### Introducing Dr. Kari Cremascoli, District 58's new leader



This spring, the District 58 Board of Education appointed Dr. Kari Cremascoli to succeed Paul Zaander as the district's Superintendent of Schools. Dr. Cremascoli comes to District 58 from DeKalb Community Unit School District 428, where she has served as Assistant Superintendent of Educational

Services since 2008. Prior to that, she spent three years as Executive Director of Student Services for District 428. She has also worked as a teacher and as a psychologist in the Chicago suburbs and in California.

"The District 58 schools have a rich tradition of providing world-class educational services to students, while serving as beacons of pride and distinction throughout the community," Dr. Cremascoli said. "I am impressed by the

collective achievements of the Downers Grove schools, and I am thrilled to have the opportunity to join such a vibrant and student-centered community."

Dr. Cremascoli earned a Bachelor of Science degree in psychology from Loyola University Chicago, where she graduated summa cum laude and minored in Business Management and Spanish. She earned a specialist level Masters of Education degree in school psychology from Loyola University Chicago, and her Doctorate of Philosophy in Leadership in Education Administration from Capella University in Minneapolis. She and her husband, Brian, have three young children.

### New District 58 math curriculum to promote mastery, growth, real-world problem-solving

Connor, a first-grade student at Belle Aire, carefully maneuvered two "logs" and eight "cubes" into place on the board to represent the number 28.

"Connor showed us that we have two tens and eight ones – great job, Connor!" said his teacher, Tara Fulton. "Now, here are three tens and seven ones. How do we read that? 37! Great!"

Once the students had completed their review of the previous day's lesson, Fulton divided them into groups and gave each one a plastic baggie containing several dozen sticks and some rubber bands. She read out numbers and asked the students to represent them on their place value placemats using the sticks. Each group took turns using the class's document camera to demonstrate how they had arrived at their answer.

That same day in Dawn Magliola's math class at O'Neill Middle School, students were discussing problem-solving strategies that could help them figure out which of two stores had a better deal on renting a karaoke machine.

"Why would you want to include the deposit?" Magliola asked. "Because it's part of the overall cost," a student answered. The students then paired up to solve a series of real-world problems involving topics ranging from plants to fitness.

#### A SAMPLE PROBLEM:

Sophia and Scott each open a bank account. Scott's initial deposit was \$62, and he saves \$15 a week. Sophia's initial deposit was \$27, and she saves \$20 a week. After how many weeks will Sophia's balance be greater than Scott's?

What do the firstgrade and eighthgrade math lessons mentioned above have in common? They both come from the new math curriculum that will be in place in District 58 for the 2012-13 school year.

Fulton and Magliola



were among dozens of Math Curriculum Committee members who piloted the program in District 58 during the second half of the 2011-12 school year.

The committee, which consists of District 58 staff, parents and administrators, as well as the math department chairs from Community High School District 99, recommended the adoption of Math in Focus for kindergarten through fifth grade and Glencoe Math for sixth through eighth grade.

Glencoe Math has been in use in sixth through eighth grade in District 58 for many years with much success, while Math in Focus is the United States version of Singapore Math. Singapore has been a top-performing nation on the Trends in International Math and Science Study for many years, and

> studies conducted in the United States have shown that Math in Focus significantly boosted student achievement in math.

The goal of the District 58 math program is to prepare students to become 21st

century global problem solvers by infusing current tools and technology into the curriculum; providing opportunities and support to allow all students to demonstrate mathematical growth; providing a foundation that leads to mastery of core concepts and skills; connecting the instruction of math to real-world contexts to provide successful application beyond the classroom; and fostering and maintaining a high level of confidence and success in mathematics.

In addition to excellent alignment with the more rigorous Common Core standards (see page 8), Glencoe Math and

Math in Focus also boast strong technology components and emphasize the development of number sense, understanding, and flexible mathematical thinking in real-world contexts. This helps students to truly connect with their work in math class.

"Students who don't normally enjoy math have been excited about solving problems about certain real-world topics, such as skateboarding, or music," Magliola said.

The curriculum is designed to gradually guide students from concrete lessons and examples to an understanding of more abstract concepts, such as solving for x in algebra problems.

District 99's participation in the Math Committee will facilitate a smooth transition from math instruction in District 58 to math instruction in District 99, all closely aligned with the Common Core Standards.

### District 58 maintains high performance on ISATs

District 58 students performed at a very high level again this past year on the Illinois Standards Achievement Test. The overall percentage of students in District 58 that met or exceeded the state standards in reading and 92.7 percent in 2011. ### Guided reading leading to success

Reading instruction in District 58 follows a balanced literacy approach, which leads students to more and more independence and self-directed learning. As part of this comprehensive approach, students at all buildings participate in daily guided reading in small groups at their instructional level.

Guided reading is designed to focus on the specific needs of individual students and support them in becoming proficient readers. The staff member working with that group models reading strategies for the students, such as making inferences, summarizing and finding the main idea, then monitors them as they read a leveled text independently. Once the students have finished reading, they participate in activities to assess their comprehension, fluency and word study.

### District 58 offers Chinese program again this summer

Fifth- through seventh-grade students in District 58 were offered the opportunity again this summer to participate in a 60-hour Chinese language immersion program.

The feedback from parents of students who participated in the inaugural program last year was overwhelmingly positive. The classes were taught by staff from STARTALK, variety of cultural activities, and developed skills in reading, writing, speaking, listening and typing Chinese.

### Differentiated instruction helps District 58 meet learning needs

District 58 continues to maintain its focus on effectively meeting the learning needs of all students at all ability levels through differentiated instruction.

During the 2011-12 school year, District 58 provided targeted staff development during which teachers had the opportunity to work with a specialist within District 58 to gain additional instructional strategies in this area. This will continue in the 2012-13 school year, during which the specialist will visit each building in the district to work with teachers at set times on a quarterly basis.

### New administrators appointed in District 58

The District 58 Board has approved several new administrative appointments for the 2012-13 school year.



**JUSTIN SISUL** was appointed principal of Pierce Downer School to replace Dr. Lisa Mondale, who retired after nine years at the helm. Sisul spent seven years as a music teacher at Herrick Middle School, followed by four years at Lester School, first as an administrative intern and most recently as the Assistant Principal.

**CHRISTINE CLAVENNA** was appointed the assistant principal of O'Neill Middle School. She replaces Randy Janousek, who retired after more than three decades in District 58. Clavenna comes from Mokena School District 159, where she has served for the past two years as an administrator and for 10 years prior to that as a fifth-grade teacher.





**THEODORE KRILLIES** was appointed the assistant principal at Lester School to replace Sisul. Krillies has been teaching social studies at the middle school level for six years, most recently at Butler Junior High in Oak Brook.

### District 58 increases daily instructional time

District 58 has added 20 minutes to its school day for 2012-13, which brings it into better alignment with the average school day in surrounding districts. The change also supports recent enhancements to District 58's instructional program, such as the continued focus on meeting all students' needs through Response to Intervention; alignment with Common Core Standards for Math and Language Arts; teaching Social-Emotional Learning skills; and boosting literacy through guided reading, all of which are time-intensive tasks. ### Consultant completes comprehensive facilities assessment

This past fall, the District 58 Board of Education retained the services of Darien-based Wight and Co. to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the district's 15 facilities. This assessment was the first step in addressing the strategic plan goal of creating a long-term facilities plan for District 58, in partnership with its citizen-driven Financial Advisory Committee.

Wight and Co. presented its findings to the board this spring and discussed its analysis process, which included site visits, data and document reviews and conversations with staff.

The firm assessed the physical conditions of the District's 13 schools, as well as the Administrative Service Center and Longfellow Center, in relation to their useful life over the

next 15 years; looked at how the facilities support education; and came up with recommendations for the best long-term use of the facilities.

One overarching challenge is that the



Students at Kingsley School work together on a lesson. In support of its mission is to maintain safe, nurturing, child-centered environments, District 58 commissioned a comprehensive facilities study this past fall, and the results were presented this spring.

District's buildings range in age from 42 to 84 years – the average age being 57 years – and were all built at a time when education was delivered to students in a way that is vastly different from how it is delivered now.

All aspects of the physical components of the building were included in the assessment, including the quality and type of materials used in construction, and the mechanical, electrical and

plumbing systems. Each component was ranked on a scale of 1 to 4, 1 being poor and 4 meaning the District can simply maintain that aspect. District 58's buildings generally fall in the 2-3 category.

To accomplish the educational alignment portion of the study, the firm considered aspects such as how approachable the building is, the configuration of the building (how close are classrooms to the library, gymnasium and office?), and square footage per student as compared with recommendations.

The report included conceptual budget costs, and the total estimated cost to address all of the firm's recommendations would be approximately \$39 million. The consultant said that number is very low for a district this size, which is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the buildings and grounds staff.

### Board awards final Life Safety contracts

Life Safety projects totaling approximately \$3 million are slated to be completed this summer. These are the final projects being funded with \$10 million in bonds that were issued in January 2010.

Life Safety projects completed during the past two years using the bond proceeds include roof replacements at Henry Puffer, Indian Trail, O'Neill, Kingsley, El Sierra and Belle Aire; light pole replacements; asphalt repair/replacement; heating and ventilation work; and chimney repairs.

The Board of Education awarded contracts in February for the following work:

- Boiler work at Fairmount
- Door security/fire safety work at Henry Puffer, Highland,
   Indian Trail and O'Neill

- Window replacements at Herrick and O'Neill
- Curtainwall replacement work at O'Neill (artists' rendering below)
- Paving work at Belle Aire and Henry Puffer



## District 58 moving towards alignment with Common Core Standards

Illinois has joined other states in adopting new Common Core State Standards to guide teaching and learning, and District 58 is moving toward alignment with those new standards.

The new K-12 math and English Language Arts standards adopted by the Illinois State Board of Education (ISBE) are known as the New Illinois Learning Standards Incorporating the Common Core. According to the ISBE, these evidence-based standards are intended to be robust and relevant to the real world, and to "better prepare Illinois students for success in college and the workforce in a competitive global economy." The standards are designed to help students and parents understand what students are expected to attain each year. The standards also are designed to allow teachers to establish the best approach to help their students succeed.

District 58 has begun incorporating these new standards into instruction, and assessments based on the new standards will replace the Illinois Standards Achievement Test (ISAT) and the Prairie State Achievement Examination (PSAE) beginning in 2014. District 58's new math curriculum, which will be in place for the 2012-13 school year, is aligned with the Common Core Standards for mathematics. District 58's curriculum for reading, writing, speaking and listening, and language, will be aligned with the Common Core by 2014.

# District 58 recognized for leadership in Social-Emotional Learning

Downers Grove Grade School District 58's continued leadership in teaching students social and emotional (SEL) skills has earned the district accolades from the DuPage County Regional Office of Education.

The Illinois Learning Standards include three goals for SEL (see below). Over the past few years, the District, led by its Social-Emotional Learning committee, has focused on incorporating SEL at the district, building and classroom levels. In January, Lester Assistant Principal Justin Sisul and social worker Kristen Leonard presented a breakout session at the ROE's annual Equity and Excellence for All Conference. They shared the steps that the district had followed for implementing the ongoing SEL goal, and ways in which those efforts continue to be refined and improved.

"We will continue to seek full SEL implementation across the district over the next two years, expanding our supports and resources to help children develop the social and emotional skills they need to succeed," said Jayne Yudzentis, Assistant Superintendent for Personnel, whose department oversees SEL efforts.

### The goals for SEL in the Illinois Learning Standards are:

- Develop self-awareness and selfmanagement skills to achieve school and life success
- Use social awareness and interpersonal skills to establish and maintain positive relationships
- Demonstrate decision-making skills and responsible behaviors in personal, school, and community contexts

# Grove Children's Preschool hosts first Parent Education Workshop series

District 58's Grove Children's Preschool program offered a new Parent Education Workshop series this school year, which was well-attended and well-received.

Each session included time for coffee and conversation with other parents, as well as a short presentation. The first workshop focused on the benefits of routines, schedules and visuals for all children to follow. Each family had the opportunity to make picture schedules to bring home and begin using right away with their child.

Several of the sessions – a workshop for parents of incoming kindergartners and a workshop on educational apps and websites – were open to parents/guardians of any preschool-age child living in the District 58 attendance area.

"We were very pleased with the turnout for the workshops, particularly the session for parents of incoming kindergartners, and participants told us they found the information valuable," said preschool parent program facilitator Sandy Biddenstadt.

The goal of the Grove Children's Preschool program is to meet the developmental and individual needs

of all children in a safe, inclusive and nurturing environment, while promoting educational success through engaging and collaborative learning experiences. Grove Children's Preschool is a blended program, meaning that tuition students, students identified as having special education needs, and students identified as being at risk for future academic difficulties due to cultural or socio-economic factors are taught in the same classroom.

District 58 also hosts a series of preschool screenings designed to evaluate development in children ages 2 years 10 months old to 5 years old. Screenings are free to District 58 residents. Concerned parents who have not had their child screened for speech, vision, hearing, learning or behavioral needs are encouraged to call (630) 719-5800 to schedule an appointment. During the 2011-12 school year, a new District 58 Technology Procurement Team was developed to ensure that technology use aligns with the district's mission and vision. The TPT will review proposed purchases, including those made by the PTAs and those made through grants from the District 58 Education Foundation.

### Districts 58, 99 students partner to learn about digital safety

Through a new blogging partnership with students in Community High School District 99, students at Herrick and O'Neill middle schools learned about staying safe in the cyber world. Through the program, developed by Downers Grove South High School instructional technology coordinator Jon Orech, high-school students blogged about

what it means to be a good digital citizen, and shared that blog with the middle school students. This sparked an online conversation in which the older and younger students shared stories, ideas and tips with one another. The experience was very engaging for the District 58 students, who gained valuable advice from their "teen teachers."

**HIGHLAND** was one of 305 schools nationwide – including 19 in Illinois – to be named a 2011 National Blue Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education. The school hosted a Blue Ribbon celebration with community members and local legislators in December. PIERCE DOWNER was named a Blue Ribbon School in 2007.

Seven District 58 schools - BELLE AIRE, FAIRMOUNT, HIGHLAND, HILLCREST, KINGSLEY, PIERCE DOWNER and WHITTIER – were honored with Academic Excellence awards from the state for 2012. These awards are given to schools in which at least 90 percent of students met or exceeded state standards in reading and math for three consecutive years.

In an effort spearheaded by the school's PTA, **EL SIERRA** won a grant from the Illinois Clean Energy Community Foundation to have a set of solar panels installed. **EL SIERRA** hosted a Solar-bration May 14 to commemorate the installation, which is set to take place this summer. **HILLCREST** installed solar panels in 2010.

The award-winning children's TV series Green Screen Adventures selected a story and a poem written by **BELLE AIRE** third-grader Evan Kattapong-Graber to be adapted and performed in upcoming broadcasts.

**HENRY PUFFER** was chosen as a grand prize winner in the nationwide NFL PLAY 60's Back to Football Friday contest, netting the school a \$10,000 grant for health and fitness efforts and an NFL team celebration that included an ultimate gym class with Bears offensive tackle Gabe Carimi. The school donated \$1,000 of the prize money to the Fun with Fitness program at Good Samaritan Hospital's Health and Wellness Center.

PIERCE DOWNER fifth-grader Madeline Degiorgio finished second out of 28 contestants in the DuPage County spelling bee Feb. 21 in Lisle.

O'NEILL'S race car team was given a rating of Outstanding by the judges at the Argonne National Laboratory electric car competition for their design

O'NEILL eighth-grader Tommy Leinart took first place in the American Legion Junior High Speech Contest hosted April 15 by the American Legion. Alexander Bradley Burns Post #80, for his speech about the First Amendment and the right to

# District 58 set to adopt balanced budget for 2012-13

District 58 ended the 2011-12 school year with a balanced budget, and anticipates adopting a balanced spending plan for 2012-13. Conservative budgeting, careful monitoring of – and proactive responses to – economic conditions, and continued maintenance of fund balances has put District 58 in a solid financial position.

The 2012-13 tentative budget includes nearly \$60 million in normal operating aggregate revenues and just over \$60 million in normal operating aggregate expenditures. This does not include the Medical Reserve Fund or the Life Safety Fund. The district is planning to complete \$3 million in Life Safety projects this summer using the last of the proceeds from the Life Safety bonds issued in 2010 (see page 7).

"We anticipate that normal operating revenue sources will match or come close to normal operating expenses," said Controller James Popernik. "It looks as though we will be in good shape again."

The proposed spending plan for next year reflects the planned continuation of all district programs; the addition of 20 minutes to the school day, with accompanying increases in personnel staffing and transportation costs; increases in facilities maintenance spending; and minor changes where appropriate.

Although questions remain regarding the state's budget and potential changes that may negatively impact the district, the district's fund balances are expected to remain stable.

Revenue assumptions include that general state aid will remain level, at \$1.2 million; other state aid will

increase by \$400,000; the property tax receipts related to the 2011 and 2012 levies will increase by 2.6 percent and 3.8 percent, respectively; and the interest rate on investments will decrease slightly, to 0.4 percent.

Expenditure assumptions for 2012-13 include student enrollment remaining flat, at just under 5,000; benefits insurance expenses increasing 5 percent; supply/equipment budgets for the schools remaining flat; and salaries increasing by 1.5 to 4 percent according to contracts. The district also is increasing the budget for Operations and Maintenance expenditures from \$200,000 to \$500,000, for items such as asphalt repair and the launch of a carpet replacement program in the summer of 2013.

Projects/purchases planned for the 2012-13 year include:

- The second half of the cost of the new K-8 math curriculum adoption, as well as staff development related to the math adoption
- Transition to Common Core standards in math and Language Arts
- Beginning the reading curriculum revision process
- Expanding the district's bandwidth
- Expanding cloud-based initiatives
- A re-design of the district website to facilitate its use as a learning space
- An iPad pilot program
- A replacement truck for the Operations and Maintenance Department

# Education Foundation gives away nearly \$40,000 in grants



"A whole new world – a hundred thousand things to see!" Whittier second-graders sang enthusiastically, taking turns with the microphones as the words to the well-known song from the Disney movie "Aladdin" scrolled by. As they performed, the point values on the screen ratcheted up, and as the song wound down, the students held their breath while they waited to see how they had done. The class cheered as their 4-star ranking, "Shooting Star," flashed on the screen.

The students had stopped by the Reading Room that morning to perform the song on the Wii, purchased earlier in the year with a grant from the District 58 Education Foundation.

They had spent the previous week practicing the lyrics – and were having so much fun that they didn't even realize they were working on their reading fluency. That's exactly the point, said Whittier reading specialist Christy Gergits, who applied for the

grant along with Reading Success instructional assistants Leslie Brouillett and Donna Stanciewicz.

Students from all grade levels have gotten the opportunity to perform karaoke on the Wii throughout the school year, and it has provided motivation for even the more reluctant readers, Gergits said.

"I like the whole thing, from the practice to the end!" one second-grader said of the activity.

Since its inception in 2002, the Foundation has raised and distributed more than \$350,000 to District 58 schools. ### District 58 earns financial recognition

District 58's 2011 Financial Profile, which is based on the 2009-10 school year financial data, placed the district within the Illinois State Board of Education's Financial Recognition range, the highest category obtainable.

The ISBE said that "given the economic difficulties school districts are facing, the State Board realizes this is a significant accomplishment."

### Conservation efforts, green cleaning making a difference in District 58

District 58's buildings and grounds and custodial staffs take great pride in maintaining clean, safe environments for student learning – and doing so in an environmentally friendly fashion.

The biggest electric load for a school is interior lighting, and efforts to conserve this energy throughout District 58 have been threefold:

- Installation of more efficient T-8 florescent lamps throughout the district.
- Replacement of magnetic ballasts with electronic ballasts. Many of the T-8 bulbs and ballasts were purchased with grant money from the Illinois Clean Air Foundation and the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity.
- Encouraging staff to turn off lights when rooms are not occupied.

"We remind people whenever we can, and custodians alert us when it isn't happening," said Rick Bubula, director of buildings and grounds.

These and other actions have resulted in a nearly **30 percent decrease** in electric kilowatt-hour consumption per square foot in District 58 since 2000.

District 58 follows the *Illinois Green* **Cleaning** guidelines for schools as outlined in Policy 3511, adopted four years ago. This means using greencertified, environmentally sensitive cleaning supplies and maintenance products, including bathroom, carpet, floor, glass and hand cleaner.

"These are products that reduce the health and environmental impacts as compared with similar products," Bubula said. "You're using the best

chemicals to do the same job - and we're using green cleaning methods and operating procedures, as well."

All 11 of District 58's elementary schools have energy-conserving doublepaned thermal windows, which will be installed at the two middle schools this summer. As noted in a recent energy audit of two District 58 schools by the Illinois Smart Energy Design Assistant Center, the buildings have well-maintained temperature control

systems. In addition, all school roofs have been replaced during the last 10 years, and R-18 insulation helps to hold heat in during winter and keep heat

Most of the buildings are heated with hot-water heat, not forced air. The district regularly tests and tunes up its boilers to ensure efficient performance, and re-sets the heating hot water temperature in accordance with the outside temperature.

District 58 recycles paper and cardboard. In addition, the Technology Department recycles batteries and electronic equipment, and the Maintenance Department recycles all metals, including steel, copper and aluminum. Through the efforts of the schools and environmental clubs (see sidebar), other materials such as Styrofoam, plastics and glass are recycled, Bubula said.

### District 58 schools keep things 'green'

Whether it's through recycling efforts, book and puzzle swaps, organizing Earth Week activities, earning grants to have solar panels installed on the school roof, creating a Courtyard Classroom for outdoor learning, or composting after fruit break, environmental clubs and groups throughout District 58 are making a big difference for the planet.

A number of the District 58 schools have even earned Earth Flags from SCARCE (School and Community Assistance for Composting and Recycling Education) for their efforts.



And this year for the first time, representatives from environmental clubs from District 58's schools met to share resources and support one another in "being green."

#### TECH TIDBIT

The district plans to expand its use of iPads and Apple TVs as teaching and learning tools in 2012-13. The district provided each school 13 iPads as part of a pilot program. Based upon the successful pilot, the district provided every teacher an iPad at the beginning of this summer for use throughout the 2012-13 school year.

### District 58 launches first bilingual education program

Students are thriving in District 58's bilingual education program, which was launched at El Sierra School this year. Illinois law requires that a district begin a Transitional Bilingual Education (TBE) program when there are 20 or more students

enrolled in a school with the same first language who are eligible for Limited English Proficiency services. This year for the first time, the number of El Sierra language exceeded that threshold.

Throughout District 58, English Language Learners receive a high level of support utilizing the Transitional Program of Instruction (TPI) model, in which instruction is provided in English with minimal translation. With TBE, a portion of the day's instruction is provided in the student's first language to support

the students as they transition to becoming more proficient in English and to support/strengthen the development of academic skills in a familiar language.

El Sierra and District 58 provide a great deal of support for ELL/bilingual families. Programs have included a seminar series for Spanish-speaking parents, Navigating the American Educational System (see photo, left); family nights; and Spanish communications. Bilingual parents also have the opportunity to participate in a Bilingual

Parent Advisory Council (BPAC), which meets four times each year to review and support program development and work on the state grant for bilingual education. The BPAC members also serve as liaisons with the rest of the bilingual parent community.
