
#### Conversations with Dr. C.

## District 58 enjoys successful 1:1 pilot, expanding program for 2014-15

District 58 students and staff have been on an amazing journey of learning this school year, and we are excited about taking the next steps.

This year at least two grade levels at each elementary building, a total of approximately 1,500 students, participated in our 1:1 pilot program in which they were provided with a device to use throughout the day and take home in the evenings. We have seen positive gains in a variety of measures, including student collaboration, ownership and engagement; staff flexibility and choice in meeting learning and curriculum objectives; and student academic growth.

Next year we will increase the number of K-7 students participating in the 1:1 tablet program to 3,600, with an

emphasis on the participation of third through seventh grade students. All current grade levels participating at each building, as well as all current participating students, will continue with the program next year. Additionally, teachers from other grade levels who were not already scheduled to participate in the 1:1 program next year through the rollup plan had the opportunity to apply to participate next year through the challenge-by-choice application.

Our tablet expansion next year will provide enough tablets and existing laptop devices in each school for all students within any of the District 58 schools to be fully 1:1 at any given time, allowing all students and staff access to digital resources.

We also will continue the District's highly successful Learning Lab program, which provides a take home device for one unit of study to all students in a class that is not participating in the 1:1 program for the year. This allows teachers and students to experience and practice with the 1:1 workflow and teaching/learning within a 1:1 environment.

The District is able to continue funding the 1:1 program without expanding the technology or curriculum budgets. The plan calls for purchasing 450 additional devices (about \$180,000) from the remaining 2013-14 budget, and purchasing another 1,650 devices (about \$660,000) out of the 2014-15 budget. In the future, an additional 1,000 devices (\$400,000) would be needed in order to complete the 1:1 program district-wide and provide a device to all K-8 District 58 students.

We surveyed the 1:1 students, teachers and parents this winter and again this spring, and received very positive feedback on the program overall.

As part of our continuing goal of partnering with parents on the 1:1 journey, District 58 will offer a number of parent technology education opportunities over the next few months at Longfellow Center, 1435 Prairie Ave. in Downers Grove. ## District continues to explore possibility of full-day kindergarten

District 58's Kindergarten Team has been exploring the possibility of a full-day kindergarten program for District 58, and this fall they will discuss additional considerations — including personnel, resources and space in the elementary buildings — prior to making a formal recommendation to the Board of Education.

Kindergarten has changed significantly over the past 20 years, with much more ground to cover. Not only are students learning the three R's (reading, writing and arithmetic), as well as social skills and independence, they also are learning the three T's (Teamwork, Thinking Skills and Technology), as well as science and social studies. It has become increasingly difficult to accomplish all of this within the scope of a half-day program while also providing valuable time for students to play, create, process their learning, explore, make connections and further develop the all-important social and emotional skills that will support their future academic success.

During the District's current half-day program, in less than three hours, students move through a variety of activities including a class meeting, math, reading/writing/handwriting activities incorporating science and social studies, and other integrated activities such as Social-Emotional Learning, art, LRC time, P.E., music and recess.

With a full-day program, teachers would be able to move at a less-rushed pace, incorporate learning through play, facilitate longer and deeper class discussions and sharing opportunities, provide more time for art and fine motor skills, dig more deeply into the writing process, facilitate Social-Emotional Learning skills in a real and hands-on way by guiding student interactions, and provide longer and more frequent center times to allow for more in-depth questioning and processing. Ultimately, a full-day kindergarten program would provide students more time to process, digest and reflect on their learning, as well as unstructured time to create and play.

Implementing full-day kindergarten would provide the District's youngest learners with an additional 450 hours of instruction. The current proposal would be to put in place a cost-neutral program by allowing parents to opt in to full-

day kindergarten and pay a fee to commensurate with the District's tuition-based preschool fee. Fee waivers would apply, and by law the District still would have to provide a half-day option.

# District 58 plans updates to Gifted Education Program

District 58's Gifted Education Committee has spent the past few years updating the design of the Gifted Education Program to better meet the needs of all students.

District 58's Gifted Education Program will provide quality differentiated instruction to appropriately challenge and meet the individual needs of K-8 students via instruction in their home school, in addition to a once-weekly pull-out program for identified 4th-6th grade students. This program will cover cross-curricular content in literature, math, STEM and historical perspectives. The program also includes instruction and skill development in social emotional learning skills and learning and innovation skills, which include critical thinking, communication, collaboration and creativity. In 7th and 8th grades, qualifying students have the opportunity to participate in our accelerated Math program, with Math A (7th grade

math and 60 percent of 8th grade math), Math B (40 percent 8th grade math and High School Math 1) and the Gifted English-Language Arts class.

Eligibility for District 58's Gifted Education Program will now be determined by a combination of achievement/ trend data over time as measured by scores on the Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) test that is administered three times a year to all students, as well as classroom performance/behavior over time (high ability, task commitment, creativity) as measured by the Renzulli Scales for Rating the Behavioral Characteristics of Superior Students.

# District 58 students continue high academic achievement

District 58 continues to be very proud of our students' academic achievements and growth. Once again this year, there was much to celebrate. Here are just a few highlights:

- District 58 students met or exceeded state standards as measured by the Illinois Standards Achievement Test at a rate of nearly 20 percent higher than the state average, and even greater than last year's 15 percent differential with the state.
- Growth was a new measure added to this year's state report card, and here again District 58 significantly outperformed the state average. This means that District 58 students are academically much stronger than the state average and are growing at a more rapid pace than the state average. It is very difficult to be both high-achieving and high growth. District 58 is currently accomplishing just that!
- Strong math and reading performances indicate that District 58 students are ready for the Common Core State Standards (see sidebar).
- On the Measures of Academic Progress assessment, administered to all students three times a year in reading, mathematics and language usage, District 58 students outperform the national mean in every area and grade level.
- More significantly, by 8th grade District 58 students outperform the national 11th grade mean in all areas on the MAP assessment.
- District 58 performed significantly better than the state as a result of the changes in cut scores and content of the ISAT overall. Throughout the state, district percentages for students meeting and exceeding standards dropped by 20 percent on average as a result of substantial renorming and new content. District 58's percentage of students meeting and exceeding standards were impacted by only about 15 percent. Despite the significant changes the Illinois State Board of Education made to ISAT cut scores and content, we are extremely proud to report that District 58 continues our strong tradition of strong academic achievement and growth. These achievements truly are a testament to the strong curriculum, excellent staff, hard-working students and strong community support in District 58.

Illinois is one of 45 states implementing new learning targets for K-12 students known as the Common Core Standards, which are intended to better prepare students for success in college and careers within our increasingly global economy.

District 58 has aligned its mathematics curriculum and its English Language Arts curriculum with the Common Core Standards, with improvements made each year. This school year the District's Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Committee began work on aligning the science curriculum with the Next Generation Science Standards, which are to be implemented in 2016-17. The committee has analyzed the standards and developed learning targets for earth science, life science and physical science, all of which are embedded in the District's curriculum web app. Next steps are to analyze standards and develop learning targets for engineering, coding and health.

Beginning in 2014-15, students will participate in the new state-mandated, Common Core-aligned PARCC assessment, which will replace the ISAT in Math and English Language Arts.









# District 58 SEL initiatives, helping students succeed

A District 58 education focuses on the whole child, and Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) is an important component. District 58 continues to expand its supports and resources to help children develop the social and emotional skills they need to succeed. These efforts are being assisted by multi-year partnerships between District 58, CASEL (Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning), and the DuPage Regional Office of Education to provide resources and training for staff.

During the past several years, all District 58 elementary schools have incorporated components of Responsive Classroom, a research-based program that helps schools support social-emotional development in children.



Additionally, all District 58 elementary schools have implemented the research-based Second Step curriculum, which provides lessons that help children develop skills for both academic and social success. The units include lessons to develop skills for learning, such as listening to learn, focused attention and self-talk; empathy; emotion management; friendship skills and problem solving. The program includes 22 to 28 lessons each year, in addition to daily classroom reinforcement activities and home links.

With Second Step, concepts and strategies that are introduced at the youngest grades are built upon and grow in complexity in the older grades. For example, students learn the emotion management techniques of Breathe, Count and Self-Talk in kindergarten, and in later years are shown more advanced breathing methods and complex self-talk techniques. In the last unit, students learn the STEP technique for problem-solving (see box).

Second Step is designed to promote school success, a sense of school connectedness among students, and a safe and respectful school climate. The self-regulation skills and social-emotional competencies taught also align with

the state Social-Emotional Learning standards, said Lester social worker Kristen Leonard. "A benefit I see of this program is that the kids feel really comfortable in their classroom and love having the discussion time to talk about reallife issues like friendship, recess and things going on at home," Leonard said.

At the middle school level, students receive instruction in the development of SEL skills and competencies during the Connections (7th grade) and SNAC (8th grade) exploratory classes.

District 58 schools also have implemented numerous other activities and programs to reinforce SEL concepts.

A sampling from across the district's elementary schools includes:

- School families, in which students are divided into families that include at least one student from each grade level and one staff member. During meetings, students participate in discussions and activities related to the SEL goals.
- Character recognition initiatives/incentives and awards assemblies
- Lunch and/or walks with the principal
- Guest readers
- Assemblies such as Bear Down on Bullies with Chicago Bears mascot Staley Da Bear
- School cheer
- Downers Grove Township speakers
- Star of the Week
- Bulletin board messages
- Student clubs that provide additional opportunities for positive interaction
- Student council fundraisers and donation drives
- Compliment boxes—students write a compliment for each student in the class each quarter and the teacher reads a few aloud each week. Students celebrate one another as their compliments are read.

At the middle school level, activities include:

- Student recognition programs such as Herrick's PRIDE program (Polite Respectful Individuals Doing Extra) and O'Neill's Senator of the Week
- Student clubs that foster relationship building and promote making a difference, such as O'Neill's STARR (Students Together Achieving Rewarding Relationships) Club and Herrick's HOPE (Helping Ordinary People Everyday) Club
- Celebrations during assemblies and all-school announcements
- Student council fundraisers and donation drives
- Rachel's Challenge
- Intramural sports

# District 58 updating program to better meet the needs of English Language Learners

Learner (ELL) services in District 58 surpassed 200 four years ago, and has been growing at a rate of 15 to 20 percent each year since then. Currently more than 30 languages are spoken among District 58 students, and the District's English Language Learning/Bilingual Committee has developed a set of recommendations to support the needs of these students.

In 2012-13, the district introduced a Spanish bilingual resource class at El Sierra, in which instruction is supported in the student's first language as they transition to becoming proficient in English. Bilingual programs are required at schools where there are 20 or more students with the same first language who are eligible for Limited English Proficient services. Most ELL students in District 58 receive English as a Second Language support, in which instruction is provided in English with minimal translation.

To provide students with additional needed supports, the committee has recommended that the district launch a full-time Spanish bilingual primary class at El Sierra and look at offering enrollment to all kindergarten and first grade students from across the district for whom Spanish is their first language and who qualify for English language services. During the 2014-15 year, the committee also will study the possibility of launching additional bilingual cluster sites throughout the district.

Other recommendations include ensuring that all eligible students meet at least five periods a week with an ELL-certified teacher, that proficiency levels determine the level of ESL service received beyond the minimum five periods per week, that staff continue to work to design an ELL instructional program that will create consistency within the district, and that the district provide parent training and opportunities for community input, along with training for district staff, teachers and administrators.

Our staff and students give District 58 much to be proud of! Check out some of their wonderful accomplishments this year.

O'Neill Middle School science teacher Dr. Meg Van Dyke was one of just 10 teachers in Illinois to be named a 2014 Golden Apple **Award** winner for excellence in teaching. Dr. Van Dyke's passion,

commitment and dedication also led to her being named one of just three state-level finalists for this year's Presidential Awards for Excellence in Math and Science Teaching program, the nation's highest honor for teachers of mathematics and science.

Herrick Middle School eighth-grader Nafisa Asad earned the chance to compete at the Scripps National Spelling Bee in Washington, D.C., in May, having correctly spelled "balsam" to win the DuPage County spelling bee Feb. 26.

A total of 58 eighth-graders — 29 from Herrick and 29 from O'Neill were honored at the annual District 58 Education Foundation Select 58 banquet for their citizenship and contributions to school and community. Visit www.dg58.org for the full list of 2013 honorees!

O'Neill Middle School eighth-grader Calvin Herion won the Downers Grove American Legion Speech Contest, and placed second in the DuPage County contest!





## District 58 continues conservative budgeting

All decisions regarding District 58's budget were made with the district's mission first and foremost, which is, in partnership with parents and community, to challenge and engage each child by providing quality educational programs and support services in a safe, nurturing and child-centered environment in order to prepare all students to be lifelong learners and contributing members of a global society. "District 58 continues to spend responsibly while at the same time achieving excellent results

for our students," said District 58
Superintendent
Kari Cremascoli.

The district's 2013 Financial Profile placed District 58 within the Illinois State Board of Education's Financial

Recognition category, a designation it has achieved every year since the ISBE began using the Financial Profile to evaluate districts 12 years ago.

"Even in a difficult financial environment over the past several vears. District 58 has maintained a high level of financial stability, while at the same time expanding staff and services and accomplishing approximately \$23 million on muchneeded capital projects. We are now getting caught up on facilities work that had been put off for many years due to previous cutbacks," said Controller James Popernik. "Unfortunately, due to continued cuts to our expected revenues, particularly state funding and interest earnings. the district's financial stability and strength are beginning to weaken."

Staff has identified \$300,000 in proactive cost-cutting measures for 2014-15, focusing on areas for adjustment with as limited an impact as possible on student programs and services. "Even though next year is

All decisions regarding District 58's budget were made with the going to be a good year from a financial perspective, we want to lessen the blow of an anticipated budget deficit for 2015-16 through responsible budgeting and spending," Popernik said.

District 58 will continue to carefully monitor factors affecting revenues, which unfortunately are a finite set of resources. The District also will remain conservative with expenditures and make choices as to how and where to allocate resources to best serve students and continue accomplishing the board's strategic goals.

The 2014-15 tentative budget includes approximately \$60.5 million in normal

operating aggregate revenues and \$60.3 million in normal operating expenditures, not including the Medical Reserve Fund or the Life Safety Fund. At the end of the 2013-14 fiscal year, the state owed the District approximately \$700,000, and payment uncertainty from the state is again

factored into the district's 2014-15 budget.

Other revenue assumptions include:

- A slight increase in general state aid, and flat state categorical revenues
- A continuation of the state's financial difficulties
- Aggregate interest income remaining at minimal levels (\$90,000 or less)
- A \$25 instructional materials fee increase, the first such increase in a decade, and a transportation fee of \$25 per child to help offset rising costs and sharply diminished reimbursement from the state

Expenditure assumptions include:

- Completing \$3 million in Life Safety projects this summer (see next page)
- Relatively flat staffing levels
- A slight increase in total student enrollment
- Flat utilities costs as a result of energy conserving Life Safety projects and locked-in natural gas and electric rates for 2014-15
- Other expenditure costs such as purchased services, supplies and equipment to be held relatively constant
- Continuation of the 1:1 device initiative, supported by the current curriculum and technology budgets




# Where the money comes from:

# District 58 continues with planned facilities projects

District 58's ongoing facilities improvement plans continue to ensure safe, nurturing, child-centered environments for all students, while also protecting the community's investment in the District's buildings.

Capital projects completed during summer 2013 and targeted for completion in 2014 include much-needed asbestos abatement, carpet/tile replacement, asphalt projects, fire alarm and HVAC upgrades and security upgrades to buildings throughout the District, as well as a three-classroom addition. The District received two \$50,000 state grants to help pay for fire alarm upgrades at the middle schools. The capital projects are the result of years of careful planning and needs assessments, and have contributed substantially to addressing the highest priority needs identified within a comprehensive facilities study by Wight and Co. The

District also has completed some minor renovations at the Administrative Service Center and Longfellow Center, and continues to explore options for the highest and best use of both buildings.

Projects planned for this summer include:

- Replace old carpet with new floor tile in classrooms at three schools
- Replace rooftop HVAC units at four schools
- Install new fire alarm systems at nine schools, and new kitchen fire doors at the two middle schools
- Install new boilers at Henry Puffer School
- Install new gym ventilation unit and three new classroom unit heaters, and tuckpoint two masonry walls at Whittier

By the end of this summer, District 58 will have spent approximately \$23 million over the last seven years on its facilities, \$15 million of which came from Life Safety bond issues in 2010 and in 2013. The District has another \$5.4 million in projects planned for the next two to eight years to address additional priorities identified in the Wight and Co. study.

The District also accomplished phase one security upgrades last year. This included secure front entrances, a new swipe card system for staff and updated security/burglar alarm systems, accompanied by the District's ongoing commitment to continuous review of safety protocols and lockdown procedures.

Building office staff were surveyed regarding the phase one security upgrades, and they indicated that the upgrades successfully balanced the need for increased building security with the desire to maintain warm, welcoming environments for students, staff and families. The District is currently reviewing and analyzing potential phase two projects.

Also in attendance were Sen. Christine Radogno (R-41st District) and a representative from the office of U.S. Rep. Bill Foster (D-IL 11th District).

# Lions Club donation supports vision screenings in District 58

District 58's school nurses can now screen students for potential vision issues more quickly and easily thanks to the Downers Grove Lions Club, which recently donated \$2,500 to help cover the cost of two Optic 5000 Vision Screeners.

Last year two of District 58's school nurses, Susan Donahue and Ann Brinkman, spoke with the Lions Club about the screenings that take place in District 58 and showed Club members the machines that are used. At that time, District 58 had six machines that were shared among its 13 schools, which meant precious time was wasted as the machines were transported from one building to another and then had to be powered up and re-calibrated before they could be used for screenings.



Club member Angie Kleinfelder, a former teacher, was immediately struck by the memory of the single vision screening machine that had been shared among all of the schools in the district where she worked.

"The Lions Club was looking for additional ways to support and partner with the Downers Grove community, and this sounded like a perfect project for the Club to take on to benefit the schools," she said.

The Club donated the money in late March, and the two new machines were delivered not long after. One of the new machines will stay at Herrick Middle School, and the other at O'Neill Middle School.

"Middle school is the age at which more and more vision issues begin cropping up, and now we can quickly and efficiently screen students and refer them to an optician or ophthalmologist for further evaluation if needed," said O'Neill school nurse Susan Donahue. "We are so appreciative of the Lions Club's generous donations to support our students and schools."

Several District 58 schools participated in awareness and


