platforms in which the the work needs to be done, random pages in the workbooks. Then OKEEP you have to get though an email link. Then zoom meetings are from a newsletter on seesaw. This requires full parent participation on all levels for kindergartners. It's time consuming going back and forth between all platforms. Being a kindergartner, my child is not a strong reader so everything must be read and explained ahead of time.. It is very difficult with both orients working and other children in the home

IPAD usage is challenging for younger kids because of restrictions/passwords/Securly-can't access school website. Change is overwhelming. Thank you for your effort and support!

Is it possible for e-learning to operate like a classroom? My child is doing the work but it's really not much learning. I don't know how to make these changes but right now we are doing our best to help the kids and the teachers get through this.

Is it possible to a have a page with just the zoom meeting schedule, to make it clear in one place when kids are expected to log on each day? I think separating that out from the homework assignments would make it easier. Thanks

Is it possible to share DCIs for each grade level as an OPTIONAL item for parents? I suppose this could cause more panic than good, but personally if I have extra time one day- I'd like to explore those and use free resources to try to touch on it if possible. In general though, we're very happy with the district's ability to adapt- we've been very grateful and we hope that we can find a safe way to continue educating our kids in the fall with the district.

Is there a way to have an instructional Zoom meeting? If the classes are too large, could we break them up and have separate meetings to lower the span? I am working from home 10+ hours a day and managing the kids through their homework. Math always seems to require my assistance, could there be an instructional or open meeting occurrence to help the kiddos?

Is there a way to have one page on seesaw with all of the assignments from their teacher and every specials teacher? Instead of assignments from the specials posted in different locations.

Is there a way you could teach one new subject matter per week at a time using Guided Instruction/Flexible Delivery methods? I thought those methods might be more practical and useful for the time been. Vs., putting 20-25 kids on a zoom meeting is bit congested and would not give enough room for kids to interact with their teacher and their friends.

If you were to break it down to 10 - 12 kids in the morning and rest of the kids in the afternoon zoom meeting, that would be more productive and time efficiently spent.

Let's face it, these kids will not likely will be return to school before Fall. In that regards, they will be missing 4 - 5 months of learning. Kids will be put to next grade without covering the material that they should have covered due to Coved-19. Zoom meetings and Seesaw work should tailored towards minimizing that 4-5 months missed opportunity to cover needed skill sets lessons plans. I do not see this is been addressed. Thank you,

It can be difficult when teachers have multiple step instructions and use multiple places to access different assignments. Please try to steam line.

It can be difficult to have to go between the kindergarten and okeep assignments.

It does take considerably longer than 90 min to get through all the work. Any links in seesaw typically don't play. I did report to help desk. Websites are restricted on safari- asks for a google log in. End up having to use my phone often.

It feels like they are learning much less than they would be if in school, and there is definitely way less teacher instruction.

It has been a lot of work for my son to focus through, but he is making through it just fine. We struggle with the lack of school environment, yet we make up for it with the one on one

It has been hard for our Kindergartener to use the seesaw markup tools to complete digital worksheets. Especially because we have an old iPad (iOS 9) where seesaw features don't all work. We gave our K student an old iPhone that has a more recent iOS but the screen is smaller making it more difficult. I think it is also difficult to navigate the many features of seesaw to find all the things (activities, announcements, inbox). Can we narrow?

It has sometimes been difficult accessing lessons/assignments in different apps and then assignments need to be turned in on another app.

It is a bit confusing for my son who is used to going to his google classroom for some teachers to now going to the website to access assignments or that teachers use multiple platforms for relaying information. Could it all be streamlined for ease of use?

It is a bit tricky for Our kinder to be going from Seesaw to YouTube to Zoom to packet etc and overwhelming at times.

It is EXTREMELY difficult to get a teenager to FOCUS and get his or her assignments completed outside a classroom environment. They respond with vague answers, lock you out of their tablets when reviewing homework, and the teachers don't follow up and let you know there's a problem until 2 weeks have past. I don't feel my child has learned much since this whole ordeal started. Speaking with other families with children in this age group, they have similar feelings. These kids are being pushed through the system with very little regard to the material they need to learn and retain.

It is hard for me to answer these questions because my two children are having vastly different experiences. My sixth-grader's experience is going smoothly. With the one caveat being some days she has more than the amount of minutes some days she has less. I would love to see that evened out to approximately the same number of minutes of Engagement each day. Her teacher has been very engaged and communicative and my daughter is experiencing little frustration.

My third graders experience has been much more difficult. There is very little interaction from the teacher. He's supposed to be doing a daily dialogue journal with her, but only hears back once or twice a week. We have had multiple times that links to videos or assignments have not been uploaded and we did not get them till 3 or 4 in the afternoon. My child no longer wants to be engaged in school work after dinner time. I have also emailed the teacher questions more than once and have not received responses. My third graders teacher has been open and up front that she is not tech savvy and is working as hard as she can. However my son is young and is struggling and this experience is making it harder. I would love to see all links active and working when the school day is supposed to start. I would also love a daily Zoom check-in where my child can ask questions. The informational videos his math teacher is providing to watch before beginning his lesson are quite helpful and we appreciate them.

It is incredibly difficult to assist my child who is in multiple classrooms as well as trying to do work from therapists. I understand the flexibility in the completion of the work however it is a lot for a special ed 6 year old.

It is unfair to the kids and the parents to expect this work to get done. Kids don't have the same attitude at home that they do while at school. Seesaw is a terrible app. I would rather cancel the school year right now. Or maybe just stop the iPad learning and give the kids a packet of worksheets with a few video explanations from the teachers. This is an extremely stressful and difficult time and our kids have had so many meltdowns. Trying to fit in schoolwork just makes it worse.

It is very apparent that all staff is working hard to help the kids and make this abnormal time as workable as possible. Thanks to DG58 for all you are doing! The parents and families appreciate everything.

It is very hard and tuff for the kids and parents

It says our kids should be getting 140 min of engaged learning per day. My 8th grader is lucky to have an hour per day. We think he is not doing everything assigned to him but when we check he has completed all requirements. My 7th grader has more work to do but still completes all work in less than 2 hours. I do not know why the teachers could not hold their classes in zoom as if they were teaching in school. They could give a lesson, assign homework and give the kids a day of school. Some teachers are really good at this but most do nothing but assign stuff in google classroom. I see very little "teaching" going on.

It seems like all the work assigned so far is just review of concepts already learned. I'd like to see some advancement in new skills/concepts if possible. Also, while Zoom calls for "check ins" are great, could new concepts/skills be taught during that time instead?

It seems like my 4th grader is getting more homework than my 8th grader which doesn't seem quite right. I'd like to see a bit more work assigned to students at the 8th grade level. He and his friends seemed to be able to get all of their work complete within an hour's time, which is not enough.

Additionally, it would be nice if the teachers would include an actual Zoom class where they are teaching students a lesson vs everything being handled remotely. Most of the work coming home from the doesn't have a video with actual teaching.

Also, although this is not related to e-learning, I would ask that the district consider having an 8th grade graduation ceremony at some point this year once the stay at home order is lifted. While safety is a top priority, if there is an opportunity to do so, the District should continue with graduation ceremonies. Otherwise, it's a missed opportunity to celebrate the hard work of these individuals.

It seems my child isnt learning much right now from some of his 7th grade teachers. I thought they would have scheduled zoom active teaching sessions, however in some classes on-line teaching isn't being utilized or it's referred to as class checkins for those that might have questions rather than active learning time/instruction. Now that they're not in school for the remainder of the year, it's critical they have active teacher-driven learning rather than busywork. Thank you.

It still feels like a lot to manage. By Wednesday my student was struggling to stay focused and motivated - and he's a GOOD easy student. I can't imagine how hard this would be for challenges learners. Please consider adding some more meaningful assignments - like why can't student work on writing in a meaningful way like writing letters to essential workers? Or consider incorporating using math in the kitchen?

Obviously our students will not be learning as much as they normally would - but what can we teach them during this time besides just reading, math, writing?

It was confusing to have the OKEEP learning plan emailed to us but the regular kindergarten plan posted on the school page. I realize that is to keep the learning plans separateand all of the regular plans are posted on the websites, but many parents did not realize that they had to go to the website again for the Kg plan. Now that we know, this next week will probably go more smoothly.

It will be helpful if all content can be accessed from Seasaw and student iPads.

It will take time to get used to all this

It would be easier if there was one consistent place for students and parents to pull the assignments. The principle sends a link, which may indicate a Zoom conference, but then there's no attachment or email for it from the teacher. Or there's noting in their classroom but it's on the link. It's very confusing.

It would be extremely helpful for all teachers to:

- 1) Consistently send CALENDAR meeting invites for all zoom meetings. In a household that has 2 working parents & 2 children now with meetings as well, calendar invites/reminders are the most effective way for busy families to keep track of time specific activities.
- 2) Provide all assignments to be provided in SeeSaw as LINKS, as well as links to a PDF printable version of any worksheets where applicable. K & 1st graders should be writing with paper & pencil -- they're learning how to write letters & spell words. Doing everything over iPad is encouraging them to take shortcuts (such as use speech to text by using the "microphone" button on the iPad). I realize not everyone has the means to print, but please consider that parents now are in the best position to determine how their child will learn best & all the tools aren't being provided at this time to make that a simple & proactive process.
- 3) Organize all various logins in one centralized place. Sifting through numerous papers in a binder, various emails, etc. to collect this information isn't efficient at all.

It would be extremely helpful to be able clear out Seesaw activities that are either old or do not require a response.

It would be good to integrate an IXL learning plan set up for the kids to reinforce what they have been learning, since we have such a good resource available with IXL.

It would be great if there was a way to implement small group instruction with a few kids and teacher for certain subjects. Would specifically be interested in this for math.

it would be great, if the teachers would set.up a daily call with the students to give them a greater sense of. accountability for their school work

It would be helpful for the teachers to either do more videos explaining concepts (especially new ones) or to have Zoom meetings where they teach the kids.

It would be helpful if at the end of the week the teachers could maybe reach out and let parents know if students (especially older) are missing any assignments. My oldest enjoys working on his own, but I would like to know how he is doing. It doesn't even need to be weekly, maybe even every other week. With no papers coming home, it doesn't feel like feedback from the teachers is being given, except for reminding kids to turn in their work.

It would be helpful if materials/assignments were posted by a specific time each day so that students are not continually checking for an email or update.

It would be helpful if you could provide the parents with optional assignments because my daughter finishes her daily assignments in an hour, average.

It would be helpful to have an alternative way to access assignments when the links fail to work in Seesaw. Most frustrations have been due to technology issues like failed links. But overall this week went so much better than the weeks before break. Thank you for reducing the burden and stress on all of us.

It would be helpful to have the "specials" on Friday and have that day reserved for only the "specials". That way if a child is having a tough week, they can catch up or complete optional work if provided by the teacher.

It would be helpful to have Zoom meetings within school hours (not in the evening)

It would be helpful to put all information on one page. There seems to be a lot of jumping around for the kindergarten class. If it were all laid out from start to finish and not having to hop around finding zoom meetings, then having to find an email from 3 days ago, that would make it a bit smoother. That being said, the kindergarten teachers really are doing a great job and we appreciate their work!

It would be nice if all their work assignments are in the same platform. There is no way my 6 year old can go to the district website, and direct himself to his school and grade level, and read through the pages to click on a link, do the activity and go back and post on seesaw. Can't it all be in seesaw?

It would be nice if assignments could be found in as few places as possible, with good repetition on what we're doing instead of downloading more apps and trying new things each time (or at least it feels that way).

I would happily do just 1 zoom call each week. I think the kids like to see each other, but I don't see any other purpose for it. This is probably class specific but no learning has taken place on our calls and it is extremely difficult to hear/understand what is going on with all of the noise and distractions. It would be helpful if the teacher instructed everyone to put their iPad on a table (not hold it/touch it) and for the mute button to be used much more often.

Appreciate all of the hard work in trying to navigate this!

It would be nice if the kids could do some of their work together on the zoom call.

It would be nice if the printed packets that were delivered were separated by day. I find it a little confusing that the OKEEP and morning activities are in different locations.

It would be nice to have more work that is actually printed and the kids can touch and write on. Everything being on an iPad is not ideal.

It would be nice to have the daily assignments earlier. We have kindergarteners who need a lot of help with their work and we are both working parents. Between 7-8am is a really great time for us to get assignments done. Calendar invitations for the Zoom calls would help. Sometimes it is hard to find the codes when getting the kids on.

It would be nice to limit zoom meeting to 15-20 minutes. When they go longer, it's less time my child wants to be on the iPad for school. Also, doing some type of learning activity on the zoom meetings would be helpful as it could alleviate some of the parents having to teach that portion.

It would be nice to see the teachers use zoom to teach concepts where kids can ask questions in real time. Especially is accelerated courses.

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It would be really helpful if all the information would be in one place. Seesaw seems like the right platform. It is hard to navigate through multiple emails, links to other applications that require sign-ins. Our 4th grader seems to be able to go through most assignments on his own, but our younger one needs full assistance. It takes us, adults, approx. 4 hrs every day to support our kids e-learning. I know we are all in this together- it is not a complain, I am just stating a fact. OKEEP program we signed up for during normal school operation was our way to extend school hours, so we can go to work. Currently we are are doing anything we can to keep our jobs working from home, with all the layoffs around us. It is a ridiculous idea to think that extra OKEEP homework is a substitution to regular program, while we (working adults) need this time even more.

It would be really helpful if every teacher (including Library, PE, etc) that is holding a zoom meeting send the link to both the student and parent seesaw announcement each day there is a meeting. Different grades and teachers are sharing zoom information in different places and it is really hard to keep track of. My kids have missed a couple of meeting because we couldn't get the log in information together quick enough. It's important for the students to have links to the meeting so they can meet on their IPads.

It would be surprising if subject area curricula will be completed as expected by the end of the school year. Therefore it is reasonable to expect that, for students across the state, there will be holes of various sizes across subject areas prior to student advancement to the next grade level in the upcoming academic year. Although most students and school districts across the state may find themselves in this boat, or a similar boat, what is D58 planning to minimize the negative impact on student learning and achievement for the 2020/2021 academic year?

With new guidelines being issues regarding gated and phased opening of the country, there is hope that the state and the country will be able to begin to open up slowly as the gate and phase criteria are met by states. Yet there have been discussions by epidemiologists that there may be one or more subsequent waves of resurgence of COVID-19 in the future, perhaps in the fall, perhaps sooner, or perhaps later. Given the level of uncertainty regarding what COVID-19 will bring us next, what is D58 planning to put in place should one or more school shut downs be required during the 2020/2021 academic year?

It was interesting to see in the remote learning plans from the schools that each grade levels cover different topics in the curricula. Perhaps this is a timing issue? Is D58 planning to streamline a district-wide plan by grade and subject area of what is taught and when across the district rather than having all the schools teach everything at different times and perhaps in very different ways?

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It would be very helpful if all of the information can be posted in one place. I'm finding it hard to find information among emails, google docs, and information that's in the child's seesaw app but not the parent's app or vice versa.

It would be very helpful if parents could access the assignments and messages on Seesaw that the students get.

It would help to give a suggested time schedule (I. E. - 9-10am math, 11 am lunch etc) instead of having parents who are also working from home spending time making a schedule.

It wound be nice to try an actual recorded lesson via zoom where the teacher leads the lesson and shares their screen to show the work most helpful for math.

The kids want connection most

it'd be nice for the teacher to have 1:1 time with each child once a week. I understand that it's not feasible to have more than a 10-15 min interaction with ~20 kids, but I think even one meeting like that will go a long way.

it'd be good to see the teachers teach lessons on zoom not only facilitate general discussion.

It's been confusing figuring out what our child with an IEP needs to work on, and with several teachers giving their input, it is a lot to manage.

It's challenging with my Kindergartner. The packets sent home are very confusing. SeeSaw and Google classroom are much easier.

It's difficult for 2 full time working parents to also oversee e-learning, but I understand the circumstances we're under It's just too much for the little ones, they require constant supervision and guidance. It's too hard for two working parents to provide this guidance and I feel though his teacher is trying her best, my son is not getting much benefit from this. He frequently feels frustrated and lost, like many of us.

It's been frustrating keeping up with the many apps and websites needed. Sometimes there are password or technical issues that make it hard to keep up.

It's confusing to find the actual assignment. We receive lots of emails on what teachers are working on but no homework. Is there any extra work for my son to do once class is over? His day is done by noon but I feel there could be more actual school work he could be doing. I understand this is what we need to be doing and that it's tough on everyone but I do not like it. Thank you to teachers and staff for all they are doing.

It's difficult surfing through all of the teachers and assignments on the school's website. It would be helpful if the assignments were added to google classroom or one specific platform to keep us from having to search for them. My child has some assignments on google classroom, some of the teachers puts assignments on their own website, some are in emails, some on seesaw for my other child. It's just overwhelming at times wondering if you've completed all assignments or if we've failed to access them from all of the different places that we have to search.

It's difficult to keep track of which teachers are using Seesaw Family, Seesaw Class, Google forms, etc. for work, especially with young children who are all sharing the same one family device. It would be very helpful for classroom teachers and specials teachers to send reminders/Seesaw posts of Zoom meetings. There is A LOT to keep track of on top of working from home. The kindergarten work far exceeds the 60 minutes per day.

It's enough to do their main core subjects that take quite a lot of time! It would be great if we were not responsible for "Special Subjects" or maybe having ONE special subject that's different each week. Having a lesson to do for four special subjects on top of everything else is way to much!

It's very frustrating to open up so many links every day to get to the work. Can other grades have worksheets sent in a package just like Kindergarten? My 3rd grade child has trouble reading in the iPad.

Its can be more zoom for the learning not for games

Its really challenging to make sure we are completing everything. I feel like there are a lot of places to check.

its super frustrating and hard when the district keeps changing things, and you recommend 120 minutes, but my 3rd grader took all day today to finish her assignments, which was fine by me, but did take all day.

Kindergarten does not provide school issued ipads (understandably), but it is difficult to work a full time job and share my laptop for e-learning. I have twins too so they have to take turns doing their assignments which is extra time consuming.

Kindergarten is quite difficult to manage. The info is in different spots; district website, packet, seesaw, emails from multiple people with the links. We have missed meetings due to trying to navigate the different sources of info to find the login. It would be nice if all info was in one place, like the other grades

Kindergarten needs to be more streamlined- either a workbook packet that specifically tells you what pages to do each day or seasaw assignments only. Flipping back and forth between emails, links, seasaw and workbook is way too confusing!

Kindergarten plans are difficult to access because they are not centralized. Parents are asked to go to multiple websites, emails, seesaw and sort through our packet of printed materials to access the assignments for one day. For example, like other grades we go to the school website to access the Kindergarten plans for the week. But from that page we need to follow another link to get the detailed plan for that day (could they be consolidated into one)? Then we need to check seesaw activities because there may be slightly different or more detailed instructions on what to post. Plus we need to pull out the printed materials for the day and look for emails on the zoom meetings. This is just morning work and doesn't include OKEEP which requires a similar amount of effort to access and organize the assignments for each day.

Kindergartens need more math and science activities please. As many hands on, not just videos, please. Thanks.

's teachers and staff have been very helpful doing this time and it's been greatly appreciated.

Knowing the time expected for EACH assignment would be helpful vs. just overall time for the entire days assignments. Some days feel heavier than others in terms of workload/length of time for assignments even if same number of subjects are assigned.

Many links, apps do not work on school devices. My kids often need my computer and I am working as well.

Many of the assignments include links to content that do not work, do not view correctly on student iPads, etc. This is especially true with "Specials" (art, music, PE, etc). It is extremely frustrating for students and parents when the content does not work correctly. All content needs to be checked to make sure it is EASILY accessible and views correctly on student iPads.

Morning announcements should include important announcements only.

Many of the links didn't work or the school packet that was sent home was missing pages. To no fault of the teachers, it makes delays in learning and items are being omitted. I would like to see possibly more recorded ELA lessons at this age to get them started on the worksheet assignments. I have seen it in other grades above and below 2nd. I feel like the ELA is taking a long time each day and my child is having trouble getting started. Maybe a recorded lesson would help them start the assignment and then walk them through it.

We are doing our best but my student is struggling with being engaged in remote learning.

Many times, it is difficult to access outside links to videos. A login is needed, the link doesn't work, etc. My children get very frustrated at this and it throws off the entire assignment. This is partially why significant parental support is needed.

Math can use a little more instruction vs self learning. Having trouble accessing youtube on school ipad at time.

Math class done with Zoom would be a huge help

Math lessons have been the most challenging do support via remote learning. It has required a lot of parent involvement to get the assignments done.

Maybe considering new ways for students to connect with each other. I think students were used to seeing each other at school but had no shared the cell numbers.

Maybe give some more optional assignments for those that finish fast. More face-to-face instruction.

Maybe more school work, or projects and homework??? he has no homework and gets all his work done very quickly. If there were new topics in a zoom call or videos so they can learn new topics or subjects. that would be great!

Middle school remote learning has not required much parent involvement. Elementary has because I can't expect a 4th grader to sit and do all his work without supervision--at least my 4th grader:) Thank you for all you are doing to keep the kids learning while keeping their (and their family's) emotional wellbeing in mind.

Middle school students should be given more assignments. Our 8th grader is capable of doing more. Although she says she likes not having a lot to do. High school is giving our freshman son quite a bit to do daily.

More 1-on-1 teacher to student time would be nice. The group zoom is fun but I know my student would like 2 or 3 face to face meetings with the teacher.

More actual assignments. While they have provided some light learning to avoid summer brain drain, the approach has been bare minimum. This is the new normal and you have been far too slow to adjust.

More apps for other areas of learning

More assignments but with more flexible due dates would help fill the day. E learning is a very good thing.

More assignments for the kids to keep them busy for longer. The very first week of e learning I feel like they had more assignments and were engaged more than now, Also, more assignments for each subject, more reading and writing.

More class time on zoom. She only sees her classmates for 20 minutes every other day. To be honest, I thought more classes would be on zoom

More class time on zoom. She only sees her classmates for 20 minutes every other day. To be honest, I thought more classes would be on zoom

More e-learning, actively-engaged time. Projects, write papers, book reports, etc. Kids have too much free time.

More instruction and more learning needed. My kids are learning very little.

More interactions with a class/teacher via video conferences

More learning via virtual meetings

More live connections with teachers to ask questions AND to just have dialogue

More Zoom calls to read and go through the material with them to follow alone. The amount of work, takes 4x the amount of time in a day. Two parents with demanding jobs and a 3 year old, makes it very difficult to complete. Then to do it all over again the next day.

More Zoom calls with the teachers!

More zoom class time.

more zoom meeting! at least daily to run through assignments, check to see what is missing. Teachers need to email weekly on assignments turned in, confirm they have been received as we are finding the lessons are on so many different platforms and ipads are hard to navigate, can't tell if we are doing it correctly or not.

More Zoom meetings with teachers and classmates

Most days the work is a great amount. Usually they have two ELA assignments. Depending on what the reading is, and how the students are to respond to the questions asked, the ELA block goes well over the 30 minutes planned. If one of the assignments is a reading and then a grammar type and the other is writing, it seems to fit the time requirement much better then when they are both requiring written answers.

Most of struggle is links / ipad district firewalls etc. Transitioning between things requires parents.

More instruction videos / teaching moments with each lesson to explain to them what they're supposed to do would be great. Some Zoom lesson engagement would be great - one per week per subject perhaps - even if divided into smaller LTR groups. Would like them to hear the teacher Q&A with them to help them learn and be challenged a bit more. On the pure individual led, sometimes there's a tendency to work through too fast and not stop and think to ask questions etc.

Music and art class should be held via zoom. I think this would be a fun way for the kids to get together in a class setting. Music material is not easy to complete and I don't feel it's a priority at this time. I have spoken with some other parents and they feel the same.

Must have home room teachers combine info for full day/week. Including with all specials. Too many tabs in seesaw to have to keep track of. Too many things in different spots. It's incredibly frustrating. Seems like a solution would be for teachers to send out a simple word doc with chart. It would have columns for assignments, resources (any links to websites....that actually work), passcodes for zoom meetings, specials for the day with all relevant times and info. I know this is new for all but seems like too much confusion all around to even be worth it.

My 1st graded doing wonderful. My 6th grader is working hard but the teachers seem to be applying an awful lot of pressure with deadlines and threats of zeros? She's submitting her assignments but they aren't getting them so she is repeatedly sending them to the teachers. I am getting emails that she's not doing work and she is and I watch her resend them, it happens a lot. Additionally, I read that the e learning was supposed to be laid back with deadlines on turning things in, I'm not seeing this in her grade, she's doing her work daily but because they aren't getting them back the teachers emails are a bit pushy, especially for the children who haven't actually gotten the work done. My child's work is being done and turned in but for the children who aren't getting those emails as a parent could be very frustrating. There's already enough stress going on right now, emails with deadlines and threats of zero grades is not helpful at all.

My 3 kids love the zoom meetings with their teachers and classmates. It is so helpful because they can see everyone, ask questions if they need to and not feel so distant from those that they would normally see everyday. I think that the teachers and district are doing an incredible job during this strange time. Every communication is well prepared and timely.

All the teachers that my kids have at an analysis and activities for the kids to do. They have made it manageable for kids and parents trying to support multiple kids, multiple grades and still work. I also appreciate the teachers supporting the kids emotional well-being. Thank you to all district 58, you are amazing! Please know the students miss you as much as you miss them.

My 3rd grader has 2 hours per day, and my kindergardner has 4 hours per day, I find that a little strange? We hear that in Naperville, everyone logs into Zoom for the 2 hours of school, and they can ask the teacher live instead of parents. Can we have that here in Downers Grove as well please? That would help a lot.

My 3rd grader is getting significantly less work than my 1st grader. Also, the zoom meetings are very frustrating for my 1st grader when his teacher is trying to take care of her kids while running a meeting. I understand we are all trying to multitask but maybe figure something out that keeps your kids busy. 1st graders should not be able to mute and unmute themselves either.

My 3rd grader needs constant parent support, where my 5th grader needs moderate assistance and my 7th grader works independently. The younger grades need more parent interaction and you need to be aware and of that.

My 6 grade child is doing well with the e learning she's been able to do it independently "mostly" and work load seems adequate. My kindergartener obviously needs a lot more help but the work load and assignments are what I would consider to be adequate. My kindergartener does the okeep program while in school, I think this "extra" work is too much while balancing other aspects of life but the original kindergarten assignments are good and a good amount

My 7th grade student's chromebook freezes and glitches out while she does elearning at least 3-4 per week which has been very frustrating. What are the chances of her getting a new chromebook from District 58 that doesn't freeze?

My 7th grader is finished in less than 2 hours. (FYI--for future surveys maybe consider separating response by grade since responses may differ)

Please send the 7th grade schedule in a format that can be downloaded and manipulated. It would be nice to be able to delete rows of teachers that student doesn't have so they can print schedule of just their classes. The way it is posted now you have to print several pages and it's extremely cumbersome.

My 8th grader completes all of his work each day within 1.5-2 hours each day. However, my elementary age kids are doing their classwork for about 4-6 hours each day. That is not necessarily because they need extra assistance. My 8th grader is not getting the same amount of assignments as the younger kids. The 8th grade teachers should be requiring more work to be done instead of labeling things as "optional", I also feel they should be conducting more Zoom meetings and actually taking the opportunity to teach something instead of using Zoom meeting just to check in with kids.

My answer regarding the significant amount of support required was in response to my 2nd grade son. His need for significant support has little to do with the assignments themselves and mostly to do with my son as a learner. I am happy to give him all the support he needs to complete his assignments correctly and to the best of his abilities. My 5th grader requires very little support. I think the learning plans are fantastic!

My child - 4th grade - is definitely spending more than 2 hours/day on her regular classroom work (not counting extra optional projects). I'm not sure is she's just working more slowly than average, or if she has more work than she should. Otherwise I think the school and her teachers are doing a great job with this.

My child expressed that she isn't learning anything "new" and that it is review or busy work. Busy work is my term, things she already knew was my 6 year olds words. This concerns me.

My child has an IEP for dyslexia and social/emotional needs, so the amount of adult involvement is obviously higher than for most.

My child has had trouble accessing seesaw

My child is a good student, but there is nothing that could have prepared us for the stress we have day in and day out with two working parents and three young children, one being a toddler! The one thing that I've noticed is barely anything gets reviewed or graded that we turn in and it's been that way for weeks. I let my son do the assignment independently, but then I have to take time to grade it as I know if he's doing it wrong he's not going to understand why as we don't seem to get assignments or projects reviewed that we have worked so hard on. There was a grading rubric for a project he did 3 weeks ago. We've heard nothing back despite turning it in. He doesn't seem to think anything he is doing matters. It would also be great if the kids could hear back about young authors. They worked so hard to do it, and it wouldn't be much to give them a shout out or let them know what's happening with that. What else do these kids have. There also seem to be barely any live instruction videos from the teachers (maybe 5-10 minutes a week) just a lot of apps from the internet we watch. He really connects with hearing a lesson from a teacher vs another Mystery Doug or random YouTube video.

My child is an above average student but has needed quite a lot of support from me in order to work independently without the structure of a classroom setting. He seems to have a small meltdown each time he transitions to a different subject and has to "get going" on it, also when he has to begin an independent assignment (i.e., assignments that involve a more active role on the part of the student, like writing, critical thinking etc. as opposed to watching teacher's video lesson). Makes me wonder if he has those same feelings in school but just doesn't express them in front of the teacher and other kids! :). I'm sure many people are finding this to be the case and I'm not sure it can be helped. Just letting you know our experiences. As tough as it is, I do feel that 120 minutes of work isn't quite enough to keep the brain active and the skills sharp. I'd say maybe 3 - 4 would be better but I'm lucky enough to be in a position where I can support my child all day, whereas I know with many other families that is not the case.

My child is in 1st grade. She can't read the instructions to the assignments nor can she do them on her own. This requires me while working full time with other children at home to work one on one with her the entire time of remote learning. I am not a teacher and this is causing more stress than necessary for everyone in the house. The teachers should be doing zoom classroom teachings for All lessons for the same 90 minutes they are submitting worksheets for or recording lessons just like they would if they were teaching in school. The district can not expect the parents to teach the same way a teacher would.

My child is in DLP which is why she requires so much parental support. Her therapists and teachers have been extremely supportive and helpful. We appreciate all of the help and flexibility.

My child is not learning anything via e-learning. It is nothing but busy work and if I was not working with my child daily on learning new skills, they would be falling behind for next year. I don't understand why they can't be "in class" with a Zoom like meeting where the teacher presents and the students are in class. I also see several students that are not on any Zoom calls and others that miss sessions. How is that going to work next year when the teacher is now taking away time from my child and others to help these students "catch up" from what they are missing this year? I get it, not everyone has the ability or the patience to assist in the e-learning process so unfortunately, the school needs to do more. I appreciate all the communication and the teachers working with what they have but the truth is, e-learning needs a lot of work.

My child may be a stronger student, but my perception is that she is getting too little that is truly challenging her. She is completing her work in less than an hour on typical days.

My child scored 99% on MAP testing both reading and math and it takes us 4-5 hours a day to get through the basics.

Second graders can not work remotely with the excess amount of details required and the inability to directly message the teacher through message center in seesaw directly.

Has anyone in the administration or the teachers themselves ever tried to work on a child's iPad and write with a finger or with with a stylus?

I would love to see an adult-teacher-board member complete an assignment as child does and try and fill-in the little spaces with A prohibitive screen protector that does not allow anyone to do it ease let alone with a child who does not even have fully developed manual dexterity in a very small space to work—it is outrageously frustrating to watch and try and assist with.

It needs to be a YouTube video of how to make a child and parent lose their minds in 5 minutes or less.

Also Why is the system not set up for kids to message the teachers directly through messaging?

Because they are in second grade?

It's ridiculous.

You expect them to work remotely on an iPad and then do not have it set up to be able to message the teacher through the messaging centers.

And please don't tell me that they can contact the teacher directly with a phone call. Who's phone should they use?

A working parents?

It is currently set up that the working parent has to used their computer to email the teacher or allow the child to call the teacher on their phone.

And please do not tell me that each assignment allows the child ability to contact the teacher within it. It does not.

Any child of any age should be able to send a message before submitting an assignment.

After It's submitted too late.

We are teaching the children to rely upon the parents

for direction and to help navigate their iPads and assignments.

The glitches with the iPads coupled with the fact that the parent has to cross reference The schedule on a separate computer from the district website is so counter intuitive and the fact that the access is through the parent to the teacher is bananas.

I think next year is going to be a complete disaster because children are not doing anything independently because it's impossible.

Again—-Why am I having to look at my phone/ computer for my son to do his school work on his iPad?

Why isn't the weekly remote learning schedule accessible on the child's iPad for reference —So that all of the information is in one place?

There should be direct links to every assignment.

A seven or eight-year-old should simply have to click on the link and be directed to each and every assignment.

And most importantly—They should be able to message the teacher directly at all times through the messaging center with questions not through the parent.

I am not according that the teacher mode to rook, insuredictable but I am according that it is illeviable to accord a shill to be a

My child sees that his reading assignment should take 30 minutes. He slacks off and spaces out and after 30 minutes says he does not need to finish. Perhaps remove the posted times so students can not see this.

My child would like to have longer than 35 minute classes and would prefer to have all the teachers do some live teaching via zoom with additional reading and assignments as "homework".

My child would love more official/optional school work, but all that is offered is IXL and my child would love more than just IXL to continue/keep up her classroom learning. I feel like 6th grade would love to have more than just the 120 minutes of work.

My child would prefer to be at school. He is also having some emotional setbacks due to the fact that he is not in school and is missing the communication/collaboration/socialization that happens within the school day. My son is typically a very happy child but is struggling with all of this. Any chance Social workers could be providing tips or suggestions for those students who are struggling.

My child's teacher told them to sit in a quiet space without others or sound for their Zoom calls, but she herself hosts the call with her one year old screaming in her lap!

My child's 504 plan is not being followed. The district is behind on creating appropriate instruction to meet the mandates outlined in the 504 plan. Now that the remainder of the school year will be remote learning, the district needs to rapidly create appropriate instruction for students with 504 plans and IEP's.

My children do not have access to their PE options and reflections. They have been doing their own PE activities. Also, I am very concerned about my child moving forward with learning in areas of concern for her. Because she only has a 504 plan she is not a "priority" for special education help. She has a documented learning disorder by a pediatric neuropsychologist. I am extremely disappointed in the district for 1) not granting her an IEP, as it is now so apparent as to why she needs one and 2) that the lack of action over the past two years to help her will further hurt her learning and anxiety issues (which were also documented in her report).

My daughter in 8th grade has a heavy class day and a lighter day the way her schedule works out. Her heavy days she can spend the majority of the day into the evening getting her work done. This wears on her and takes way more time than the district suggests. Reading/LA work alone is at least an hour and half. I do not think the middle school teachers are taking into account these kids have 7 classes total. I'm finding her to have a lot of stress and too much work.

My daughter is at the local high school and has learning days Monday - Thursday with office hours for help and guidance. This would be a suggestion that I have ford district 58. It would allow time to make up missed assignments or make up work that I was unable to assist with during the week.

My daughter is done with work on SeeSaw in probably 30 minutes. She may ask us a question or two but that is it. She does her reading, too, but she reads all the time so that isn't really a big deal. I see very little feedback from the teacher on her work. Yesterday the feedback I saw was "the question is wrong and I miss you, too." I asked the teacher to explain why the question was wrong because my husband and I didn't understand the question either and she did, but that is really the extent to the feedback. To be honest, this is not a new issue with the teacher (lack of feedback) but it seems especially an issue now with elearning and littler actually contact with my child and the teacher. It is especially in stark contrast to what I see my kindergarten student getting from his teacher. I have questioned the teacher several times over the year regarding the math work, for example, and have been pushed off. The reading homework, for example, was a joke all year. She sent homework that was WAY below my child's reading level and told me, even after I told her I was a reading specialist and it needed to be at a higher level, that it would get harder, that it would but it never did. I realize that teaching in this situation is hard/unprecedented but I don't feel like my child is getting any sort of actual teaching/learning at this point. I have been frustrated with the math all year and I don't see that changing. She does three Zoom check-ins for SEL a week and that is it. Great. The library teacher does a Zoom, too. What exactly should my 2 grader be learning right now, because I don't feel like she is doing much honestly? She has earned 3 Girl Scout badges with me. She is building Snap Ciruits and Legos with her brother. All good things. What about actual math? Science--which again--she didn't really do a whole lot during the year so I guess I should not expect anything now. I have looked at the slides on SeeSaw but it doesn't seem like much. The Kindergarten teacher is offering a Parent Zoom.

I know that every household is different. I know ISBE sets regulations. I am fortunate to be able to help my kids through
learning. I just feel like my 2 grader is doing a lot less work than my kindergartner is. And I am frustrated. I have kind of felt that
way all year, but seeing it at home, during elearning, is making it more clear.

My daughter needs a little more direction/videos on new concepts. It is really causing her a lot of stress. She does reach out to the teacher, but it is hard to learn new concepts during remote learning.

my daughter needs more examples of how to do math problems - other than what I look up on the web.

My daughter participated in OKEEP at Lester. The teachers provide a variety of interesting and engaging activities to do, but it is WAY TOO MUCH. We can spend from 9-noon doing schoolwork daily and still not get done with what was assigned. Also trying to find the Kindergarten packet page and figuring out what all the assignments are each day is A NIGHTMARE. To many expectations. I am going to start picking and choosing assignments myself. I am stressed out, my daughter is stressed out just from me reading the instructions on what to do for a Seesaw assignment. She is shutting down on me before we even start because the instructions have so many steps. NEED TO HAVE LOWER EXPECTATIONS FIR THESE 5-6 year olds. Stressed out before 1st grade is ridiculous. Teacher is supportive and understands my child will be turning in less work in the future.

My daughter, right now has 3 teachers providing Zoom meeting but sometime the meeting times were conflict. It will help if the teachers are coordinate time.

My daughter's teacher's assumptions of what my daughter's abilities are with her Chromebook are above her understanding/capabilities and need to be better explained/spelled out in the assignments. My spouse and I do use computers in our WFH jobs, but we are not computer savvy and do not have the ability to assist our daughter when she has a question or issue about how to do homework with the Chromebook. We are old school paper and pen/pencil people and do not understand the applications that she has to complete her assignments in. We attempt to do so, but if she is lost, we can e-mail a teacher. But having an 4-5 minute video response from the teacher just goes to show how difficult a process it is to complete a "simple" step.

I do not believe these kids should be required to submit completed work via a means that they don't understand and their teachers indicate they have multiple students responding daily they are having difficulties with. Don't dumb down the assignment but dumb down the technological way in which an 8 or 9 year old has to complete an assignment. They are not all little IT robots.

And please consider the WFH parents who have an 8hr. job on top of this. We aren't trained nor compensated to now be stay at home educators in addition to completing our other obligations and trying to keep kids engaged in their education at the same time.

My family greatly appreciates how wonderful our district is! The administration and teachers' support and commitment to my children's health and well-being is second-to-none. THANK YOU!

My first grader needs more support than my 4th grader with content and technology. I like how my 4th grader has a set Zoom time. I wish my first grader did too to make managing me job and their work easier.

My greatest frustration has been the links in the documents. Sometimes, they work, sometimes they don't. Being a teacher myself, I need my computer for my own work and communication with my students, so giving up my device so my daughter can watch her online videos or do her online activities is not always easy. Is there a way for teachers to login as a student to make sure the links actually work on the kids devices?

My kids are receiving assignments that take more than the 120 minutes, which I am 1000% in support of! I wish there was an easier way for the kids to print worksheets so they could write on them instead of completing electronically. Thanks for all your efforts!!!

My kids report that all class assignments should be posted on google classroom so that there is one place to look for what they need to do. Some use Seesaw and the PE teacher is not using either at the class of th

My kids seem to be a little confused about what to do for PE and how they need to track that info. Ms. when the children feel part of their class and it is working.

My Kindergarten student is getting WAY too many assignments. It's taking her 2 hours to complete just the morning work alone and that's not including OKEEP work. I'm so frustrated by the amount of assignments that I might just stop looking at the OKEEP stuff altogether, which is frustrating since there's a cost associated with this program. At her age I need to work 1:1 with her and it's really frustrating to have this many assignments. This needs to be consolidated to focus on what she really needs to learn in order to not be behind going into 1st grade. Side note: I also have a first grade student and he is getting the perfect amount of work to be completed each day. The daily zoom call at the same time each day is fantastic. Everything is very organized and easy to find/understand. He can complete ALL his work within 2-2.5 hrs per day. My Kindergarten student should NOT have more work than 1st grade. Thanks.

My kindergarten student needs more help than my 2nd grader and this takes more than the 90 minutes (she is in OKEEP) outlined by the district. Therefore I made the decision that we can't always finish the assignments; we do what we can as a family. In examining the Google docs where her assignments are outlined, at first I didn't realize words were hyperlinked and I needed to click on them for more info. It takes some time to discern where to get the right info between Google docs, SeeSaw and the printed packet sent home.

Her brother (2nd) can handle assignments independently and is able to figure out the technology/submission requirements. He said he wishes his week of assignments was loaded into Seesaw at one time so he can plow through everything at his (advanced) pace.

my Kindergartener is struggling with the amount of work with the additional OKeep assignments plus specials, averaging 4-5 hours to complete the 7-8 assignments with a parent each day. The amount of time suggested for each activity is greatly underestimated for this level.

My kindergartner is advanced in reading and math and I would love to see him receive more challenging work that reflects his level

My middle schooler is done daily by noon most days not enough content and or no new learning. My child is not a stellar student either but he is breezing through this or failing and I don't know it.

My only feedback would be to make sure that the assignments are always listed in Google Classroom and the students don't have to look other places to get the assignment. (For example, starting at the Google Classroom, then have to go to the ONeill home page to access the specific grade page to then access what the LRC teacher has assigned.)

My response about difficult to access was in regards to some of the specials. There have been some Music assignments where the video didn't work, and it would be helpful if PE was posted in Seesaw along with the other assignments.

My second grader could do more work and we appreciate the teacher giving us other options if she finishes early

My second grader needs a parent to help with all her assignments. I think it is hard for a 7 y/o to learn over the computer. The teachers are doing a great job trying to teach them. My other kids are doing ok.

My second grader workload is a little light, but she is generally busy most of the morning. Daily Zoom meeting first thing in the morning has been very successful for her.

However, my 7th grader workload is much too light. She is often complete with all her work by 10am. Would be helpful if each teacher could provide assignments everyday or at least more than every other day. Also I think more use of video calls would be beneficial for my 7th grader.

My sixth grader is sent some assignment attachments as pictures rather than being easily accessible through Google Docs or Seesaw, etc. We then have to format the picture to print so that my son can read/access to complete filling out the assignment. This could be automated so the kids can more easily access.

I feel my kids understand and better connect to content when it's being read/explained by the teachers. Linking to YouTube or BrainPop is used for my second grader to explain math/science concepts. This has been helpful, but would love to also have a screencast of the lesson by the teacher to drive the points home.

My son doesn't know how to print off the Chromebook, getting access to documents, finding or getting Zoom links, finding where assignments are posted. I realize you are telling kids where to go to access these things, but for whatever reason, he is not having success. I find it amazing that he can access video games, but not these things! Not sure if he was getting this even while in school? I'm concerned about if this e learning goes into the Fall.

My son is finished way too soon, he needs more work. He is done by noon. It is too easy for him, he needs more of a challenge. The first two weeks of e-learning were perfect for him/us. Academically, he needs more.

My son is finishing quickly and doesn't want help from me. But the problem is, I am not sure he is getting enough feedback from his teacher. He may need more assignments that are NOT optional.

My son is in 7th grade and is done with his work in 30-45 minutes. Is this the norm? My 2nd grade son does work for 3-4 hours. The assignments my 7th grader is getting seem very basic.

It would be nice if everything was in seesaw for my 2nd grader. I work full time, and we are constantly going from seesaw to the online word doc to pull his assignments up that aren't on seesaw. It would be much easier if he could grab them all from seesaw himself.

My son is not being challenged. He seems to do schoolwork for no more than an hour a day. I think the teachers and school need to offer additional learning opportunities.

My son keeps getting assignments on YouTube but it is blocked. I ha w told his teachers this.

My son was not completing assignments and his teacher let it go for a long time before she notified us. It's too difficult for us to determine what is due for what class on what day. We had no idea that he was not doing assignments and even missing Zoom sessions.

My son with an IEP is getting very little direct support. He gets a 1:1 aide at school. We have only received Speech once, OT 3 times, and 2 meetings with his resource teacher in the entire month he has been home. I'm sure they are all busy but a bit more of his IEP supports would be appreciated.

My son with special needs (Down Syndrome) needs significant support from me during his e-learning. He cannot complete any of the work without my direction or support. I have a lot of support through the D58 team and am grateful they are lending help with behavior concerns, self-help skills while we are home, and encouragement (for me)! This is the first time I have had to spend 100% of my time with my son. I rely on school, outside therapies, extracurricular activities, and play-dates to fill our days. The impact on his (and my) emotional state is significant. Having strong plans for when we return on re-acclimating back to school will be critical. I am fairly sure he will need additional social-emotional support upon returning to school.

My son's teacher is awesome. She is doing a great job trying to keep him engaged and learning. She give feedback which helps him (and me) know when he does a good job and when he needs to work on an area. It isn't easy for him, in K, to do this type of learning. But the variety and chunking of activities helps. It isn't easy for me to get to all of it some days but that is on me because I work (high school teacher, so this is not my area of expertise, but I understand it some). I admit I choose to skip some things like the SEL journals—why bother?. I am ok with that. I don't do all the OKEEP work even though I pay for OKEEP and am ok with paying for OKEEP. Some days I need to send him to the basement to play with LEGOS or to go outside with his sister so I can get my work done. I like to have the options though I do worry, because I sent his neuropsuch evaluation to Ms. March 5 and I know it won't be dealt with this school year. He has definite deficits that need to be dealt with—how will the district handle that? I know he is going to fall behind, even more so with this, because of it. How will you help him next fall (or spring because I don't know what fall will look like). I don't have the time to work on his writing like he needs write now either. He has phonics deficits as well. Who is going to help him when school resumes? How are you preparing to help the kids who are behind next fall with these kinds of skills?

The Zooms with the teacher & specials for my son have been great. We've missed a couple but that is ok.

Also--my experience with my daughter is very different. Filling out a separate form for her.

My struggle with my 4th grader likely can't be solved, but I do admit as a HH with 2 working parents and a child who is not self motivated it's hard to keep her progressing through her work on a given day. The clearer layout in the weekly assignments does help. I also do not feel the amount of work is too much. It's simply the case that for her, she is missing the structure of a classroom and continual guidance from a teacher (and peers) to keep her moving along. That is the hardest part for me as a working parent as I do not have the time to continually prod her along - any guidance on that front to help us help our kids stay on task could be helpful. I'm sure I'm not the only one feeling this way and do recognize this is not easy to solve.

my student feels that assignments are often busy work with little to no instruction; disappointed to see just how little "teaching" is going on by our teachers; while zoom check ins are useful, it does not seem like zoom is being used effectively for instruction; while most teachers are very good at follow-up, 1-2 do not reply to emails and/or have replied without the requested information

Not a fan of having to go to the district website to print off weekly lesson plans. It's just one more thing that we as parents have to do. Also, am interested on how our children are being graded when we have some children that struggle with motivation and assignments are not always the priority in a day for that child.

Not a fan of zoom

Not all applications appear the same way across kindle fire and ipad tablets. Not all families have the luxury of multiple devices to accommodate application inconsistencies.

Not all teachers are using Seesaw to send Zoom meeting info to the kids. Instead, they are sending emails to parents, which removes the ability for students to access the meeting independently. It would be easier if all of the teachers sent Zoom links directly to the kids via seesaw.

Not all video links work through seesaw. Please provide other ways to access.

Not enough work given to students

Not every teacher assigns daily work to be done and most of the work assigned is too little and far too easy. For the remainder of this academic year, challenge your students and give them a full school day worth of work. You are not doing them any favors by making the assignments too lean and too easy.

Now that we are officially remote for remainder of school year, I think the teachers should collaborate on some video lessons. For example, New Lenox district has each grade level teachers team up to provide short video lessons for each grade. With 13 DG schools, that would be 26 x 2nd grade teachers that can individually provide video lessons to share with all of the 2nd grade classes. With so many teachers in each grade level, it will spread out the work so each teacher is not overwhelmed doing it all. You can view examples here: http://www.nlsd122.org/

Click on e-learning - so students are hearing lessons from their teacher, along with other teachers throughout the district teaching the same grade level.

Now that we have found out schools are closed for the remainder for the year, I would like the teachers to teach during their zoom calls. The personal and social connection is great but we send our children to school to learn from the teachers, not to have the parents sit and help teach, while also working from home full time. Very happy on the interaction with my daughters teacher...disappointed with my sons teacher. Higher expectations need to be placed on the teachers to do what they are paid to do...teach.

Often, the links shared through the google doc do not work on the school iPad. Sometimes they are blocked or we have difficulty accessing. Often, we have to use my work computer to access which is not ideal. Overall my daughter is self-sufficient with technology but because of the challenges with the links, she requires more of our involvement. I'm not sure if the teachers are able to test the access when they build the classes but it would be super helpful is someone did so that these could be resolved before the class. It creates a lot of unnecessary frustration for the child and the parents. It may also be helpful that the teacher goes through an overview of the lessons each week. Maybe she can record a brief overview to include in Seesaw for the student to watch each Monday? It would help set expectations for the student and family.

On point as usual. Stay well!!

Once e-learning is posted Sunday night- when families are prepping. Please don't change things Monday morning. Then we have to go back in again and change our plans for the week. Many of us are 2 parent essential workers. Planning the night before is key for us.

One document that has all of the Zoom dates and times and links for the week combining classroom Zooms and specials Zooms.

One thing I think DG58 should reconsider is iPads for K. We completed the district survey for device access but that's a false representation of what is needed. These kiddos need their own device, not a shared household device. The latter is not sufficient to their "workload".

Open the schools

Or two sons do not do well on electronic devices and prefer paper and books. Making paper or school books available to those children would be no e

Other teachers need to take Mrs. "s lead.

Also, can you post the OKEEP lessons on the website too. It is extremely annoying to bounce back and forth between the district website and the email link for OKEEP.

Our 2nd grader is hugely struggling with e-learning. He needs lots of guidance and support which we cannot give during the day since we are working from home. It would be great if live teacher lectures could be worked in for the younger grades rather than everything being so self guided (not a problem for our older kids). Also the way in which assignments are accessed can be confusing (having to scan badges, use different passwords, on different sites, etc.)-would be nice if they were all in one place.

Our biggest challenge is every thing is online/screen time. Making it easy to get sidetracked and to start scrolling thru content on SeeSaw. There's been some task/time management issues. Since everything has been online there are few opportunities to work on hand writing.

Our child is not learning. She needs a teacher teaching the material, not a bunch of online tests.

Our class zoom meetings are not very productive. Our teacher is very distracted by her small children. She forgets to call on some students and they are upset afterwards that they didn't get to share. She calls on some students twice. We have a large class and wish there was possibly a smaller group chat at some point, or some way to get more of the teachers attention individually. She relies on the students to mute themselves sometimes, and that's not reliable, so sometimes as she's reading or talking, the video feed of some of the kids pop up and is very distracting for my child.

Our computer skills were not quite up to the demands.

Our daughter is having no issues, no challenging assignments. We feel like she can handle another hour (or two) of work. She'll be in high school next year and we're worried that her slide will be especially significant given the leap in rigor, like all 8th graders).

Our family has 2 working parents and we are fortunate to be able to also work from home, but that being said, I feel the amount of hands on learning that has to happen with my kindergartener is difficult for us to always tackle with our already busy work schedules (we are constantly on the phone and on zoom calls ourselves with work). My older children are pretty self-sufficient and can use seesaw adequately to follow directions and do their work, but the younger one has proven to be challenging because of all the support that is needed to get her set up on see saw, the right sheet in the packet, etc. I am very happy with the work that is being presented for my okeep kinder student, but I think some of the "extras" are too much and this includes the amount of zoom meetings at this level. If the zoom meetings/requirements could be less throughout the week, I think it would be best (at least for our family). Thank you for all that the district is doing! Please know that we are also doing our best to adjust to having 2 full time jobs at home during these unprecedented times and making sure that our children are engaged and doing what they are supposed to.

Our family likes the lesser amount of emails coming in compared to the previous e-learning and the now more centralized communication system.

Our first grade teachers are doing a great job. The work amount is appropriate but it does take parent assistance to get it done so it is consuming much time but thats the current situations we are in. I love that that they are keeping the SEL component of keeping the kid and teacher connected through Zoom. This age level needs that to keep school fun.

Our kids' PE, music, and art assignments aren't included within specific day assignments and instead at the end of their weekly assignment sheet. It would be much more helpful to have those assignments within specific days. We've now twice mistakenly not seen those until the end of the week and then have a lot of work to catch up on at the end of the week.

Our only challenge is with our first grader. All of the assignment links are on the school webpage. That means, we have to go online each and every time we need to access a video. I thought about just saving the links to her Google drive to make it easy, but my first grader doesn't have access to her Google Drive yet. I would prefer the links for assignments to be on Seasaw or to be accessible on Google Drive so that we don't have to search the website each time. It would also make it so that my first grader does not have to get my help each and every time there is a video. I am working from home and have three kids I am helping. This small change would make a huge difference.

Our only hang up so far is that our packet did not come for our Kindergarten student, so that has been quite a bit of circling back and printing etc. Luckily, we can print, so it hasn't been a huge deal yet and it sounds like a packet can be re-sent. Miss has been outstanding with providing all the material we need and additional resources and following up with the packet delivery!

Our son has multiple teachers i.e. - social workers, ST, OT and the teacher all emailing us at the same time. It's a lot of people to respond to and keep updated with when everyone is emailing and notifying us at different times that you may miss some of it. The district is also sending a lot of emails so it's just a whole lot at the same time and just needs to be more simple and to the point. I'm pretty tech savvy but it's still pretty overwhelming to keep up with everything. I know this is a learning experience for everyone involved and maybe it's something we just need to update too. Our son has benefited the most out of the videos being posted in Seesaw especially for his age. I do appreciate what everyone is doing and I hope this isn't just about negativity. I know you are all working really hard and I appreciate it. Just trying to give some positive feedback because it's hard to keep up with everyone and everything. Thanks for all your hard work!

Our son is able to understand all of the assignments, but focusing at home is difficult. The work is not challenging enough for him so he gets bored. He engages much more with video art work (this week's watercolor film Mr.) and physical activity (scavenger hunts). When we are able to remove his little sister from the learning space, it is significantly better for him. However, at this point, we feel it is more effective for him to use his time reading (he typically reads 1-2 hours on his own, after we read together, every evening), doing a couple art activities every week, exercising (thank you to the PE teachers), and completing 1-2 of the curricular assignments that are the most challenging/upper level for him.

I am a high school educator and, of course, I want kids to continue learning. But, for the younger kids especially, right now I believe it would a better use of our quarantine time to give play-based projects (see https://www.tinkergarten.com/blog). I know this is not possible for all parents to do, but because I am also trying to work from home, introducing a space for creative play would be much less stress for our family. I think a morning journal and math problem is important. One science and social studies activity a week would be cool. Less, I think, is more, right now. We run the risk of it feeling like busy work when it is, in fact, excellent curriculum.

That said, I appreciate all the district has done and especially the teachers (Mrs. 1988), Mr. 1988, etc.) have created. More freedom right now is key for mental health.

Our student has way too little work. I'm not necessarily asking for more busy work, but requiring a deeper and more thorough understanding of concepts of our student would be greatly appreciated. The assigned work for the day is completed in less than and hour. We've always left the responsibility up to our kid to get things done, but I have no independent access to assignments or finished work or teacher feedback to monitor actual work and to really be a support to our student.

Our support from our Teachers, after spending time teaching our children I hope everyone realizes how special our Teachers are. Well done district 58.

Our teachers and staff are AMAZING! SO AMAZING in how you've adapted so quickly and your level of support is truly felt in my house by both kids and parents.

our Third grader's plan is very organized, however there is definitely not enough work. On most days he is able to complete under an hour, we supplement with additional work but feel he could use more. Our first grader's plan is very hard to follow, need centralized plans having to go to multiple sites while trying to work/teach is too difficult. She is not having to submit much which is worrisome because it leaves us to check the work, which is fine, but my son submits everything and gets more interaction with his teacher.

Our Zoom class/check-ins have not been very long. I would like to see more instruction or coverage of subjects each day so the kids can get more teacher face time and help the load of school work at home.

Our zoom times for the week is different everyday and it is hard to remember what days are what time. I think it would be easier if everyday the kids have a scheduled zoom session it's at the exact same time. Not Tues, 10am Wed 5pm Thur 2pm it's just a lot.

Overall I think you've all done a terrific job in a very short time! We are very appreciative of the teachers and staff. My feedback: I don't think there is issue with the amount of information/communication. But figuring out where to access the plans (we are also Okeep so half of the lessons on the website, half found in an email), keeping track of the various zooms throughout the week and figuring out where to submit homework (seesaw or not) is challenging. I'm not sure how to make it better, but there are a lot of papers, modes of communication and tools. We are also both working so juggling a lot. I also feel some days it's a lot of work for a kindergartner, but perhaps it's skewed because we are both working and finding time to sit down and home school is challenging.

Overall I've been very happy with how this has all been handled! The teachers and admin are working hard to make this as simple as possible for families to figure out. My kids have been able to stay on top of their work pretty easily. My only suggestion is for a few additional assignments that don't involve the iPad, things to get the kids moving. examples: count how many rooms in your house and multiply that number by 5, measure the height of each person in your family and divide to find your family's average height. Simple stuff like that.

Overall things are going well though we notice they are missing their social interaction with friends. We are having different experiences per child with the eLearning so I am grateful. I can respond to this survey twice. For our fourth grader, he is working pretty independently and we aren't always checking his work. Occasionally we do and we have found some errors. We haven't quite worked out how to go back and review work that the teacher grades to ensure he learns from the mistakes that he made. When he does recognize that he needs help as he is doing an assignment, he usually asks, but if both parents are working or occupied it can be very difficult to provide timely support and/or to stay on schedule.

overall, going much better than expected. Slightly difficul because i am still working, but not too bad. Definitely doable. Very appreciative of all of the hard work our teachers and everyone is putting in to this.

Overall, going well. Just not enough. My son is done with his work before noon each day.

Overall, I would like to see feedback on the assignments. I have seen a lot of feedback on Math but very little elsewhere. If mistakes are being made, questions should be asked to the kids or corrections should be shown. It's a big piece missing at this level.

Packets are currently arranged by topic (math, ELA, etc). It would be really helpful if the packets were arranged by day - currently taking me significant time to dig through packet and arrange the day. I'm spending 3+ hours a day to get the work done.

Per DPH, CDC, WebMD, and Google searches, developmentally, teens are transitioning childhood to young adulthood. Peer relationships are instrumental in their lives. One of the largest downfalls of elearning is that the students aren't expected to learn together in a live classroom or live group format. Creating group projects, peer editing and so on seem doable with the technology of today. Not everyone has the luxury of WiFi or the ability to learn without supervision, yet those who can should be expected to learn from the instructor and each other.

During this period of remote learning, the educational expectations should be just as high as when they are at school. (with the understanding that all situations are different and not everyone can achieve it). At this point, my husband, my son and do not see that. He feels all he is doing is homework for 1.5 hrs a day. Between raising two special needs kids and working, I do not have the ability to set up a curriculum for my teen and enforce him to complete it. That is the role of the teacher which can be accomplished through elearning.

Thank you for what you have done! As we continue, let's not sell our children nor their education short. Thank you for reading this feedback with an open mind.

Perhaps a little less of games that require parents to play as we are still working our own jobs. Don't get me wrong-interaction is good, but playing multiple games during the day across subject areas can be challenging.

Perhaps a one-on-one Zoom call for 10 minutes a week with their home room teacher.

Perhaps giving each kid a stylus or putting one on the supply list. A lot of the work on the iPad requires you to write an answer and using a text box can be cumbersome.

Plans from multiple teachers and having to fill out worksheets online is very hard for parent to help provide instruction. It's very hard to have multiple teachers with multiple links on multiple platforms.

Please continue to make art/music/P.E. optional. We can do these things on our own at home.

PLEASE Do not have open seesaw accounts where every student in the class can see all other students work submitted. PLEASE Do not give ANY assignments that need to be printed out. Not everyone has access to a printer. Or, the money to be spending on ink. Also, accessing assignments school website are not child friendly. My child is not able to look up the district site, then locate the school website, then open the grade level link, and follow the assignment list, which can be different from what seesaw says. Sometimes the assignments listed on the website vary from what is on seesaw. It is confusing. It's also confusing to see assignment links listed on the website and not sure if the same link is on seesaw. The links don't always open on the website.

Please encourage teachers to use zoom or other face to face applications for learning, teaching and engagement for their classes

Please explain why teachers cannot teach via zoom. I see very little instruction going on by my kids teachers. There are ways to continue instruction and teach new concepts so they r not just repeating or trying to teach themselves independently.

Please facilitate more class discussion during Zoom meetings. Our children get disappointed when they don't get a chance to share/communicate with classmates and the teacher. Thank you!!

please find a better, more secure video call tool for children.

Please give more assistance with writing assignments. It's hard for parents to know exactly what the expectations are for the kids.

Please have all communication come from just the main teacher in the form of a weekly timetable of all subject calls and what work needs to be completed. Also writing and drawing on the seesaw app is inaccurate and hard.

Please have everything easily available on child's iPad. I dislike having to go back and forth from the parent app to my childrens.

Please keep each period's interaction/assignments within the period's time slot, so the student isn't expected to be interacting with two teachers at the same time, and also so the student can keep track of who she's supposed to be interacting with at any given time. It's ok to compress all of the time slots, but keep a first period time slot which is only for first period, for example. Students shouldn't be expected to do third period interactions during the first period time slot, or first period interactions during the fourth period time slot. It's been a problem. Also, for newly assigned interactions for a given day, make sure the students are notified of those before the end of the last period for the previous day. A 9:00am notification of an 11:00 interaction on that same day, is easy to overlook, if the student is busy working on other assignments, and especially if that 11:00 interaction is for the first or second period class. That's also been a problem.

Please keep the assignment process consistent as much as possible. It is difficult to be bounced to different websites and other portals.

Please keep the weekly plan so parents can plan the week accordingly. The consist format across teachers is also key to help ease the pre planning time.

Please limit emails, just post assignments on seesaw (one place, so there's no confusion). Also plz zoom meetings should be at one time, I have multiple children, my husband is recovering from covid19 and we are working plus taking care of house work and children. It's very difficult to remember zoom meeting timing multiple times a day that keeps changing. Thank you Please make sure teachers are being explicit with the details and requirements of assignments.

Please make sure the kids get a copy of their assignments in SEESAW besides posting on the DG58> Whittier page. Is PE, Music, library time required? Believe me, my kids are getting A LOT of exercise, ALL the creative time and music but these are "just one more thing" to add to our list to complete. Also, are you able to provide any indication for grade levels that receive LETTER grades on report cards, will that be the case for this semester or will it be PASS/FAIL? Thank you!

Please make the Weekly Learning Plan google doc automatically available on the kids' ipads

Please provide new reading and math concepts. Stay away from any work from the specials outside of the library special. The work for the okeep program is minimal at best. It does not add to any new concepts and for what we paid for that program, it's unfortunate that I feel I have to come up with my homework for my child.

Please reconsider Elearning from specials! Parents I know all feel the same. These assignments should be optional. Our children are getting enrichment at home. My children do not need to have Elearning for gym, art and library. We are playing outside, doing crafts and reading. It's one more thing for us to have to do (and specials work always seems to have barriers including additional logins, etc). Our children need to focus on the basics during these times with work from school.

Please send over written morning announcements. My videos have no audio--hope i am not missing anything important Please stop with all the specials besides library. There needs to be a much higher focus on new concepts in both reading and math.

Please, please replace some of the older kid SEL daily Zoom meetings with actual teaching/lessons. I know that live teaching can't be frequent especially if kids are being taught in small groups but especially in grades 3-6, I would much rather have ONE or TWO actual lessons taught via zoom than the 5-8 SEL zoom meetings we are currently having weekly. Please send math practice. It doesn't need to be a ton. Just a little bit to keep them moving. No new math concepts are being taught yet. A 4 minute brain pop review video as the entire math lesson for the day is not enough in 3rd grade. Seesaw is great for turning in work but hard to find old post/notes etc. We often wake up to 100 plus notifications times multiple kids and it is hard to keep up with. Emailed or google classroom assignments are easier to go back and find.

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prefer learning to be book based!

Prior to spring break, we were massively overwhelmed with the amount of academic work & it was generating a lot of tension. Since spring break, things are running much more smoothly, so the changes you made are absolutely positive for our household!

Probably not give the "option" to check in with they're teachers, because they just don't do it. Would be good that they have an assigned day and time to have to check in with teachers that way they stay engaged and accountable.

Problems with technology (apps/websites glitching, passwords not working, assignments not getting saved/transmitted properly) have been a cause of some frustration.

Provide an incentive to the children to participate in the optional activities...

Provide more "optional" assignments for students who are finishing their day in less than an hour and a half.

Push out plans for the week on the weekend, for those parents who still work it makes it difficult to set up a home learning plan with the child because the information is pushed out the day of on the applications.

Put all links into one document so that students (especially younger) can access all they need to right in one doc. Requiring them to read multiple (extensive directions) then follow several-step instructions is not creating a learning environment encouraging independence. We often have 3 devices open at once for 1 student (in a multi-student household). Example: 'choice boards' daily with links embedded for younger students. really think we should be getting more video/zoom more face interactions with teachers. Why only a few moments. Please let the kids see their teacher more and interact with learning. Kids need and crave it. They want more then just you tube on ipads. sad, talk to them more and teach them.

Really? Kindergarten in okeep is supposed to get 60+60=120 minutes of learning but grades 1/2 only need 90 minutes? My guess is this is to compensate the fact that the district is forcing us to continue paying \$255/ month for services that our children are NOT receiving. Other IL districts with optional full day K have provided refunds or are not accepting payments. Let's also remember that most K kids cannot read coursework instructions so parents that are still WORKING from home need to actually work with the kids for the full 120 minutes. On top of that, our home only has one parent at home during this time. I think the 120 minute expectation is setting the kids and parents up for failure.

If this goes on another month, the district should face the fact that 120 minutes for K is unreasonable and not accept okeep payments.

Recorded or live webinar classes - ability to teach new concepts rather than relying on them to teach themselves. Even if only for an hour per day and across various subjects or prerecorded, it helps to have teacher explain concepts to students.

Regarding the engagement minutes, I have a Kindergartener and 1st grader and the time they each need to complete their work seems to be a lot more than the time given, which is fine, but its the reason I indicated "slightly too much" since my time is spread between the two and they both need me significantly to get their work done. So far, we've done okay spacing it out to get it done on another day if we can't get it done the day it's assigned so I really don't mind the amount of work, it just doesn't get done in that amount of time. My 5th grader is given a good amount of work but is more self-sufficient and usually gets it done in the time allotted.

For me, the learning curve with figuring out how to get into apps, websites, etc... took some time and was a main source of frustration. Most of that information was made available to me ahead of time once I searched for it but in some cases, it didn't seem obvious what to do. For example, there was a music video for my 1st grader that we had to log into and I had no idea how to get to it. My 5th grader knew what to do because she had seen it before but if she didn't, I wouldn't have been able to get into it for him to watch and complete the assignment. It just wasn't obvious what I was supposed to do. The back and forth between SeeSaw and the weekly plans was frustrating at first but once we got a routine down, it actually works fairly well. For the most part it seems like everyone is really trying their best and this is all new to so I don't mind the glitches and random things that can be a source of frustration. I love that my 1st grader has zoom calls with his teacher (leach morning and she incorporates a lesson and a fun thing for them to do in each call. I also like that my 5th grader has zoom meetings with her on most days and she does a similar format - something fun and something related to a lesson. Our kindergarten zooms have not gone quite as well so I would love for those to improve but my kindergartener has had really great individual and group meetings with her math and reading interventionists (and . I love the use of zoom 's daily announcements! I feel that our family to keep the kids engaged and connected to the school. We love Mr. definitely misses school but everyone is making the best of the situation and hopefully continues to learn more and more so that we can pick up and move forward whenever we are able to.

Reinforce use of planner to track assignments. The informal nature of e-Learning appears to be contributing to a deterioration in student focus, engagement, seriousness, and student skills like note taking and time management, which, for 8th graders, seems deleterious for preparation for the HS environment.

Remember that parents are juggling working from home and e-learning, remember children are scared too of what is happening so if work doesn't get turned in one day but it all still gets in by Friday.....that is ok. If a child/parent is struggling one week to turn assignments, keep them up and let them catch up at their own pace. Be patience and understanding with your families. MOST OF ALL ACKNOWLEDGE THAT YOUR TEACHERS ARE DOING AN AMAZING JOB! VALUE THEM!

Rewards and Accountability for extras performed. Such as creative solutions, exercising, cooking, Etc.

Right now we are prioritizing completion of the work for homeroom. If we are able to complete those assignments and haven't reached points of frustration then we hop to other areas like art, PE, and music. We are doing a TON of playing, walking, singing and CRAFTS during downtime from work and school, so we felt it was okay to prioritize the regular classroom work at this time.

Saving work while trying to complete and having it all disappear on seesaw has happened to us. it is frustrating but part of reality. and autosave would be nice.

Scheduling is hard - while loves Zoom calls, a majority conflict with meetings I have for work. She hasn't missed one yet but I know attendance hasn't been great. It would have been nice to have gotten a survey asking when the best time of day was to host vs. being given a time. Particularly when they're back-to-back with another Zoom (i.e. Mrs. PE classes on Tuesday). For a kindergartner who can't do it on their own, they need an adult there to get them logged in and most parents have multiple kids and a job to balance schedules for. There's no ideal way to do this and the calls should stay - just a thought for the future.

School work should be able to be completed at night if needed. Once the weather is better kids need to spend time outside during the day

SD58 needs better technology training for its teachers, especially the older teachers who haven't embraced technology in the classroom except for word processing and research. There is so much more that can be done.

Seems like stuff is too all over to be uploading etc. seesaw was great

Seesaw is not as parent friendly for finding links and when attached to an agenda, it opens up on the adult device. If there was away to have clear folders by subject in SeeSaw with all the links there, including mp4s, it would make our lives so much easier and help our kids get less frustrated about how to get things done.

SeeSaw is not that easy to work with in terms of actually typing on the document in the program for the "activity" that the teacher posts. Our teacher has also been providing the actual worksheet for us to print out and hand-write, then post the completed assignment. This works much better. It is easy for the kids to post their work once they completed it (by "responding" to the "activity" and then taking a picture of the worksheet) so I like that part of the program.

seesaw seemingly seems simple/easy to use, but can be slightly confusing where to find information, etc. users should be able to archive similiar to teachers. etc. but this seems like an app feature and not necessarily anything district has control over

Seesaw worksheets should not be digitally completed. Takes way to long to type into boxes resize them move them etc... Especially when they should be learning handwriting...Most of these assignments have ruled lines to write in. I have resorted to having my daughter write the answers on paper then I type them in just to get them done without frustration and I have decided penmanship is more important than learning workarounds. All I ask is for is a printable version of the assignment that we can put pencil to paper and take a nice clear picture to post to see saw.

Send the daily learning list to the students in Seesaw. They keep having to ask me to look up what's next. Mrs. the list and links for zoom on seesaw. This is so helpful.

Send/Add the Lesson Plans to child's IPad Google Docs for easy access.

Sending the same emails, from different individuals & the same individuals, is unnecessary. The fact that the work doesn't count, and that the students are doing "busy work" is insulting.

She is done most days 10/10:15. It would be nice for her to have additional work or learning opportunities

Should start that have 3 kids so maybe harder for us. Figuring out when the zoom meetings is a little confusing and takes time to find each. Have to read through all the subjects, links... to find the day/time for each child. Since these require the child to be present and are scheduled, it would b good if they somehow were listed on their own in a form and could be seen at-a-glance. Also clearly marked as "mandatory" or "optional". Just a suggestion. Kind regards.

Since e-learning will be the norm going forward, it would be nice for my children to have set aside one-on-one time with their teachers, even if for 15 min a day, or at least once or twice a week. More group meetings/assignments would do them some good since they can't see their friends in person or work with them at school (if possible).

Since my child works independently I am not sure that she's completing everything accurately or thoroughly enough. It would be nice to have some teacher feedback so the parent can be confident their child is doing everything correctly. My 3rd grader is jealous of her K brothers Zoom calls for specials, she'd love to have Zoom calls for PE, music and library. Not necessarily every week but maybe one special per week.

Since they're not having an entire day and have extra days off I feel they will be behind when they go to the next grade. I wish they could do more lectures on zoom like a regular school day.

Small group and one on one teacher video opportunities should be added.

so far everything has been good. very satisfied, thank you.

So many links not working for 3rd grade from IPad. I can get gym videos on my phone but she can't access from IPad. Also-ALLLL the red notifications. The only way we have found to clear them is to complete and reply. Can't find a dismiss button in Seesaw. Example- she is in accelerated math - but her 3rd grade is giving her the same age class work. Now she has notifications so it's misleading and confusing.

So thankful for our teachers and staff. One of my kids has an IEP so he needs a moderate amount of my time but it's ok. I'm his Mom. But the assistance I get almost daily as I try to figure it out has been incredible. So impressed all around. Thank you!

Some activities that are challenging and require more teaching take a long time and are frustrating so the daily amount of time spent on activities is sometimes hours longer than the amount of time that it's supposed to take. Talking with other parents they agree that the work is sometimes challenging to complete in the amount of time it's supposed to.

Some apps are loosing connection and/or asking for an additional signin...this is on benchmark and asking for a google sign in or Microsoft azure ad. Is there a IT person we can connect with?

Some assignments have been geared toward meeting the goals of the curriculum that existed prior to remote learning, with an appropriate amount of flexibility to allow students to meet those goals while adjusting to new modes of learning. Other assignments have been more of a "choose-your-own-adventure", allowing students to pick whatever interests them from a smorgasbord of options. While flexibility is understandably important to meet the variety of needs and situations of students, please consider how the more structured remote learning assignments would likely be of greater benefit to the students in the long run.

Some Kdg assignments weren't included in the packet, so there was confusion. After speaking with the teacher we figured it out.

Some links are difficult to get to work.

Some links were unavailable -most likely due to traffic. Worksheets on paper are always nice but understandably not always easy to provide. Zoom was a nice addition and made my son feel more connected.

Some more activities can be added. It should be for the full week.

Some of the features on SeeSaw are a tad difficult for the Kinders to do, but we are getting through it!

Some of the teachers stick with the program and do what was been asked to do. Some teachers will take the time to go that extra mile to make a difference in their students life. Miss. is absolutely great! We are fortunate to have her as 6th grade teacher.

Some of these assignments seem to fancy. Can we just have the kids read books, write summaries on them, journal and practice math facts? It's hard to tell if any of the new concepts are going to stick.

Some teachers are good at this and others you can tell dont like it. They may need more support to become better at this type of learning?

Some teachers are just calling it in. My son has little to no work from most of his teachers.

Some teachers do a better job of keeping the lessons more consistent and organized....and less confusing.

Some teachers don't communicate information well

Some teachers really need to be more open to communication for students, more of a zoom meeting to teach kids the subject rather than stating "If you have questions, these are the hours for Zoom". I am sorry but it makes a huge difference. My kid is not strong in Math, but we help her and would a like teacher to at least record the item that is being taught so students can review it rather than stating, do IXL.

Some teachers send out Zoom meetings emails too late at night or too early in the mornings

Sometimes Google Slide & Google docs doesn't work well. Lags a lot.

Sometimes I cannot access things. For example, despite teacher and principal contact, I do not have the math topic or material. I tried the school website, Seesaw, and DG58 curriculum resources. For this reason, I really want to know what students need to know before entering 4th grade, because I am deciding what to teach in math on my own.

Sometimes i wonder if all her assignments are getting completed in full. She says they are. And i haven't heard otherwise from the teachers but she seems to finish e learning fairly quick most days. I'm not complaining, as I'm glad she's not struggling with anything. I just wonder if it's enough. Thankfully all the kids are in the same boat, so that is reassuring.

Sometimes links in work plans don't work or are blocked and it's difficult for parents to figure out how to get the information. This can cause delays in getting the work done.

sometimes logging in can be very difficult and frustrating; some teachers only use the students google classroom to inform of assignments others just the school website link. can be frustrating to determine actual coursework. Sometimes there is conflicting information too. overall, a huge thank you to teachers and administration for their hard work in creating elearning so quickly.

Sometimes too much info from teachers that are not homeroom teachers

Specials are a bit more confusing to access but we are working on it

Spelling has not been a priority

Still not clear from some teachers how to submit assignments completed on paper. Also, appreciate if teachers can be somewhat accommodating if there's a question asked outside their scheduled office hours. I certainly respect that they need to set boundaries. However, I can't get involved until after work hours and that's when we discover what those questions are.

Still WAY too much paper and too many separate areas to look & find the information in. Too many separate emails and links sent, having all in 1 place would be much easier to organize when trying to work, watch children, & assist with RL. The amount of work provided for submission is well over the 60 min recommended timeframe. Have not even touched Library or PE classes be finishing the 2 hrs of homework takes up any available time

Stop telling them not to worry about their grade it's making them not work as hard

Students need more math work that is needing to be turned in. Then they need optional math work that they can complete if they have time.

Students need more time to learn. Should be working full days

Students should have more opportunities to collaborate with one another on projects. More social learning would benefit a lot of kids. But overall you are all doing a great job. Thank you!

STudents with IEPs are being forgotten. Most of my child's regular school day is spent with a resource teacher since my child need extra help. The E-learning day should mimic the regular school day with zoom classroom sessions. Why can't the teachers teach the students live so they can ask questions? School is about having a teacher help the student. During this relearning, the students have to teach themselves. This is awfully hard for some students especially the students with IEPs. These are the forgotten students during this whole experiment. It is an epic fail for my student. Thank you for taking away the learning g time that legally my child was supposed to be receiving per the IEP.

Surprisingly my 3rd grader is receiving more work to do then my 7th and 9th grader. I believe this is because the day is not being broken up. For example, middle and high school have A and B days for different contents. Elementary is doing everything everyday and it can be a little much considering how tedious it is to work on IPAD vs a chromebook. District 58 should consider breaking up to a A and B schedule. We easily go over 120 mins. We average closer to 3 to 3.5 hrs. It is hard too because I'm a HS teacher and my wife is an elementary teacher so it can be "interesting".

Takes time to get used to the new plan. As there are several different lessons, it is difficult to sometimes find / access all the different resources/apps the children have to use. Hoping as we have more consistency now this will become easier and more familiar. Would also appreciate more optional additional activities. As the 90 mins of activities is for all levels, there are some activities that do not take anywhere near the amount of time allocated. Would appreciate more guidance on other activities (such as what IXL options we should focus on), or spelling lists that we should practice. We used to get weekly sheets with the IXL activities / words for that week. Not sure if these are already prepared if we could get these electronically.

Task based assignments are much more approachable than longer term projects.

teach one on one please what are the teachers doing all day - school day is from 8-240 and yet kids are doing things and done in less then a hour, kids need one on one time.

Teachers & administrators are awesome. Remote learning has been so professionally executed. My child is handling this way better than I am. Thank you for being so available & supportive to your students during this difficult time

Teachers are doing a great job getting the kids information and creating lesson plans.

Teachers are doing a phenominal job!

Teachers are good about leaving comments about any corrections that need to be made - sometimes the feedback is delayed and/or ends up being lost unless I or my child scrolls back far enough looking for it. I'm not sure there's a great fix for this. the feedback is great, just sometimes hard to find.

Overall, very happy with e-learning. Teachers are responsive. Workload is definitely not equivalent to in person school, but fits the parameters set by the state and district. E-learning may have an added benefit of being able to individualize assignments for kids more easily. We have seen this with our second grader - being given challenge packets since the math assignment was easy for him. Much appreciated.

Teachers are not responding to my child's emails requesting help. Also, he has trouble with Zoom. Those sessions are a hassle.

Teachers could give the kids a survey to get their feeling on this stuff. A check in on zoom (which occurs often, and is dine well) is different than actually asking the kids.

Teachers need to differentiate learning and assignments as they do in the classroom to make tasks more meaningful to the students. There is no/little instruction happening of new concepts. Zoom sessions should include mini lessons or direct instruction rather than only be used for community meetings or quick check ins. Students are losing an entire trimester in the classroom and this remote learning needs to do a better job of supporting student growth. In addition, teachers need to put more emphasis on the following areas: reading, writing and math.

Teachers need to ensure the links they send work. They cannot/should not send links out that need to be access on parents personal or work devices.

Teachers should be doing more. They should prepare a pre-recorded video daily with each days lesson and even a small lesson of anything new they are starting. Too many video links for the kids to watch when they should be watching videos of teachers explaining to them. Teachers lack of response is unacceptable teacher should be doing more to help get the kids the information they need or even doing one on one lessons if need be. Second grade says 90 minutes we are receiving at minimum two hours sometimes 3 to 4 hours of work per day. It all comes down to we need more teacher interaction we need more teachers to do the lessons that they should be doing not sending it home for mom and dad to do the lesson. These can be pre-recorded videos not live videos. We don't expect the teachers to be live all day long but we do expect them to send multiple videos explaining lessons to children.

Teachers vary widely in the way their google classrooms are set up, or if they use google classroom at all. Not one teacher has the schedule, homework, classwork, instructions, etc in the same location. When one of my kids says he did not see where the instructions were for a particular class, it concerns me. I would appreciate a more standard google classroom usage by teachers. It would streamline the productivity and improve confidence here at home. Thank you.

Technology issues are too great. Inaccessible zoom meetings, cameras not working to upload assignments, and they should be able to receive emails from parents to forward info from the district that was not received

The "day" should be longer. Teachers should be Zoom teaching, or uploading a video of them teaching.

The 140 minutes is a joke. I work full time and can't be a full time homeschool teacher. I will be looking for online education to supplement. I don't need a babysitter. I want my kids to learn new material and don't feel like they are learning anything.

The amount of applications the children need to access at 2nd grade is daunting. More times than not we are seeing the wrong name of the app, the wrong password or code to get into the assignment. It takes more time to find the work than it does to actually get it done. By the time we sort through what needs to be done for the day our child is frustrated and not wanting to complete the work because it is taking so long. Consistency with each subject would be much easier. The zoom calls would also be more effective in the morning or a midday conversation on where and how to find the work for the day. It would be nice for the children to have instruction from the teacher on these calls. They need this interaction with their teachers.

The amount of apps to use and places to find info is very frustrating. And choice boards are not great, they create more swirl and confusion. Just make the assignments a bulleted list, easy to follow and do. More math and writing assignments would be nice.

The amount of assignments for OKEEP is overwhelming, especially with having to reference multiple sources for them (Seasaw, Emails, School Website, Google Forms). Some activities are not tested before sending out, which leads to confusion and frustration for students and parents.

For OKEEP, a merged schedule would be very helpful so you don't miss Zoom meetings and assignments. Seasaw is very cumbersome and overwhelming when responses are not required but show up as being needed. Some activities have 3-4 steps using multiple tools, which can be a lot for a kindergartner, it may make sense to just make some activities only for paper submission.

Expecting OKEEP to do 120 hours with many small assignments making it up is not feasible, and requires a lot of parent intervention that is hard for working parents. This is equivalent to the time expected of 3rd graders.

The amount of work and details are appreciated, and it's nice to have options to help keep the kids busy. For Kindergartners, I think giving parents more high level holistic goals, like mastering sight words, letters K-P, addition and subtraction and then providing tools would be helpful.

Allowing students or parents to get some books that are sitting in the library even if they are just picked out in advance would also be helpful. Has Epic opened things up for outside of school or are there other reading resources the are free now, with no free trial girmnicks we should be using?

The amount of homework is far too much for the said hours, question 01.

Some things just cannot be done on the iPad. Watching them do math on the screen instead of a piece of paper is painful. The amount of time to deal with the iPad is way more than normal, that should be included in the time. No one could have planned for this so the iPad is a blessing, just mentioned in case this goes on and on, maybe there is another idea.

Would zoom video time with the teacher be better spent on essential subjects like reading, writing, and math instead of art? I can help with art or they can do that on there own as regular home hobbies. But parents cannot replace the expertise in those other subjects that the teachers have.

The amount of information coming from so many sources is completely overwhelming. We have to go to the district website to get the teachers agendas, but then we have a separate link for an agenda for my child with an IEP. The teachers post assignments and updates to SeeSaw, but we often have to access several different programs to complete the assignments. We have no experience with these programs and spend half the time trying to figure out how to navigate through them. It's supposed to be only 2 hours a day, but we still spend at least 5-6 everyday between both kids.

The amount of material that is actually new and being taught. I feel the students are given a lot of "Busy Work" to do but the actual material they are being taught or is new information is very minimal. Math worksheets are more review rather than new material to ready them for next year's material. I would like to see more video teachings by the teacher whether they are live videos or recorded videos to accommodate at home scheduling. Every child has an iPad and should have access to these videos. I also don't feel the students are being held accountable by their teachers, whether it is their classroom teacher or "extra" teacher to submit their assignments.

The amount of schoolwork in the post Spring Break elearning plan is not acceptable. My kids are done with their schoolwork for the day by 9am most days. The ISBE suggested amount of time is not enough. Kids need to have a sense of purpose. Before Spring break they were spending several hours a day learning and completing work. Now I feel as if my children are hardly receiving an education. Your pre Spring Break plan showed what our wonderful district is capable of. Please go back to that and educate my children. It is likely this quarantine will be extended or revisted next school year too. It isn't okay to say our elearning is not meant to substitute for a regular school day. Despite what the ISBE says. We know our children need to be educated and the elearning plan needs to be a viable education plan that will work if this quarantine continues for an extended period of time. We can't afford to not educate our children. Our capable, innovative children and teachers will rise to the occasion, given the chance. My statements are no reflection on the wonderful District 58 teachers, it is the policy of only allowing them to teach minimal hours that needs to be changed to meet my children's basic educational needs.

The amount of time spent learning/working seems to be too little overall. Our kids are done with their daily remote learning before lunch. Extra exercises/worksheets/assignments to reinforce concepts would be welcomed.

The amount of work is a lot for families with multiples kids with remote learning and especially with families of working parents. It's led to a lot of frustration and the kids dread it everyday. If more of the work could be down while they are zooming with teachers or could be completed while watching a video, it could help if it required less parent supervision. For example,(over a video), find sheet "a" and then explain directions so they can complete and pause the video. Then move to the next assignment. There have been so many tears because we can only help one child at a time and they get so frustrated. If there was one video they could reference that explains all the assignments I feel It would def take down some of the frustrations.

It would also be nice if the okeep stuff could be less projects. Let the zoom call be their okeep project for the day and let them do something that teacher wants them to work on. Not all these choose boards with a millions projects that require a lot of parent help. I understand this is new for everyone and we're all learning at the same time. I'm just sad that my child went from loving school and being excited about it to now dreading and crying about it.

The amount of work outlined, along with the OKEEP requirements, is far more than my older elementary age child and my middle school child. Granted, my kindergarten child needs adult supervision and a few breaks throughout the day, he had many more assignments to compelte as a whole.

The approach for my junior high 8th grader is not working well. It isn't because the teachers are not trying. The approach has changed from March in which the teachers emailed us daily with what my child was supposed to be doing. Now I have no way to know what my child was supposed to do, unless the teachers update powerschool. And then, when they do update powerschool, it only says "assignment" and whether it was turned in or not. I learned yesterday that my daughter has not turned in her homework for one class in weeks. Additionally, for 3 of my child's classes, the teachers have not entered any grades for the entire trimester into powerschool, so I have no idea of if she has done work that was assigned. I think that the administration is asking too much of junior high kids to be responsible enough to find and organize their assignments, do their assignments, and turn in their assignments independently.

The aspect that is cumbersome for a parent is that you have to look at the agenda and go to different links then go back to seesaw to complete the assignment. IS there a way to house in one place or have the assignments sent to the parents in advance as well to look over the week before so we can watch the recordings before the kid gets their assignments?

The assignments are not the issue, the required technical knowledge required to access, complete and submit assignments which the district assumed would be intuitive are fully frustrating for a 7 year-old. The ability to navigate multiple sites, move/shrink text boxes in order to provide answers and respond to close to 200 messages/notes through seesaw from multiple teachers (including PE?!) continues to be overwhelming. I would not onboard a new hire with a college degree with this type of multi-site system, poor instruction, limited guidance and assumed known technical skills required to actively participate.

The assignments can not be done with out a lot of supervision and the teachers haven't been terribly helpful. I am currently in school full time (now online as well) and my husband is desperately trying to find work through his business with this changing economy. It is incredibly stressful and difficult to balance all of these schedules. I wish the e-learning could be done more independently and that the teachers wouldn't make comments like, "you still didn't do that right, have an adult help you."

The assignments given are way too involved. There are 4 parts to each subject. I spend most of the time trying to get my second grader to actually sit and complete one subject. Please make the subjects easier to complete with less steps. We would be able to tackle more subjects then just barely completing the 3 subjects that are required. The original format for e learning before spring break was much better suited for my son.

The assignments should all be together. It's complicated to switch back and forth from seesaw to the google doc where the assignments are listed, as some of the links are only in the google doc. I have also noticed most of the work- like math, for example- seems to be a review thus far. How will the district go about teaching new math skills remotely? Will there be more Zoom time where the teacher will present such things?

The assignments were much easier to complete when everything was in Seesaw. Now we have Seesaw, packets and different websites/links. It requires significant adult work.

The 3rd grade teachers are doing an outstanding job. Easy to access their materials. Great feedback. Positive attitudes. The base amount assigned is good and does take the targeted 2 hours. However, he's also expected to read 20 min on his own, do a 15-20 min assignment (each) for music, art, library, and PE per week. My child also gets extra help for reading comprehension (learning lab). This requires one zoom meeting and one assignment per week. None of this seems like a lot but it adds up. I'm sure some kids work at a much quicker pace than mine but I can only get about 2-2.5 good hours from him each day and then it's a struggle. I'd say he currently has about 3-3.5 total.

The children look forward to face time with their classmates and teachers.

The children might enjoy video recordings of the activity directions from the teachers.

The classes should have more zoom meetings. Maybe kick off the day with a meeting to talk about what they plan to do today. Meet again a few hours later to talk about the assignments and answer questions. Set up individual zoom meetings to talk to the kids about how they're doing and answer their individual questions. The zoom meetings should take place at the same time every day.

Make sure all of the assignments are tested the day before. We've had assignments that we receive that you cannot access, not clear how to go about it or it just doesn't work. Make sure the examples are accurate. One math example read 2 + 2 = 1. This is for kids that are trying to teach themselves math without supervision.

Thankfully my wife and I are both still working full time. It's very difficult to also oversee the learning at the same time. Some of the challenges make it all that much more difficult.

The clever/benchmark apps are difficult to access. It is frustrating to have to go through several steps, often unsuccessfully, to get to the reading assignments.

The combination of computer and paper based learning is awesome. Thanks for time.on zoom and ipad too

The combined total of instruction time and additional work is far below the typical schedule. I am concerned the kids are losing important educational time in this new structure.

The communication from the communication from

The difference in e-learning between elementary and middle school has been significant. While the framework for middle school is easy to follow and one or two teachers have been very clear, my daughter has several teachers that send out multiple emails a day with conflicting or no information in them. Questions asked go unanswered, and time for these classes seems to be a waste. It is the complete opposite of our experience in the elementary schools' responsiveness and organization.

The directions and information that we are receiving from the school and teachers is top notch! As a fellow educator I am really impressed on how well this been rolled out in 58!! Great work!!

The district, administrators, and especially the teachers have done a really nice job pivoting to provide for the continued learning of the students. As parents, we do not have access to google class room, and I am not sure we need it - but would want to know if access makes sense to better support the students. Also and specific to the 7th graders, it would be helpful if all of the teachers utilized the same portals to communicate lessons and learning activities (ie google class room, teachers website, - and provided parents a simplified schedule of the students assignments and learning activities weekly.

The engagement minutes per day for an OKEEP Kindergarten student is 120 minutes. To complete around 90% of the allocated work is taking us a minimum of 4 hours per day. The work is listed in links from district emails, direct emails from teacher, in a paper packet as well as 3 different places on Seesaw. Seesaw is not perfect but it would certainly be more streamlined if everything outside of the paper packet was housed there. It would also be helpful to understand which of the assignments take priority over others. We strive to get everything done each day but it is extremely challenging to balance it all. We like the addition of the zoom calls and hope some of the work can be reduced and replaced with more face to face time and interactive lessons. Thank you.

The extra classes (PE, music, art, library) add a lot more to the workload and make us feel like we always have some assignments that we could or should be working on when we've already spent the day on academics.

The family time is really special.

The first day should have been a lesson in expectations, how to navigate the online platform, where to find assignments, etc.

There is not enough work being given. There is also not enough feedback to parents on how the kids are performing. I work full time and can't manage their schedules/expectations as well as needed and I have no idea if they're truly doing what they're supposed to be doing.

PE requirements - I know my kids have homework and we've been doing peloton workouts together, but I feel like this is not enough activity. Perhaps host zoom gym classes?

The first grade team at the same is doing a fantastic job! Daily plans are easy to follow and provide the perfect amount of work to complete each day. The daily zoom call at the same time has been great. Thank you!

the first two weeks in March were excellent schedules that filled my daughter's day; now, with only 90 mins and 'optional' assignments it's not structured enough and should be as detailed/outlined as the first two weeks were; the more the days can feel 'normal' the better! Teachers should zoom 2x a day to keep connected (and maybe in smaller groups that rotate) and help with the kids' motivation.

The google doc laying out the assignments with links to visuals is helpful. The seesaw platform could be simpler. There is a lot of scrolling to find the right stuff to do. I know seesaw wasn't built to handle this situation so its probably the best available.

The Family is so grateful for this school district - organized, compassionate - you all have just been amazing!! From the front office with Dr. Russell, all the way to the individual school teachers and support staff. Information is organized, communicated well, learning exercises are relevant - continuing to learn, yet "doable" at home. Thank you - from the bottom of our hearts!

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The hardest thing for my K & 1st grader is bouncing back & forth between Seesaw & Google Docs to access videos. For their young age, I think having as much on Seesaw is the easiest thing for them. Trying to find a video on a google doc requires me to constantly be bouncing back and forth between them. They already need a lot of support at their age so this just complicates things. I think this week has been the best though in terms of amount of work, having checklists to make sure we know exactly what to do.

The home room teacher, librarian and art teacher are doing a great job with responding/communicating with the students and providing feedback on the assignments that the students are turning in. We would like to see more consistent feedback and engagement with the students from the other teachers (e.x. P.E., music, etc.) and having them all use the technology that is available to connect (Zoom, etc.).

Keep finding ways to use all the technology that is out there to advance the e-learning environment (Zoom, digital field trips, etc.). Many large companies like Boeing have set up sites specifically to aide in this type of "digital" learning.

Student assessments, it would be great to know how our child is advancing and where he may be falling short so that we can address.

the homework sent in by the other teachers from music/art/p.e. is either all over the place or does not work (such as videos). The hyperlinks within the documents, some assignments being in Seesaw, and the various documents (OKEEP and Kindergarten) make the elearning difficult to navigate at times. It would be great if just all could be in one document, or all could be in Seesaw.

The inconsistency amongst teachers and their methodology across the district is unsettling. Nowhere close to having a similar curriculum throughout the district, or even in the same building. The variations are so transparent- now more than ever. A difficult time for all- absolutely. But it is apparent that the teachers have significant free creative reign to tailor the general curriculum, instead of executing a cohesive district wide plan. The teachers are doing an excellent job with SEL- crucial in this environment.

The interaction and actual teaching done by the teacher seems to be limited. I would expect more dialogue, teaching, zoom meetings, recorded learning sessions. Most of the work is the student reading something and then doing an assignment on their own. At our child's age that requires a fair amount of guiding/coaching by the parent. It feels like there needs to be more facilitating and discussion with the teacher.

The K level stuff is most confusing. There are too many different documents and tools to keep track of everything. Too many formats of tasks too. Google docs get edited while we look at them and follow them. It's hard to sort through what's required and not required when it's all jumbled together. Can you please list not required/ optional stuff separately, so we can first make sure required stuff is done. Why can't the OKEEP google doc be linked from the main plan doc? The link is in an email, I need to access on a separate device. Some zoom calls info are on Seesaw, some on google docs- can't keep track of what info I saw where. Could we please limit number of zoom calls with all the teachers for the youngest kids and not schedule them back to back? We need to be in work meetings, and can't supervise kids during zoom or figure out connection issues. 9yr old can participate directly, so those are fine. The K packets we got

in mail are helpful, but there are page numbers cut off on some copies! I think the 4th graders could use some 1:1 time with a teacher once a week to help them with tasks that they find most difficult. Between 2 working adults, and helping 2 school age children we are not done with kids stuff until 4 o'clock at the earliest. We really appreciate all the effort and what you do, this is challenging for all. The teachers have been very helpful and responsive, just finding it overwhelming to navigate everything while doing work.

The kids are doing well with the online learning. They are finishing around 11:00, I feel that they could have a little more work to do. The teachers are all responding quickly which is much appreciated!

The kids at different age groups require different approaches. 1st graders class zoom calls seem to do more than good. They are at an age that the want to be heard and engage with teacher and or classmates and the zoom calls they are basically muted the entire time until asked to share and then they freeze because it is such an on the spot experience. I also have found that there is confusion amongst all of my kids about the titles of various assignments, something may be labeled on district page and when child reads it that is not what the assignment is known to them as and causing confusion. I have a child with IEP's and another child that requires separate reading assignments than what is listed, so are they suppose to do both? Well no once I asked for clarification the answer was no. There are aides, teachers, substitutes names all listed for assignments I as the parent may not be familiar with them all and it is hard to centralize the assignments with that confusion. I also think an optional weekly call should be available for students and or parents with students teachers, even if the call needs to be capped at 5 minutes so the teachers can still maintain other responsibilities, but it would be a very effective check in with the student and teacher.

There are older kids and even younger students looking to see if their answers were correct and the student is not receiving any feedback other than a oh that's nice or good work etc.

I'm also curious as to why the older students are not receiving homework? I realize the idea is to limit the amount of work but it seems to be realistic for perhaps fourth grade and above to receive homework assignments and be graded or reviewed. Again these are thoughts that I have and observations I have made as a parent with 3 students all having very different e learning experiences. I understand everyone is doing their best teachers, parents, and students.

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The kids get done with their work most days by 11am

The kids need to go to school all 5 days, there is no reason not to have that available. Most other areas around here do have 5 days - we are really behind. And it seems like that way from the beginning.

The Kids should have more face meetings with the teacher and classroom.

The kindergarten (with OKEEP) load is a lot.

The kindergarten assignments are a little too much.

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The Kindergarten Elearning program is absolutely awful. Right now I have to go to 4 different places just to get my sons day organized. There are emails from his teacher, Seesaw, the paper packets that came in the mail and also an email from Justin Sisul????? This is insane. My kindergartners E-learning is 100xs more complicated than my 6th graders. That does not make sense.

The Okeep program is a complete waste right now and it is taking up way too much of my time as a parent for me to try to navigate this system AND have to walk my son through every single class and activity. The kindergarten learning is very frustrating a requires a parent to be involved through every single minute of the learning.

The Kindergarten information is all over the place. I check See Saw, email, and school website daily in order to find lesson plans and messages. It would also be slightly helpful if zoom meeting information was listed in the same spot as the daily lesson plan. For example, if the PE class meets on Thursday, it would be helpful if it was listed under the Thursday plan instead of at the end of the document.

The Kindergarten materials are a bit confusing to navigate and time-consuming to access. There is a document with links, posts on seesaw, paper handouts and emails with videos. I wish everything was in one location because it takes a while to find everything. It wouldn't be very hard if I wasn't also trying to work and teach another grade. But everything else is great.

The kindergarten plus OKEEP feels like a lot more than what they do in first grade. We may also have missed that a number of activities were optional as I went back over the work.

The teachers have been absolutely awesome. Thanks to them for both learning a completely new way to teach our kids supporting us as we implement their plans.

The level of tech support for teachers and students is inadequate. Various tech problems cause frustration for my children and undermine their ability to secure the learning. Cancelling these activities would be better than moving forward with ones that don't work.

The limited structure makes it difficult at best to provide the additional help that is required by the students. There is a dependence on parents which is difficult to support when parents are both required to work.

The main document that explained what the assignments were going to be for the week was buried on the district website and was never emailed out to parents. I had to request that the teacher send it to me because I couldn't find it. On Monday, I felt unprepared because the teacher had not sent out this document. Also the due dates for the assignments listed on Seesaw were unclear.

The majority of the material seems to be more busy work than actually new material. Every child has a Chromebook and although I know not every child may have access to the internet at all times of the day and schedules are challenging, I would like to see more educational videos/teaching by the teachers. whether the students watch a live version or a recorded version, I think this is important to take the place of the classroom environment.

The middle school curriculm is not very interactive for most classes compared to what my 6th grader is experiencing. My middle schooler has very little teacher interaction with the exception of gifted reading/LA.

The middle school lesson guide is extremely confusing for parents. I have gotten only 2 emails from middle school teachers at the very beginning of this in March. It would be nice to get more feedback from my middle schooler's teachers to make sure he is on target.

One more thing, it is so nice you are providing breakfast and lunch for students. The quality of the food needing to be heated is quite poor. Plus there are no fresh fruits or veggies. The amount in the bag was supposed to have 4 breakfasts and lunches, there was only one breakfast and 4 lunches. I know I should complain about free food, but it is not very good. I do want to say the ladies handing out the food are always happy and very helpful. A big thanks to them.

The most difficult portion has been trying to assist my kindergarten meet her daily deadlines while I'm working remotely as well. I'm afraid I'm not spending enough time teaching her and will cause her to fall behind academically.

The most difficult thing to follow are ALL of the zoom invitations. Some teachers post in many different docs, some send only to the parent Seesaw. Some email. I have all of my kids zoom calls in my calendar, but then I freak out about 5 minutes before because I cannot find the link. My 1st grader has the links sent directly to the student seesaw account the morning of the zoom. This way, she can just click on it herself and join right in without typing stuff. I would love if my other child had that too, because she is not able to use my phone or computer, so I have to find the link from one of the many places it was sent, type it into her own ipad, etc. It has been difficult also with the separate nature of the OKEEP material (which I understand since some should access and some not).

The music assignments feel like a little too much to my daughter.

The new minutes of school work have made remote learning with two students and working from home much more manageable.

The one thing that is a pain point is not being able to print the worksheets. Everything is uploaded to SeeSaw and the kids are unable to send the pages to me to print.

The only confusing part has been for my IEP student. It's hard to know exactly what assignments we should not be working on, so that we can focus on their goals. It has felt as though they get twice the work than other on target students in their class.

The only thing I am struggling with is if I am supposed to be tracking that my 3rd grader is getting everything done that the students are supposed to be doing. I am hoping the teacher is doing this and will inform my child if an assignment is not completed. If I am supposed to be checking this, how is the best way to do that? Thank you!

The opportunity for one-on-one engagement would be appreciated. With any of the school professionals.

The organization of the packets we received for our kindergarten seemed hard to navigate. If they were organized per day, then I think it would be more accessible. The description of the worksheets assumes that the parents know what it is we are looking for when it is unfamiliar to us. Also we missed several Zoom calls for OKEEP because the video conference calls were listed below after the day schedules and under extra activities. The zoom meetings should be listed under the day that it is scheduled for.

I understand that this is a new territory for everyone. We as parents are wearing a lot of "hats" at this point in time (le. working full time, having my own work conference calls, and then managing my sons work, while trying to entertain a toddler). It would be extremely helpful not to have to go on a "scavenger hunt" to find the day's worth of work.

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The original email that came out explaining the remote learning plan was RIDICULOUSLY long and contained too many links to different sources. Glad that's over.

The packet of material that was sent home seemed to be not to the teachers expectations. The page numbers that the teachers are giving parents to find the pages do not align. If the teacher did not provide a picture of the page I would be challenged to find the correct pages. I am very appreciative of all the work that went into creating the packets but I think better communication on expectations of end results would help.

The packet received April 13-16, most of the photocopy images are illegible / impossible to see

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The parents are too much engaged in this learning process and if teachers are going to do zoom calls they should be for educating and helping with guided Assignments as they would do in class. In addition to the social aspect of zoom meetings. The zoom meetings should be more engaging in educational teaching to guide the students better.

The past 2 weeks have been better with the workload. I think zoom meetings for more than just SEL could benefit the children as a class and dive deeper into concepts.

The PE hyperdoc does not work.

The PE instructions were very hard to find/understand this week. The kids enjoy the zoom meetings. It would be nice to have video instruction on some topics, like new math concepts, if possible. As working from home parents we are both tied to our computers for the entire work day and we can't be over their shoulder for the entire time. We try to review the assignments each day and confirm they have completed them, but there are many places/ways the assignments are submitted. It would be helpful if there was a central way to check in that they've completed everything to the Teacher's satisfaction. With that said, I know that would be hard for the teachers and they are struggling through this as well. Maybe a check list is kept for each student and parents emailed at the end of the week only if anything was not done/needs to be redone, just a thought. Thank you all for your dedication to our kids!

The planning calendars are critical to keep them on task.

The platforms teachers are using are hard to follow/ scroll through. It seems very hard for my son to manage on his own. A list has been printed(for reading, science, SS and daily4) but math, PE, Art, are all in different platforms... between zoom meet ups, and lessons due it's hard to keep track.

The preschool is a district program; so why is it not following the rest of the district e learning format? it is confusing for parents to be navigating multiple formats and receiving information in varying ways. Please consolidate and follow one format and one delivery system so that parents can do our part and make sure we are not missing anything the school needs from us.

The reading assignments with annotated responses within the seesaw app are not engaging. They are a bit difficult to follow with complex instructions for this age level.

The Reading/LA teachers expectations are too excessive for remote learning

The realities of putting together an eLearning plan that supports the masses (and considers everyone's opinions) is a very challenging task. Hats off to you all for working quickly to get these plans in place. Hopefully the feedback you request is kind! Parents with smaller children who are both still working full time (in a remote capacity) without the help of other family members or sitters during this time, like me, are finding this whole experience very challenging as the kids need a lot of love, attention and guidance throughout the day. I feel like I'm constantly getting them set up with an activity then running to my laptop to jump on a conference call for work, hoping no one gets in trouble and stays on task. We are working through activities and worksheets during the day as best we can, sometimes out of order, and then the tech that needs more assistance from mom or dad happens after dinner. More clarity about expectations (are we doing ok?), how kids are assessed and graded, expectations around extracurriculars, and more notice for Zoom calls (perhaps standing calls on a set date/time) is requested if at all possible. Also.. what should we do with all the completed worksheets? I hope we are keeping up on this end and I don't want my inability to follow directions and sort through all the emails hurt my child's development! You all are doing an amazing job considering these wild circumstances. I hope on the other end of this pandemic there is increased awareness around the teaching profession and the selflessness you show for the most important things in the world (the kiddos!). Hang in there!

The recommended 90 min of learning is far too little, especially in our household. I am working from home full time, and my husband is an essential worker and out of the house for 10 hours a day. For the first two weeks of kids being out school, there were assignments setup to keep my son occupied and learning from 8:30 am to 3pm. Now it's only for 2 hours plus a zoom meeting every other day. It's far too little and I don't think he is learning as much. Perhaps adding additional assignments/educational games or activities would help the working parent stay focused if they are working at home, while the child doing constructive activities assigned by the teachers to enrich their learning.

the recorded youtube lessons are fantastic. keep those coming!

The school iPads are really "glitchy" sometimes which can be a bit frustrating for my e-learner. The teachers recommend that they turn them off and try again when they do this. It would be nice if there was a way to use our own home iPads for classroom work.

The school work seems to be heavier at the beginning of the week. As someone who is working in Healthcare, Monday is my busiest day and I've seen we trend down towards the end of the week. If it could be more balanced that would help a ton.

The second grade curriculum is too much screen time, and not that engaging. The lessons in Moby Max are dry and overwhelming. I'd love to see more research projects for science and social studies. Anything that is more interactive instead of just watch a video and answer questions. Perhaps using more of the interactive features of Seesaw to show learning versus just a platform for links.

The second week we forgot to go to the school website for learning plans. Not sure if it was communicated the week of April 6 and we should continue to go to the school site each week. Glad the principal said it in the morning announcements. Gentle reminders are okay for us parents!

The Seesaw app is one of the biggest issues for our family. In our experience, if the app was more user friendly and had less technical issues, e-learning would run a lot smoother overall. In the future, please consider vetting developers for a different family app. Also, while it's understood that there are requirements in regards to the amount of face-to-face instruction, coordinating multiple daily Zoom meetings with different teachers and at various times throughout the day is challenging. For context, our house hold consists of two working parents with conference calls, a toddler; and my son is only in kindergarten). For example, sometimes Zoom meetings are at 4pm (isn't this is technically after the school day)? Also, during this period of crisis schooling, it's a bit much to Zoom with P.E., library, music, and art. Would prefer to keep Zoom meetings for just academic instruction. As a family, we incorporate physical activity, nightly reading, etc and do not necessarily need daily guidance in these areas during this period.

The specials especially music and art are always very time consuming and the links are not working with the school iPad. I also feel that the specials are not factored into the time listed above. The music teacher and art teacher seem to be very hands off as well. Before break my daughter completed an art project that got no feedback and took at least 1.5 hours. I don't know what the art (new teacher) and music are trying to prove (links never work at least the past two weeks) but it is and they are NOT conducive to an e-learning environment. I can send you proof that Ms teeps having to resend her link as it is not working. That is just not right. Then don't send anything at all. You are creating more frustration.

The students need to have interactions even if over video for all of their classes at least once a week (except maybe PE).

The switch from 5 hrs of work to 120 minutes was huge improvement pfor my student. I feel that she is able to really focus and learn during that time. Anything much longer than that (more and 3 hrs) is hard for her to concentrate and really learn. I know their school days are longer but they do not do 5 hrs of individual work everyday.

Mr. has been posting math videos to explain new concepts. Those have been very helpful. I know the teachers have a lot on their plate. If little videos explaining new subjects/ topics would not add to their workload, I would love to see that...but only if helps their workload, not adds to it.

Thank you to our amazing teachers!!!! We are so lucky to have such an amazing caring staff at the teachers and administration at the teachers and administration at the teachers are the teach

The teachers and administration of DG58 are amazing and our family is so thankful to be a part of the DG58 family. This is the opportunity for schools to shift outdated practices and I would encourage administration to continue to reevaluate the traditional school model. It will be easy to slip into past practices upon return, but I am hoping this won't be the case. Our students need and deserve more real-world, hands-on learning experiences and less seat time. We love DG58 and fully support our teachers and administrators. We're in this together!

The teachers are doing a amazing job! My only other suggestion I forgot to add, would be to provide a tech support contact. I' ve found it hit or miss with my responses but understand the issues at hand. IXL works rarely for us and after waiting a bit I did get a fix, but it's a fix I have to do daily and does take multiple times to resolve. I do IT support for Advocate Healthcare and am more than willing to assist in anyway possible.

The teachers are doing an incredible job keeping the kids engaged. My son finished his assigned work very quickly so it's great that they sent extra activities. I would love to see Zoom calls with the Specials teachers. An Art class or a Music class would be great on Zoom. Currently we just get art projects and music worksheets to do which isn't really engaging at all.

The teachers are working so hard and are always quick to respond to questions. The technology has been a little tricky, but we have been able to problem solve (seems mostly due to privacy controls set up on district devices and students not being able to access videos or calls sometimes).

The teachers have been fantastic!!!! Thank you!!! Please just keep in mind that when the format changes it takes us forever to figure it out... and the tasks that are supposed to take 15 mins sometimes takes us 45 (that might just be my kid, but siblings, parents, pets, toys in the other room... everything seems to be a distraction despite our best efforts for a calm learning space!)

The teachers have clearly put together robust plans that very much reflect the types of learning their students would be doing if they were in the classroom, which I very much appreciate.

The teachers have done a great job of keeping the lessons engaging, the zoom meetings are a nice way to keep the school connection and the websites utilized have been appropriate also! Thank you for all the support!

The teachers should still be teaching. Giving the kids work to do is not teaching. They are getting paid to do a job still. They should be utilizing zoom to teach math, etc. instead the zoom call is a check in to see how they are doing! Checking in on the kids emotionally is a social workers and therapists job. The teachers need to do more. It doesn't take much to write a lesson plan which is something they should have been doing all year anyways they need to teach as well.

The technology on the school issued lpads doesn't always work and other devices need to be used. I would like to see the teachers doing video tutorials for the assignments. Mrs. Later does an excellent job doing this every week for the library assignments. The classroom teachers should too. Also, why aren't the specialists providing one on one time with the students via Zoom? Example: speech therapy. Can their be an archive of assignments?

The volume of work is still too light. All three kids are done by noon/1pm. Please incorporate more work whatever that might be. I've resorted to adding projects myself to supplement what is a light load.

The weekly learning plan is not always clear and assignments are not labeled with enough detail and are sometimes confusing and/or not accurate. Accessing these for my child can be very frustrating.

The weekly PE assignment feels forced and unnecessary.

The weekly plans being posted in one place on the website has been great. The only thing I would suggest would be somehow making it possible for parents to see/access the students' activities in Seesaw through their own dashboard or in some other way. I'm not sure if that's possible, but we spend some time each morning crossing-checking our lists with the activities to make sure we have everything. Same with zoom links - some are coming via email, some in the kids' Seesaw activities. It would be nice to have everything in one place (I know zoom links can't/shouldn't be posted publicly but again if they were posted as an activity that parents could see from their Seesaw dashboard that would be helpful).

The work assigned has consistently gone above the required amount. We spend most of the day on school work. While I understand this material is needed, why give 3-5 hours of work when the requirement is 90 minutes? In Dr. Russell's video, he stated the district chose to assign the maximum but with flexibility. There is no flexibility when all the activities are marked required. Other than the optional activities given this week, the activities have all been required and the parent teaching plus the time it takes the student to complete far exceeds the 90 minutes. There was a clear lack of consideration for parents who are still working and may not be able to spend 5-6 hours a day teaching or who can not begin until after 5 pm.

The work for OKEEP is too much on top of the regular curriculum. Also, the directions for kindergarten and okeep assignments on seesaw are slightly different than the directions from the documents that are emailed. It gets confusing to have multiple documents.

The work is manageable with modifications from special Ed that are helping.

The work load is not enough.

The work load, understandably, seems light. I'm concerned my children are losing 2.5 months of education this year. I'd like to hear how we will get them caught up next school year

The work my children receive is not difficult, it is just too much. I have begun to limit my children's work to only their primary teacher's activities and that has helped to relieve the stress and anxiety that my children get when they see so many activities posted on their seesaw accounts. I appreciate all of the work these teachers do, but it is difficult to manage my own work and my children's work at the same time.

The work needs to be more exciting. I wish we could find alternate ways to learn. Not just read this and answer the answer the questions type of work.

The workbook, choice-board, links, etc. are extremely confusing to follow. The page numbers don't line up. It would be much easier if we just had daily work pages to complete. A weekly agenda with what exactly needs to be done including zoom times would be very helpful and appreciated.

The workload for 2nd grade is good. Might be a little too much for 4th, but maybe not. My child might just struggle with focus and being able to work indepentently. More teacher interaction for actually learning would be great, but I understand that might be difficult. Maybe some individual check-ins with teachers would be good. I feel like it's going to be a long couple of months and any ways the schools can make learning a little more exciting/creative and interactive would be good. Mixing things up sometimes would be great.

The zoom meeting schedule seems a bit heavy with at least one and as many as 3 meetings in a day. Consider 1 day per week with no homeroom zoom. Also, attention span seems to drop with longer meetings (more than 30-40 minutes). It's helpful to have all links active when the weekly schedule comes out.

The zoom meetings should be scheduled in advance and recurring. This way the kids aren't looking 10 minutes before for this. Also add a meeting invite to the kids gmail calendar so they learn to use a calendar. My daughter has 4 zoom calls a day sometimes with 2 morning meetings, speech and 1:1 Teaching.

There are quite a few apps to use which at times is hard as we have not previously used them and needed to hunt down login passwords.

There are quite a few different emails that come in with different directions, it would be helpful if everything was compiled in one email for the week. There are various different places there we have to go to access assignments and it gets quite confusing - between folders, Seesaw, websites and emails - it really just gets overwhelming. There has to be a simplified process. We appreciated all the work that has been put in though! Thank you!

There are so many tabs on seesaw it's hard to find all the daily assignments. For the older kids there are too many programs, seesaw, email, and google classroom. It makes it more confusing and frustrating for them.

There are some days when he's done fast so for some motivated students it might be slightly under amount but I think it's right amount for anyone who needs to be directed back to the work or has trouble staying focused because it does leave enough time to do their PE and specials now too and to have them fit in independent reading. I love that we are getting the whole week ahead of time so we can see what the whole week will look like - so much better than daily!

There are times that a lot of us are on the internet and possible work zooms and a school zoom and our internet can't handle it. I know this might be more of a home issue but I heard others saying this during high work volume. I have been so thankful for all the work. I would love to see some more skill and drill with math facts (we are trying at home)

There are too many links, emails and sites/tools to use in addition to actual paper assignments and it is overwhelming to try and navigate all this for a kindergarten student. Definitely requires a lot of time and support form a parent.

There are too many places to access documents and the packets for kinder are not in order. Please try to simplify for us working parents out here to have everything in one place and avoid referring to different links, passwords, etc. Would be much easier for the K, 1st grade crowd who is not self sufficient to ask them to do a few worksheets each day, and read with an adult for 30 min and then submit to the teacher and supplement with Zoom calls. Please simplify if possible.

There are too many steps for each assignment-log in here, watch this, do this, open this other app, upload this, take a picture of this, fill out this form. It's a lot for the younger kids. Too many steps.

There is a big difference in the amount of work required between the A and B schedules. One day is ridiculously light and the other is super heavy. Not sure what could fix it as it is based on their schedules. Just wanted to mention.

there is no where to see if students have completed all assignments. it would be great if teachers sent something at the end of the week such as a) your students have completed all assignments for x week or b) your student is missing assignment a, b, c, etc.

There is not a good way in seesaw to see completed vs incomplete assignments and hopping between multiple areas(music, art, pe, class, specials) is difficult.

There is nowhere near enough work being assigned. I get that there is a spectrum for learning, and I am blessed to have a child who is on the 'positive' end of it, but he receives an assignment that is allegedly supposed to take 20 minutes and he does it in 5, and is looking to me for more material. From what I've gathered, the district is very good at providing support for students with IEP's, but where is the support for the 'smart' kids who thrive on learning and need to be challenged? Also, with respect to the assigned work, a lot of it is self guided. Here kids, watch this video on Youtube and answer these questions. There is very minimal actual teaching being done. Today we finally had our very first video by the teacher, a four minute math lesson. Zoom calls for SEL are great, and I agree absolutely necessary, but there needs to be more actual instruction. I feel my child's days are being filled with busy work, and very little learning is taking place. Yes, he's only in first grade, but he has an incredible thirst for knowledge and is very much missing the academic side of school.

There is some difficulty accessing apps from time to time.

There is still WAY too much work in Kindergarten. And, a lot of the work is pointless. I'd much rather be given one or two assignments and have them be valuable. Watching a video on the letter K? At this time of the year in Kindergarten? Spending a ridiculous amount of time duplicating a block to show a pattern in SeeSaw? Not worth the time. Additionally, giving socooo much work for OKEEP just makes parents feel like we're failing even more because there is no way to get to all of it when a child has working parents.

There is way too much assigned for Kindergarten. We are going to spend 3+ hours today, it isn't sustainable

There needs to be better explanation of how math should be done. Several of the exercises have bubbles that need to be filled with no guidance and is a different method from how I learned. Please provide specific examples worked out so I know the process.

I'm also finding problems that don't have correct answers due to errors in the problem and spending too much time to get that point.

There needs to be more clarity about instructions to access materials and there needs to be better efforts to ensure all links work as stated in the instructions.

There needs to be more learning. Only 90 minutes for 1st grade is not nearly enough to keep my child's brain working throughout the day! The lack of school and learning time causes more interest in TV or iPad time and makes it more difficult for us as parents to get creative with new activities the majority of the day everyday.

There seems to be a bit of inconsistency on where to find the daily lesson plans. A centralized timeline with all teachers for each grade level (regular class, LRC, PE, art) on each day would be helpful. Thank you for putting all this together as we understand this was not an easy task given how quickly all of this evolved.

There seems to be the "wild west" of getting information. I think it's getting better but things aren't provided in a consistent manner. For example, with OKeep and Kindergarten, we have SeeSaw, Google Docs. Inside Google Docs, things aren't sorted in the right order for the Zoom calls. Sometimes the Zoom ID is listed with PW, other times you have to click the link to get that information. We resorted to create a master document to help share and track everything. The idea that clever uses a QR code is really frustrating because you need 2 devices to make it work. I know it's a learning curve for everyone, but we turned that into a best practice for us. This is mainly because we have a child who access things through an iPad, but we don't want them doing much else on it.

There was confusion as to when my child was supposed to be online for classes which we had to speak to the social worker for clarification. She did a great job of clarifying and pointed us to a missing piece of information along with an explanation of A and B day. It would be useful to have teachers who are using Zoom put the time for the meeting directly in the learning activities chart. It would also be good that if there is to be a Monday class on the previous week's schedule that shows the correct information and not have that change Monday morning. It makes it hard for parents and students to understand what is expected. It would also be nice to have the next week's schedule up by Friday so parents can help their student plan their next week.

There's a lot of work and we run into issues with links/videos not working which just derail the process. It's seems like a lot more work than my 7th grader gets.

They/we could handle a little more schoolwork.

This form needs to be broken down by grade level. Each workload varies. My sixth grader has less work than my 3rd and 5th grader. Tough to justify to younger kids.

This has been a challenging time and I think DG 58 is really doing a great job to continue education with only a small period of time to do so. Keep up the great work.

This has been VERY challenging for us. It is estimated that each lesson should last 15-20 minutes as INDEPENDENT learning. Not one lesson has been completed independently. MOST lessons take at least 30+ minutes. I have no idea how anyone with multiple children w different lessons are able to handle this. I don't know what the solution is.... but I know this has been anything but easy.

This is absolutely ridiculous for working parents with small children. I fear I am going to lose my job because I can't complete my work. Way too much hands on involvement for parents of 1st graders. The teachers of the younger children need to be more involved. Perhaps, one on one zoom lessons? How about drop the specials and get those teachers involved with helping in the younger grades? I am literally spending 4-5 hours a day trying to help my children with schoolwork AND do my own full time job AND take care of a 4 year old.

This is going well - I know the kids and teachers miss each other but I feel the kids are still getting a benefit from all the teacher preparation.

This is too much work when you have two parents working remotely. I have to spend half my day trying to figure out the assignments, what links to click on, etc. Why not have teachers teach a lesson via Zoom and then have kids complete assignments.

This process has been very organized and knowing what expectation is for everyone involved has made the process easier. Thank you all for helping everyone through this time!

This survey was a little hard for me to answer. Since I have 3 kids, their e-learning is all a little bc was able to respond more on each child vs the family. I am thankful that my kids have the teachers they do as we have a bond with them, so I feel comfortable reaching out to ask them any questions that come up.

This survey was difficult for me to fill out as a parent of a Kindergartner, 4th and 7th grader. My kindergartner requires moderate adult support, but my 7th grader requires little to none. Our Elementary teachers are responding to all questions and work submissions extremely promptly, but my son's 7th grade teachers don't always respond to questions the same day or at all (perhaps due to the A/B scheduling). I feel the latest that the latest teachers don't really communicated with parents directly.

This survey was hard to fill out for multiple children.

2nd grade- is done with her work in less than an hour, but requires help printing the worksheets, transitioning from activity to activity and staying on task.

3rd grade- Just enough work for the time, able to complete independently, and optional additional tasks for when she completes early. I only with that work would be posts at 8am instead of 9, so that I could help her ready things before I start work.

6th grade- Better than before spring break (where e-learning was taking 6+ hours), but still most often has more than 2.5 hours worth of work to do. When teacher was asked what we we should do if he is not done at the 2 hour mark we were reminded that skills would build upon the previous day, and that they could be completed at any time (read to mean: still do it all).

I REALLY wish all teachers used the same platform. having to check google, seesaw, etc for different subjects is a major pain and we honestly miss things. Also wish that all assignments were posted into the google assignment/class section instead of in the stream. It is really hard to scroll through every student's post to find the assignments.

I wish all ZOOM were all at the same time, early in the day so that it could be a check in with the teacher and then done. My children wake up at regular school time, and complete their work. Convincing them to sign back in later in the day after all school work is complete is sometimes a challenge.

This week defiantly seems more organized and less stressful for me as a parent. I defiantly like that there are less emails and all assignments are in one spot.

Though challenging, I would like to see more activities kids can do offline. I am fine with taking a picture and submitting digitally on seesaw, but I feel like my children are spending way too much time on their iPads. Also my 2nd grader hasn't been able to access IXL on her iPad and many links are loading really slowly or not at all. This causes frustration on her part and mine. Not sure if it's because she has an older iPad or that in conjunction with having 4 devices (including my work and husbands work laptops) on the same network. Any advice would be helpful. Thanks for all you are doing!!!

To be frank, I struggle to see how this can be adequate for the remainder of the year. Many other cities have gone to live zoom teaching which I am very surprised we have not. In addition, the time allotments are built for the mean not our district. This is absolutely not challenging for my kids and as such we are forced to supplement at home. Happy to discuss further.

Together with art PE and music it is too much work for the day.

Too many apps and links make it difficult to access information for assignments.

Too many apps with too many usernames and passwords. Hyperlinks in docs don't always work. Limited utility of Zoom meetings. The estimated times are greatly underestimated and it takes much longer to complete given the above issues.

Too many apps, websites, links to navigate. I know we are in a digital mode right now but finding it hard to split screen to read see an assignment and then record work elsewhere. Can we minimize google docs s seesaw etc

Too many different apps, most of them cannot be opened.

Too many different places I need to go to access lessons. Conflicting information on all the documents about Zoom meeting times. Too many Zoom meetings. I have a hard time managing everything while I'm trying to work from home.

Too many places to find things and receive information. Seesaw (and about 100 places to look in seesaw with a million tabs per teacher), emails from classroom teacher, emails coming through seesaw from teacher, email from district for OKEEP (why???-this seems way over complicated-should come from kinder teacher. I don't know Justin and won't remember his name when needing to look through my emails-logical thing is to have OKEEP come from actual teachers), lesson plans on school web site, the list goes on. Somehow supposed to aggregate all of that myself which is absolutely impossible for working parents, especially with multiple kids. Hopefully this continues to improve with only ONE place to look for things so emails are limited and everything is easily accessible.

Too Much assignment on iPod. Flexibility to delete old assignments on seesaw.

Unfortunately we are both working so having to do remote learning with a six year old and a three year old in the background who just wants to grab at the ipad is hard. Would be better if we had more worksheets and if every teacher (art, music etc) all put their lessons on the same sheet that we get from the primary teacher so we are not looking in other places for other activities

Unlike 1-8 grade, Kindergarten doesn't have an electronic device to take home from school. Which makes it difficult to respond and get back to teachers.

Use a web-based UC systems to teach. The kids log-in and hear an instruction from the teacher with a desired outcome (assignment) to complete. Use voting functions and chat for interaction. Frustratingly slow to understand how to do this.

Using seesaw requires a significant amount of support (for a kindergartner) and a touchscreen computer. We have one, but it means I can't help or support my preschool student. My son gets very frustrated when there are too many computer based assignments, so 60 minutes of school time quickly stretches into hours. Varying the types of assignments and making an even amount on a given day less computer based would be very helpful. Overall, district 58 teachers are working extremely hard and I'm very thankful for what they are doing.

Very appreciative of the decrease time requirements, this help me with my child who struggled with school work and takes much longer than her peers. Less stress for her and me.

Very easy to access and understand especially compared to other district parents experience.

very proud of our district

Virtual instruction would be very helpful. The videos provide some supplement to the subject or skill but it is not enough. More explanation would be better, especially in math and some of the science topics.

Want all of their teachers sending us an email of what has been missed at end of week. Want more science videos/information or history videos/information in 6th grade

Want zoom meetings for grade 6 to be more directed/formative--not just chat fest about time they were in trouble, or look at my dog, etc

Way to go, teachers! You are doing an AMAZING job!

way to little from the teachers. very dissapointing. kids are done in 45 min. whynot teach them on zoom? very frustrated parents about how little the teachers are doing to teach. far to many you tube vidoes. pretty sad actually. teach them spend time with them and wor more 45 min a day is not education - very frustrating as a parent and tax payer, teach them they need it badly, kids are way to isolated. please figure this out, we may consider private school come fall bummed about the 58 lack of substance during all this, we want time with teachers - they are getting paid, so teach the kids, enough you tube videos, they don't even work!

We appreciate all that Mrs. and Miss are doing for our children.

We appreciate everyone's hard work in making this happen for our children and know it isn't easy. I am concerned about my son missing key learning in math this year and what that will mean for next year. How will these gaps in learning be addressed next year?

We appreciate everyone's hard work. It is good to keep the kids (and us) busy.

we appreciate the effort from the district, school, and teachers, and we understand it's all new and being iterated on each week, but perhaps there can be more substance to the material so it's not just workbook-like activities. More hands-on, self exploration that kids can report on might be good. The first two weeks of remote learning seemed to be more substantive.

We are concerned at the toll this is taking on our teachers, staff and building principals. They are being asked to do so much while having their world's turned upside down as well. They are all rockstars and being so supportive of our family. They haven't missed a beat. We are grateful and want to recognize that this is very difficult for them as well.

It would be helpful to get pdfs of some of the written material. It's difficult for students to reference written material and respond in a different app.

Maybe the tech department could put mini videos together on how Seesaw and Google Classroom work? Some of us parents are challenged;). Please don't ask the classroom teachers to do this.

Dr. Russell's FAQ videos are helpful and informative - thank you!

We are devastated the school year is over, but we are please with what has been occurring so far!

We are finding it difficult to stay on top of everything and are unfortunately letting some of the "specials" (PE, music, art) slip as we prioritize core learning (math, reading, science).

We are finding that our child needs a large amount of help with their work, due to specific needs. While we can't replace our child's teacher, it takes a long time to get our child to complete tasks, because they need more support. The amount of work required is reasonable. The time it takes to complete it, is difficult.

We are having problems with printing from iPad and it's been over a week and still no resolve or communication from IT. That is the only reason I marked low for the question regarding the district

We are in OKEEP and never receive the plans, the teachers claim they don't have them to send to us. Zoom calls are chaotic and create stress. The predicted time to complete an activity is so far off, and our daughter has learned absolutely nothing these past few weeks other than having additional stress created in our home. I find it absurd we're paying extra for this completely disorganized process when we can't even access what we "paid" extra for.

We are not teachers

We are on week 4 of e-Learning and some of the issues we are experiencing are really unacceptable at this point. There are far too many places that we are expected to look for information. My 4th grader has information on the school website, then once in that document we need to go to his homeroom teachers document, then go back to the district document for specials information. Same thing for my OKEEP student. I'm having to go to many different areas to find information and even then some of it is incorrect or missing. For example, all Zoom calls have a meeting ID. Then today there was no meeting ID for one, only a link. Well the link was emailed to me so my daughter had to use my computer to do her zoom, she couldn't do it on her ipad be the app only asks for a code. Not to mention the 40+ emails I'm receiving daily from Seesaw from teachers and uploads my 3 kids are making. We need to be receiving 1 document from the homeroom teacher. This document should have every single piece of information my child needs for the week (Zoom codes, specials assignments, etc.). Also, I would like to know why our teachers are not actually teaching the students via Zoom videos (prerecorded would be fine). I know many friends who live and/or teach in other districts and this is happening everywhere. I don't understand why Brain Pop is teaching advanced math lessons and the actual teacher isn't. I get that everyone is scrambling with working from home with kids there, my husband and I are doing the same thing but at 4 weeks in (and not a true end in sight) we should be doing better.

We are so lucky to be in [1]! I would love more initiative for independent reading. Thank you!

We are still struggling with being able to access the xtramath website. When we are able to use the website my child becomes frustrated because the server times out and they has to begin their work all over again without ever being able to complete it.

We like having the weeks activities available in a single document but it's a little disconcerting to see the discrepancies between how the two 1st grade teachers are engaging with their students and the differences in the type of topics they're covering.

We are surprised to realize the kids have the auto-correction /orthography function enabled on their ipads, while they are still struggling to spell words correctly. We consider this an absolutely crucial element of their language education. We think it is very important to have this function disabled permanently, so children in elementary grades learn correct spelling first, before relying on the convenience of their devices.

We are working hard just to get the required learning done at this point. I feel a bit inundated by the requirements for the special subjects - PE, library, art & music. Can we back off on those areas for a bit? It is challenge just to get the core learning done while trying to work full time.

We believe Zoom is not a secure platform to use. Cisco webex and Google Hangout might be alternative solutions to look into. We could use more instructional videos from teachers during the day to teach lessons. the kids love to see them and its very very helpful.

We do not have the schedule for the schedule for my som. In addition, my son cannot find the schedule for all of his classes, and he has missed some classes completely. It is very confusing, and we cannot even track what he is supposed to do unless a teacher reaches out to us directly that he is not participating in class.

We find it difficult to complete the extra stuff during the day, trying to focus on the main pieces his teacher assigns is a struggle just because the change in environment. We don't often get to Art or even the OKEEP stuff.

We had frustration getting reading material ("The Outsiders") and fell behind. We now have a Kindle edition at our own expense and are playing catch up.

We had seesaw deleted our work several times when we made a draft and went back to edit it.

We had so many problems the first week. We had to completely change how he does his work. 90% is now technology free because of the issues with the links, the videos, zoom, where to post assignments, where to find assignments. Now that we have switched it is going much smoother. There are still issues with zoom but most of the time he is able to access it. The tech support was sending mixed messages regarding the issue to myself and the teachers. And didn't seem to be aware of the blocks on the iPads. Which made trying to fix the problem take over 4 days versus 1 day. I have not been happy with the technology issues, how some of the teachers have handled the questions. However there are many who took my concerns and felt my frustrations as their own and went above and beyond to help us, so he could have the materials he needed and a much more stress free school day at home.

We had tremendous difficulty with the links from the specials teachers esp. Art and gym. We tried several times to access activities but we're unable.

We have a child in kindergarten/OKeep and a 1st grader. With 60 minutes for kindergarten and 60 minutes for OKeep, my kindergartener has 120 minutes of work everyday. This is more than my 1st grader who is at 90 minutes a day. I think that amount of work provided by the teachers for the kindergarten portion (60 minutes) is sufficient. Maybe for the OKeep portion, it could be cut back to 30 minutes for a total of 90 minutes a day for kindergarten/OKeep.

1st grade at 90 minutes is perfect!

Also, it would be helpful if the kindergarten specials teachers worked with the homeroom teachers to make sure they are scheduling on different days. My almost 6 year old has 4 Zoom calls on Thursdays!! SEL/Homeroom, OKeep PE, OKeep music, and math intervention. Spacing them out throughout the week would be helpful.

The teachers have been wonderful with providing so many materials! They have been amazing in their communication and organization. Thank you so much Ms and Mrs. [1]!

We have appreciated the consolidation of information and hope it continues. It has been a little tricky finding links to Zooms in an email, when the child's device does not have access to email - if as much as possible could be in the weekly plan, that would be great. We print it out, and check off things as we go. Since both of us parents are also working from home, as streamlined as possible is helpful. Thank you for all your work 58!

We have been really happy with how eLearning has been going for our preschooler. Thanks!

We have been very impressed by the teachers and district administrators as they adapt and innovate in these crazy times. Bravo!

We have other little children who also need our attention and this is very challenging some days to try to help our 1st grader and still focus on the littles. We are worried our child might fall behind because we can't focus all our attention on the subjects he is learning. Teachers should be making SOOOOO much more than they do, and I hope our kids can return to school soon! We have still not recieved Kindergarten packet that was mailed last week.

We have to access a lot of different apps to do the work - some of which my kids are not that familiar using. Most of our trouble spots have been with the technology not the content.

We learned that he cannot just find everything he needs on Seesaw. Sometimes we have to go to DG58.org and click a link there first. Keep up the positive messages and loving pictures. We are doing great, we have plenty of activities to do. I hope you all have adapted well too. Remote learning is helping us learn more about our technology devices and apps. Remote learning is letting us experience "home schooling"; great, but we are ready to get back to in-class schooling.

We need more guidance with the writing assignments because it's challenging to know the expectations.

We need more optional work for core subjects when our kids finish fast and I want to keep them learning. They want more. I'd also like to see more lessons taught - and zoom in smaller groups for lessons taught.

we need to see live instruction - webinar style with ability to ask live questions and be taught a new subject rather than figure it out yourself

We obviously would like the kids to get back to school ASAP. Could we get extra work or additional resources to help fill the day? She still has lots of down time.

We preferred when all links and submission were in one place. Seesaw.

Currently you must go to the school website then submit on Seesaw. We liked when our kids could assess their schedule on Seesaw and submit on Seesaw.

The zoom check ins are great to have that personal connection to their peers and teacher.

The screencasts with teachers teaching lessons is appreciated.

We really appreciate all the work our teachers and administrators are doing. Our family benefits most from zoom calls and videos.

We should be refunded for OKEEP. The kids are not getting anything out of the extra work. Please stop sending so much home for these little kindergartners. The morning week is too much—having the additional OKEEP work is putting us all overboard.

We used to see quiz/test scores on SeeSaw and also they quizzes and tests would come home in his folder. I am wondering how we'll get that information now.

We want more teacher led videos and instructions. You tube and app videos/quizes should be supplements not replacement for teacher led instruction. Parents can't reteach lessons while working. Teacher videos need to be available. Jumping between apps is confusing. She isn't able to follow what is required of her without a lot of parent intervention. It's not realistic to ask parents to work full time and sit with kids working all day. I like that they are getting a lot of work, however the teacher time expectations for this work are so far off for our family. It is taking 3 plus hours for us to get through the amount of work that is expected each day.

We will likely be hearing a lot of complaints. I think you guys are doing an amazing job at putting this in place, especially given these rare circumstances. You are appreciated!

We would like the ability to get a better idea of the teachers assessment of student activity. Though we trust our kids when they tell us things are completed, we cannot sit with them and review everything they are submitting. We do not have feedback if what they submit was acceptable in terms of content, scope, and comprehension from the teacher's perspective. Maybe even once a week, it would be good for parents to be able to confirm things are being done correctly. When kids are in class, no news is good news. In this situation, a feedback loop would allow us to help make sure our kids are doing what they need to. I understand (as one of us is a teacher on the other side of e-learning) that there is a lot of work for the teachers to deal with currently, so something as simple as a checkbox next to their subjects at the end of the week would be helpful.

We would like to know what the plan or procedure is to allow for retrieval of personal belongings from school lockers.

We would like to see better Math exercises especially that my daughter is doing 5th grade math. Also, I would like to see more science and social studies. The quality of the e-learning is not that good.

We would like to see more Zoom teaching, especially 3rd grade math.

We would love to see some varying levels of assignments (similar to how the kids are in different reading and math groups). The assignments aren't really tailored to different levels nor are we seeing much feedback beyond generic "good job".

We've had contact with only one teacher (with class updates) which is less than we usually have during non remote learning time.

We're hoping we'll return to school.

What can or is being "graded" and how grades will be determined (if they will be used) is still unclear.

When printing and mailing materials, please save paper as much as possible. We received a 100+ page packet in the mail, copied single-sided. Of these, about 5 pages are cutting/gluing activities that need to be single sided but the rest could have been back-to-back to save paper, ink, and shipping costs (each packed cost \$8 to ship, which could have been cut in half if copied double sided). Copying double-sided would also be much better for the environment. Thank you!

When the teachers could create their own lesson plans (and not one lesson plan per grade) e-learning was significantly easier because the students could follow their "regular" routine, they knew where to locate materials and they were more comfortable with the learning. Now that we have one plan per grade my children are having trouble finding materials and understanding what's expected of them, where to post assignments, what to do if links don't work, etc. For my 4th grader, there is not nearly enough work - he is an average student and he's done with his work in an hour. For my 2nd grader, who is a great student, he has far more work than the allotted time period (which is fine), but the bulk of the time is not spent on learning, but rather trying to figure out what he's supposed to do.

Where printed pages are needed for an assignment, please include the page number and not just the page title (within the SeeSaw instructions). It makes it hard to locate.

While I know this is a new process for everyone (DG58, Teachers, Parents, Students), we need to continue to embrace it quickly...no exceptions. If a teacher is not technically savvy ...get them trained. No excuses. A few quick tips to share:

- 1. Make sure each Teacher has a proper home setup. (Computer, Printer, Scanner, good WiFi).
- 2. Technology training for teachers on how to evolve with remote learning.
- Zoom tutorial. If not already done, have a training for all administration on how to be an expert with video conferencing including sharing documents, using the same Zoom ID on each team meeting, saving documents to the meeting for students/parents to review on their own.
- If homework assignments are uploaded in Seesaw (or any other site), teach how to create consolidated PDF's. (for example, rather than PDF's, a teacher took individual pictures of 5+ pages of work which meant we had to upload it, crop it since it was angled, print it, fill it out, then scan it back so we can upload to Seesaw. Needless to say, not efficient. PDF would have saved over an hour of time.
- 3. Consistency across DG58 schools and grades
- If not already done (likely already happening), There should be sessions for the teachers on best practices shared across schools and grades. For example, designate a 3rd grade teacher from one school to be the technology lead for best practices and once a week (or bi-weekly) host a session on best practices shared. Each grade level can do this across all DG58 schools.
- 4. Parents are now helping kids across a multitude of websites (Seesaw, Clever BrainPop & TCI, Google doc, Squirrel, Khan, IXL, Freckle). I think it would be incredibly helpful to have the teachers conduct a Zoom meeting once a week to walk the kids (even the parents) through each site they will be utilizing to access/complete their week. Even for a technical parent, I find it challenging to navigate all of these sites...sometimes not finding "assignments" because teacher did not upload (happened twice in past week). If they assign it on the weekly remote learning planner.....make sure it's assigned correctly in the appropriate app.
- 5. Emails to teachers should never take more than a few hours (never longer than 24hrs) to respond to student or parent questions. While this should be common sense, there needs to be expectations set.

We all understand this is a learning process for everyone. PLEASE take the above feedback as genuine feedback to help us all get better. The DG58 team has been GREAT working through all of this. Sure it's identified a few areas to improve. That is part of the learning process and we all need to be patient as this plays out....likely for the remainder of the year. This will all make us better as a community and be more flexible moving forward.

Keep up the great work, listen to feedback, communicate back to the community and be willing to make changes for the better. Thanks again!

While I understand how difficult it is to accommodate all of the different needs, I don't believe my son is being challenged with any of the e-learning assignments. I also understand that it's difficult to try to teach new material and therefore accelerate their progress so it feels to me (and my son) like the assignments are more or less just "busy work". Every day, I supplement his math work with worksheets that I've created on my own. It's not lost on me that it would be near impossible for each teacher to individualize lesson plans for each of his/her students, but this one hour or so of academics (aside from the specials) isn't advantageous to him. As for the specials, our library teacher (Mrs. has been fantastic with her assignments and art & music are doing the best they can as well (easily reached and engaged). Our physical education plan doesn't really offer any options. There's been no commentary on my son's submissions, or follow up with new or engaging activities. Lastly, as I mentioned in the previous survey. I don't believe Seesaw is the most functional medium for our students (students can't communicate with their teachers privately). Despite my honest feedback above, I really do appreciate the effort our entire district and school is investing in our kids. Thank you.

While plenty of work is being distributed and contact is being made by the teaching staff, there is very little "teaching" occurring. It appears to be more busy work than actual instruction.

While the classroom work is straightforward, the "specials" assignments are not. Seesaw has been a wonderful tool and I wish everything was centralized there, even external links. Gym requires navigating to the school website and clicking an external link, Art and Music have provided Google docs and external links that don't work on the iPad, we had to login to an external site to access some classroom stuff. It's lots of parent involvement/clicking and navigating that could be avoided. But I truly have been impressed with how our district has organized all of this, so if that's the worst of our complaints, I think we'll be just fine.

While we appreciate having the work posted on a google doc and on seesaw-navigating seesaw on a mobile device is sometimes tricky. Also sometimes links work on google docs and not on seesaw or vice versa (links will work on seesaw and not on google docs). It has been slightly frustrating having to navigate between these two apps to look at the daily assignments.

While we are completing teacher assignments we are not completing special teacher's assignments. There just is not enough time and we are exhausted after read, writing, math, and science.

While we understand how some families feel

That a "full school day" of learning is too much for kids to complete at home, we think 2 hours is far too little, too. All are concerned about the learning loss this pandemic will cause. Keeping instruction to the bare, state-mandated minimum, however, can only exacerbate it. Also, Zoom meetings are great, but they'd be more powerful if students were asked to do them if they had an academic question to answer from their lessons. At least 1 or 2 of the 3 zoom meetings each week.

Whitelist parent email addresses so that kids can send us any documents they need printed on our home network.

Why are we wasting Zoom time playing silly games like 2 truths and a lie. And guess what is in my bag. Or show and share. Or tell a joke. Are we in 2nd grade or pre-school? Why are we not using this time to do something educational? I am strongly considering not having my child waste time on zoom when it has nothing to do with anything. Also there is no real teaching going on. The materials are pretty much the same over and over again. I am considering coming up with my own curriculum and forget about what is being assigned. It is wasting time and not actually doing anything.

Why only 140 minutes?

Why only 2 hours of learning? Shouldn't it be more?

Will any teaching of new skills be attempted?

Will there be grades given, or pass fail?

Will you please send out all of the Zoom codes at the beginning of the week or maybe even for the entire month? Finding the codes the morning of the meeting is hard for working parents. Also, will you please post all of the assignments for the entire week in SeeSaw on Saturday morning as opposed to sending them out at 8:30 in the morning each day? That would allow working parents to do the assignments with these little ones over the weekend and not be so stressed during the week. Thank you for considering this!

Wish Zoom meetings were more disciplined and organized. For some, a 1 hour zoom meeting of sharing experiences is a bit much, especially when they may have schoolwork to complete. Not to mention it is a challenge when students are playing around in their room, eating, playing with the camera, in the chat room, etc. There are several students who aren't even interested in joining these "Zoom" chats anymore. At their grade level, I would think there could be some time spent teaching.

Feedback on assignments would also be helpful to keep the students motivated. It either feels like their work is long-term projects or complete an assignment but you either don't have to turn it in or it doesn't seem to be graded. At this point, the immediate feedback on classwork is math when doing Bigldeas. I have to think accountability and recognition would help with their motivation and buy-in.

For those receiving extra support, we have heard from them. Yes, I understand things need to be measured, but it is a bit frustrating to be asked to collect data. The purpose of these services when they are in school is to provide the support and modifications to help the student be successful. I am obviously handling those things on my own at home, but the last thing anyone needs is additional assignments just to collect data.

With a child in the OKEEP program, it is difficult to keep track of all of the assignments and activities. We have the two different weekly schedules - one emailed by the district, and one through the school's website - and then we have the two Seesaw apps (family and class), and then we have the paper packets (x2 - one for OKEEP, one for K), then we we have multiple ZOOM meetings (1-3 every day), and then we have the various learning apps. This is a lot to keep track of, and it would be nice if there was one (or even two) centralized source(s) of information and assignments. It may be helpful to have the Seesaw activities posted at the beginning of the week. It may be helpful to have both the OKEEP and the regular kindergarten activities just on the weeking, so I don't have to keep going back to my email for the OKEEP schedule. The ZOOM meetings involve almost no learning, it's just say hello to your friends and show and tell or read a story to the kids (which is understandable, it's kindergarten, and the teacher is great), but this leaves parents (many of whom have full-time jobs and other kids) with the entire responsibility of doing all the teaching and getting all of the assignments done. I would suggest longer ZOOM meetings or at least ZOOM meetings that involve completing 1 or more of the assignments.

With all students having iPads....I feel like teachers could "teach" using Zoom classes. The teachers are giving assignments, but there is not much teaching going on. They should use Zoom to teach lessons like they would in school, especially for Math! With everything done on chrome books I feel like I never know what she is doing (or not) because she rarely needs help and apparently seems to be working independently at her desk in her room. Plus she had very technologically challenged parents. But I feel the same way when she is physically in school.

With everything going on I know the teachers are doing their best to keep the kids engaged. I do think the PE, ART and music teachers need to do a zoom class with the kids if they want them working on assignments. Homeroom teachers are doing their part and have scheduled Zoom meeting everyday and my kids absolutely look forward them. I don't find those 3 to be essential right now but I understand. I just feel that they are teachers too and they need to step it up instead of just sending links to online videos to watch for PE, Art or music and than respond on it.

With the list of subjects and teachers that are for the 8th grade list. If you do not know the teachers name, it is hard to navigate. If there was someway to add the subject the teacher does or a tab, so we can look up a teacher or subject. The list is too long. If you can have a search engine on top that would be helpful. Or by students name search and the students teaches and zooms and homework due comes up, would be so helpful. Cause If I do not check the list I have no idea of what my childs workload is and when her Zoom calls are.

Kids do not like Zoom calls, so if you make it optional, no one will show up. Make it mandatory and as roll check.

I have no idea if she is doing the work load required of her and submitting it. So I hope for the best. Or wait for a email from the teacher.

A project or two and many be some homework due by the end of the week in primary subjects would be great!

With the school year being extended hard copies of work would be great

With this now being extended to the rest of the school year I feel that it is too much work.

Worksheets were missing from the packets that were mailed and some of the assignments that required the students to create or build something is what took the most time.

Would be good to have more zoom instruction on what is expected and where to find things so they are not asking their parents

Would be nice if the teachers were able to do more using Zoom. Like going over spelling words, reading threw the fluency sheet, word wall words.....

Would be nice if we could print off of seesaw

Would be nice to have additional work outlined in each core learning area if students finish what they were given quickly.

Would be nice to see a graded work. That way we follow up if something missing.

Would it be possible to post all of the assignments for the entire week (including the Seesaw assignments) on Friday evening or Saturday morning? This would be helpful for working parents. We have the time to help our kids on the weekend, but doing it during the week is challenging.

Would like additional work, if possible.

Would like to do some science activities as well! Even if it's just suggestions for activities kids can do outdoors.

Would like to see more instruction during grade school Zoom meetings going over lessons etc and not just SEL time

Would like to see Zoom meetings be educational.

Would like all the worksheets and daily work posted on DG58.org verse being emailed the morning of. Or would like to have all the worksheets for the week emailed at the latest the night before.

Would love more "introduction to new material" done by teachers on Zoom

Would love more student face time with teachers on zoom with live curriculum instruction.

Would love reminders the day prior to zoom calls, we are two working parents in healthcare and can't accommodate any same day schedule changes.

Would love the zooms with his primary teacher to be more learning rather than just saying hello

Would really like to see the school year end date changed to Memorial Day weekend. I feel like a lot of other districts started a couple of weeks after us and are only doing remote learning three days a week. Seems like we are totally doing more hours so let's end the school year sooner please!!!

Would really love to have more live teaching by the teachers via conference call and more instructional videos for the kids to do some real learning.

You all are doing a phenomenal job with something that was handed to you so fast. I am so grateful for all the district is doing! Keep up the great work!

You all are doing such a great job at providing our kids with structure and a stimulating / challenging learning environment. We have been very happy with the result.

You are all doing a fantastic job - we know many of you are in the same position, balancing a family (and their educational needs) while working. Thank you for all of your hard work - it truly shows. We are so proud (and lucky) to be part of district 58.

You are doing a great job. Our teachers are the very best in the world.

You are doing great! Thank you for your quickly created e-learning program. The Zoom sessions are great! Thanks for letting us use that to see each other. My kindergartner does not have his own i-Pad. We use my phone and laptop instead. My phone is too small to draw pictures on. My laptop does not have a write-on screen. Therefore he cannot do some of the assignments. What works best for me is for him to write or draw on paper, and then take a picture of his work, and then upload it to Seesaw. Thank you for not requiring work to be submitted this week for OKEEP. Lat week was too much. The technology is great, but adds time, especially when it doesn't work exactly right, or when I have to remember how to use Seesaw. I had Seesaw Family for years. I learned that I also needed Seesaw Class. Seesaw Journal vs Activities vs Inbox vs Notifications, drawing tools, etc.

You guys are doing an amazing job. Thank you for everything. I'll just say that it's challenging to manage e-learning for 2 kids simultaneously who both a decent amount of help. My husband and I are both still working too so it's just a lot to juggle! I know we're not alone in that, it's just what makes the e-learning hard.

You guys are doing great. No words thank you.

You guys have all been amazing, please keep up the good work!

Zoom calls with the teacher need to be daily with actual lessons provided. Since my child is in 2nd grade, these would need to occur multiple times a day, given the attention span, as we do not feel the teacher is engaging the children much in her 20 minute check in calls, 2-3x/week.

We would also appreciate specific availability each day set aside for Zoom calls for additional assistance or explanations needed for assignments.

Additionally, the children need to be able to access EVERYTHING from their own device, whether it is an app or a website. There are security restrictions on the ipads, which is understandable under normal circumstances, but these are not normal circumstances, and the children need to have ALL access to what they need for school assignments on their OWN device.

Zoom check in with the teachers has been really nice too!

Zoom classroom where the teacher actually teaches each specific class (maybe 20-30 min per period) would be so much more effective in keeping our kids engaged. We would love to see Zoom teaching time instead of continuous research to find all the busy work that is assigned. It is like pulling teeth to get our kids to do each assignment. As parents, our full time jobs on elearning days has turned into being teachers, coaches, behavioral therapists, social workers, computer gurus, and detectives. It is so incredibly stressful for those of us who have kids who are NOT self-motivated. Then we get bombarded with calls and emails about work not being completed. Please help!!!!

Zoom connection on school iPads was not sorted pin advance and did not work. It is now resolved.

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Zoom has been better this week but also a lot of chats. Even with that said, some other ways to better utilize the zoom time might be adding some smaller group times (maybe to focus on certain skills) or a presentation assignment (small research projects they should show) or virtual field trips to do and discuss. Indian Trail did virtual spirit weeks and that was fun for the zoom chats and all the aides, principal, special teachers jump on at various points and it has been great.

Kindergarten workload still needs a bit of work, it's hard with such a difference in materials that might be available to families, I understand, but some of the items mentioned above, more games, etc might help. There is nice regular teacher feedback on K SeeSaw. Thank you!

Zoom learning lessons are going good.

Zoom lessons from teachers can be better. It would be nice to have actual lessons or more lesson videos made by the teacher and sent to students on a daily basis.

Zoom meetings can be a little frustrating, they're scattering times to accommodate everyones schedules however 6pm isn't optimal and its hard from a scheduling perspective to make all of the times work or remember them for that matter.

Zoom meetings have been a challenge - technical issues with muting all lines. Lots of background noise has made it difficult for child to hear teacher (somewhat better as of 4/21). Help may be needed for teachers to better understand the functionality and features of zoom.

Zoom meetings with entire class are very overwhelming and cause a lot of anxiety for K kids. We do better with videos from her teacher or much smaller zoom meetings

Zoom should be used for teachers to teach a regular class during regular class times each day (as if all were in the actual building) with all students "present" to interact as if they were in class. Just assigning work requires children to teach themselves and some are not learning in only 2 hours each day of work. Remote learning as it is right now is in no way replacing what the students require (and deserve) from our educational system.
